Town plans development session

The Town of Princeton requests local residents to complete the Princeton Economic Development and Implementation Strategy survey with the intent to gather information as to whether local residents are satisfied with the economic aspects of the community. They will be asked what types of businesses they would like to see and to share ideas that may have to help Princeton's economy to flourish. The survey is available on the Town's website or a paper copy of the survey can be picked up at Town Hall. The Town will host a one day strate-

gic planning session on April 27. Those wishing to attend can contact ckassa@princeton.ca or go to Town Hall. The purpose of the session is to set priorities to be included in Princeton's economic profile to be used to encourage business development and employment growth.

The Town has hired Urban Systems to assist with the surveys and the strategic planning session as well as identifying community development challenges and opportunities and setting priorities. Then an economic profile will be developed.

Snowpack in Similkameen sits at 100%

The March snow survey is now complete. Data from 140 snow courses and 60 automated snow stations around the province and climate data from Environment Canada have been used to form the basis for the following report.

Weather temperatures across British Columbia continued to be well above normal through the month of February, with daily temperatures being 1-3C above normal through southern BC, and 3-5C above normal through the Kootenays, central, and northern BC. These warm temperatures have persisted throughout the 2015-16 winter (December,

January, February), with temperature departures being 1-4C above normal across the province over the three month period.

February was generally a wet month, with a few heavier storm cycles mixed with drier and unsettled periods with lighter precipitation. Precipitation was above normal, with typical precipitation amounts in the range of 130-200% of normal across most of the province.

Snowpack

Wet weather through February led to increased snow packs across the province, and most regions of the province experienced an upswing

of 5% to 10% in snow basin index values since last month. Snow basin indices range from a low of 55% in the Liard to a high of 123% in the Okanagan. In general, most of the province has near normal or slightly below normal (80-110%) snow packs for March 1st, 2016, with a provincial average of 93% from all survey locations. A south to north gradient still exists across the province, however very low snow packs observed earlier in the season in northern BC have generally moderated. Below normal snow packs (65-80%) are present in the Upper Fraser East, Nechako, Central Coast, Skagit,

Skeena-Nass, Stikine, and Northwest, and well below normal (<65%) in the Liard. Above normal snow pack (>110%) is present in the Okanagan and Boundary. The Similkameen is recorded at 100% of normal.

In low and mid-elevations, warm temperatures through the winter led to an increase in the proportion of precipitation falling as rain rather than snow as well as mid-season snow melt.

While melt does not typically occur until April, a few survey locations experienced a decrease in snow water equivalent values since the February survey. While the average for all snow survey locations across the province is 93% of normal, the average for locations below 1000 m elevation is just 67% of normal. Since the majority of the surveys taken across the province are higher elevation sites, diminished snow packs at low to mid-elevation may not be well reflected in the snow basin index values.

Streamflow

With warm temperatures, mid-season melt, and precipitation as rain, most rivers across British

Columbia have experienced well above normal runoff (150% to 200% of median value) over the past one to two months. Snow melt runoff that typically flows later in the season has already passed through their watersheds. This advance in runoff timing may lead to an earlier freshet this season, both in terms of timing of peak flows and the recession to the low-flow season.

Outlook

Strong El Nino conditions that developed over the equatorial Pacific regions over the past few months peaked earlier in the winter and are expected to continue to decline into the spring. The Climate Prediction Centre (CPC) at the U.S. National Weather Service NOAA is forecasting a high likelihood of Elcontinued on Page 2

Snowpack in Similkameen sits at 100%

Nino conditions persisting through until late-spring or early summer 2016.

In general, BC experiences warmer than normal winter and early-spring temperatures during strong El Nino events. Precipitation

during historic El Nino events has been highly variable, with no strong trends across BC. Snow packs during El Nino events tend to be slightly below normal across BC. However there has been significant historic variability and regional variation to this general trend. Snow and weather conditions so far this season have been typical for an El Nino year, with the exception of northern BC, which is experiencing lower snow pack than is typical. In southern BC, snow packs are much better developed than the extremely low conditions that were experienced last year.

Seasonal forecasts from Environment Canada are indicating a high likelihood of above normal temperatures across British Columbia over the March to May period, and an increased chance of

warmer than normal temperatures through the extended forecast period into the summer months.

Seasonal volume runoff forecasts are near normal for most basins across the province. Above normal seasonal runoff is forecast for the Nicola River, Similkameen and Okanagan. Below normal seasonal runoff is forecast in the Cowichan River and Bulkley River systems.

By early March, 80% of the annual BC snowpack has typically accumulated, with another one to two months remaining in the snow accumulation season. High snow pack in the Okanagan basin is an early indication of the potential for elevated seasonal flood risk in the region. Below normal snow pack, particularly in the Liard, and to a lesser extent the Upper Fraser, Nechako, Central Coast, Skeena-Nass, Stikine and Northwest, indicate an increased potential for low flows in the late-spring and summer.


The forecast of warmer weather through the spring, combined with warm temperatures already experienced this winter, is likely to be an

important factor in this year's freshet season. With the advanced melt of some low to mid-elevation snow that has already occurred, continued warmer than normal temperatures would bring an earlier shift in the timing of the rise, peak and recession to summer flows of this year's freshet.

While snow conditions were much different last year, late winter warm weather contributed to a 2 to 4 week advance in the timing of freshet flows in 2015.

For both spring flood risk and summer low flows, snow pack is just one of the important elements that determine whether or not extreme conditions will emerge. Weather, through the remaining portion of the snow accumulation season, the melt season, and into the summer, is also a key driver on whether or not flooding or low stream flows will occur.

The River Forecast Centre will continue to monitor snow pack conditions and will provide an updated seasonal flood risk and stream flow forecast in the April 2016 bulletin.

My Turn...

Building Our Future

Have you filled out your Town of Princeton economic development survey yet? I was going to pass on the one I received in the mail but eventually decided to respond online. I figure if things don't go as I'd like them to and I get the itch to complain, I should at least have acknowledged the opportunity for giving some of my personal input.

I also have to credit Town Council (well, maybe I should be thanking Urban Systems) for asking for my input. I'm a firm believer in asking for help when you need it and here is an example where we all get to say something.

With that taken care of, what exactly is going to turn around the local economy? I'm not so sure it has a lot to do with anything that we don't already have here. I'm pretty sure we can attract new investment to our community by getting the word out that it's a lot cheaper to live here than the Okanagan, the Fraser Valley and the Left Coast.

One example: The land at the industrial/business park is the CHEAPEST commercial property still available in all of the southern half of British Columbia. Did you know that? If you didn't, I highly doubt many investors do either.

I don't think we need to make a ton of changes to what we have here in our community. With new investment trickling in once they figure out how cheap (um, sorry, affordable) it is to live here changes will take place. Those changes will also take place at the pace most of us would like them to: slowly. But there will be change.

I'm not too fussy either as to what kind of investment is attracted to our bargain basement commercial land at the IP/BP as long as it is stable and creates some kind of demand for a larger workforce. I would prefer 'clean' business, but whatever comes here is still worth looking at.

I'm also not too fussy about how many investors get into a bidding war over the best lot or two left at the IP/BP. A bidding war would be nice but ultimately the Town should try to find a way to accommodate everyone wanting to hook up to water and sewer out there.

What does this mean for the rest of us? Well, the more taxes collected by the Town of Princeton thanks to new investment means a bigger bank account. The bigger bank account means more perks for you and me courtesy of Town Council. With a larger tax base expect things to happen. Those items you've always wished our community had with start to pop up here and there and slowly (remember, pace is important) our town will transform into an even more amazing place to live with some cool extras.

So if you haven't already filled out your economic development survey, take the time to do so. In a way, it gives you a chance to give your town leaders some direction on where you want Princeton to be in the next five, ten or more years down the road.

The important thing to remember here is that they are asking you and I for help. The least we can do is give 'em a hand with this.

RDOS shares important tips

PREPAREDNESS FOR 2016 - WHAT'S IN STORE??

How we value water on a day-to-day basis is something we should maintain year round, not just during a drought or flood. A cultural shift is demonstrated by the choices we make in all seasons to protect and conserve water, and understand the ramifications on our property of too little or too much water.

The region came into the summer in a moisture deficit, as we experienced a drier, warmer spring than usual and the June rains did not materialize as expected. The summer drought was accentuated by the 'Blob' (static warm water off the west coast), a dry fall and building El Nino. This winter, the wet El-Nino conditions made for a deeper snow pack than expected. But, if we don't have a slow, cool spring, (which allows for slow melting), it could prompt an earlier melt (freshet), just like last year. If that happens the run-off peaks much earlier. Lakes and reservoirs fill sooner and valuable water resources flow out of the region. An early melt can cause local flooding. If warm weather persists, water reserves draw down early which might put us in the same position as last year, a drought. We need to be prepared for either opposite condition.

WHAT CAN WE DO? - MAKING THE SHIFT

Making the shift towards more efficient and conscious water use habits will help you (and the region) over the long term. Actions residents can take in their own yards in combination with what

local governments are (doing on the landscape and) at the policy level will help make the region more resilient in the future.

As a property owner:

Reconsider landscaping priorities:

- choose drought tolerant plants
- let the grass go golden - water it less frequently, but deeply
- consider changing out lawn to drought tolerant groundcovers, and/or reduce the amount of lawn

Value and steward waterways:

- keep banks and lakeshores vegetated
- refuse to use chemicals on your landscape
- keep water run-off on site to be re-used

Innovate and take pride in water efficiency measures:

- implement water collection systems like rain barrels and cisterns
- check irrigation systems for efficiencies and make upgrades
- use soil moisture sensors' or in-ground sensors

Establish an understanding about land practices and the health of our water:

- neighbour to neighbour outreach
- educate children and adults' dialogue in the public forum

DROUGHTS AND WILDFIRES - BE PREPARED

Priority Zones Around Your Home

Prolonged dry periods and droughts increase the threat of wildfire. In BC, an average of 48% of wildfires are started by humans and 52% by lightning.

Forest wildfires can spread at an alarming rate - up to 5.5 km per hour! Wind blown grass fires can move at speeds up to 8.5 km or just over 5 miles an hour.

Many of our region's residents live in or near a forested or open grassland area, and sooner or later may have to contend with a wildfire. The best protection against loss, damage, or injury to wildfire is prevention.

Get Ready - properly preparing your home (and community) is the best way to reduce the risk of wildfire damage. Some prevention measures cost very little and reduce the risk a great deal. Three ways to apply FireSmart standards are:

1. Zone 1: manage the 10 metre (33') space around your home.

Zone 1 is the first and most important priority. A good fuel free space gives you and firefighters a chance to save your home and your loved ones.

2. Zone 2: manage the 10 to 30 metres (33 - 100') from your home.

Remove fuel (combustible debris) like wood piles, refuse piles, and deadfall.

Do not place items close to the base of a tree that might give the fire a pathway to the crown of the tree.

3. Zone 3: beyond 30 metres (>100') from your home.

Manage this area by thinning and pruning thick shrubbery and mature trees. If it is a sloped area, fire can move more quickly so more precaution and wider boundaries may be needed.

The 2015 wildfires in the Oliver and Osoyoos areas show how widespread the affects can reach. The impact stretches far beyond the fire area. Entire communities, businesses and travel routes can be interrupted. Air quality (smoke) can be a major factor for health. Experienced agencies are engaged to activate Emergency Services Centres, implement evacuations, house and feed evacuees.

It is important when a wildfire threatens your home, neighbourhood or community that you understand the basics of 'alerts' vs. 'evacuation' and prepare yourself and your family. Listen to local radio and check the Regional District web site for up-to-date notices at www.rdos.bc.ca

Are You Ready For The Big One?

ground stops moving, how many of them can make it to Hope before the tidal wave blocks them? I am assuming, of course, that they will not be tied up in traffic jams. That assumption is not very realistic.

The last time the Big One hit, the tidal wave went inland nearly to Chilliwack. You need to understand the hydraulics of the Strait of Juan de Fuca during a tsunami event. The tidal wave may come in at seven meters high, but when it is pushed through the Strait, it will climb higher. That is what water does when it is pushed through a narrow space. Not only will the wave be higher, it will be stronger in force. It will be pushed by the entire Pacific Ocean into a smaller space, so it will be higher in pressure as well as in depth. It will be like turning on a gigantic fire hose to spray the Strait of Georgia. When that much water hits the coast, it will knock down buildings. You saw what happened at Fukushima.

The second effect of a tsunami occurs when it retreats: the receding sea sucks with it anything loose. Due to the bottleneck of the Strait of Juan de Fuca, the stuff sucked out does not simply go out to the Pacific in a big wave, it sloshes around, surging and retreating several times until the ocean and Georgia Strait and Puget Sound waters are all level. The erosion will be substantial, but so will the dumping of silt and debris.

A third effect of the tsunami will be flooding on the Fraser River. Anyone who has lived in Ladner knows the Fraser rises when the tide comes in. In the case of a

tsunami, the river will back up and overflow, along with all of the little tributaries.

All of that aside, we who live in the Interior will have our share of problems, and we will have to solve them ourselves. We will need to feed ourselves, and guess where our supermarkets get their supplies? Yes, they come from the big warehouses on the coast, along with head offices and branch offices.

Do not expect the government to do anything for you when the Big One hits. Look where our government offices are located. In addition to having our big corporate offices wiped out, our big government departments will be wiped out, too. If the quake actually goes as high as 9, most of our transportation and communication networks will be in trouble, too.

The federal government will help as soon as it can get organized, but in the meantime, the only government resources will be municipalities and regional districts. When the Big One hits, we may see such things as loggers moving their big equipment to clear highways of slides. We may see private helicopter companies doing the first reconnaissance of the damage. We may have to take in stranded motorists, and we may see our medical staff reduced to attend field hospitals at the coast.

The other thing we may experience is ongoing aftershocks that continue to block our highways, and delays in everything, from delivery of milk to cancellations of surgery.

The Big One will be our problem, too.

Repeated newspaper and television stories warn British Columbians we can expect The Big One any time now, the big quake, maybe 9 on the scale, and we should be ready for it. Typical of La-la Land, the government insisted on quake-proofing buildings, despite the fact the greatest danger will come from the tsunami that will hit 15 - 30 minutes after the quake. The houses in Richmond, Ladner, Oak Bay, Sechelt, and all those other coastal communities will probably withstand the quake, but not the tsunami.

Those of us who live beyond Hope tend to sit back and adopt a smug attitude because the Big One and the tsunami are coastal problems. Sorry, that just isn't so. We will be in trouble, too.

I remember laughing when the Coquihalla Highway was built in 1986 as an 'escape' route in case of the Big One. There are nearly two million people in the coastal area and, even if all of them leap into their vehicles the minute after the

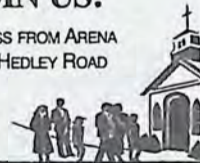

long term game plan. We know that one day our main employers will see a downturn. This we know. We know that with each generation less and less young people return home, leaving us with a bit of a conundrum. How do we as a community remain alive long term?

First we need to find ways to diversify the local economy. We need to attract new people here with nontraditional employment opportunities. This means we need to find ways to get new investment in our community in ways we have never done before. We need to find people who are willing to take a risk and move their businesses from traditional locations in populated urban centres to a rural setting. This isn't unthinkable. There are high tech businesses that are located in some of the strangest of locations, because in most cases you can work anywhere as long as you have a good internet connec-

tion, cell phone and a work space. These nontraditional industries can provide opportunities that resource communities are not accustomed to. These alternative industries also fix another problem that small communities are used to, the lack of young families moving back home after post secondary education.

Second, we as a community need to have a serious thought about what our town will look like in ten, fifteen and even twenty years down the road. Are we going to remain primarily a resource community or are we going to become something else? Are we going to become a tourist destination or a pit stop? Will we be a retirement community or will we be attracting young families? It is an important discussion we need to have. We can't think election cycle to election cycle. We need to have a real long term plan in place where we

will have a road map that will guide us into the future. This is what the Official Community Plan is supposed to do.

Communities around North America are asking the same questions. There is no silver bullet that solves all the problems that small towns face as every community is different and every community has its own identity and goals. We are not alone, and for as many communities asking the hard questions, there are just as many who have their heads in the sand, not looking at the bigger picture. As much as this is a local government issue, it is our issue too. We need to have this discussion among ourselves as well as with our elected officials.

George has been writing his 'Saving Downtown Princeton' column for some time now, and I have been writing about the issues facing the community for just as long. We need to continue this discussion, not only in the paper but with our friends, family and neighbours. We need to talk about it in the coffee shops and any place you sit and try and solve the world's problems with your friends. The world is changing around us, and although we have been here longer than most of the communities around us and always seem to adapt to the changes, it would be nice for us as a community to be ahead of the game for a change and be proactive rather than reactionary. Sometimes you don't have a choice but to be reactionary, but this time we can start to plan our future and prepare for it.

Princeton Health Care Steering Committee

March Meeting Report by Edward Staples, PHCSC

The monthly meeting of the Princeton Health Care Steering Committee (PHCSC) was held at Princeton General Hospital on March 15. The meeting was attended by representatives from the Town of Princeton, health care practitioners, Interior Health, BC Ambulance Services, and Support Our Health Care (SOHC). The meeting was chaired by Town of Princeton Councillor, Kim Maynard.

The meeting was attended by Lisa Danby, Home Health Manager with Interior Health, who gave a presentation on the wide range of services available through Home Health Services. They include Case Management, Home Care Nursing, Adult Day Services, Housing and many others. Danby explained that the "end goal is to keep people in

their homes as long as possible" with community based nurses working directly with clients to meet their individual needs. Referral is typically made through a health care provider but anyone can make a referral and self-referral is also possible. To be involved in any of the services offered by Home Health, final consent is required from the client. Services are available from 8:00 AM to 4:00 PM, Monday through Friday. More information can be received by calling the Princeton Home Health Office at 1-800-707-8550.

Kim Maynard thanked Danby for her informative presentation and Bill Sheppard, Princeton Seniors representative, expressed his appreciation for the work being done by Home Health Services. A request was made to have this information

presented at the Princeton Senior Citizens Centre in the near future.

A large portion of the meeting was spent discussing the Summary Report of the Healthcare Community Consultation held at Riverside on February 16. Edward Staples reported that Support Our Health Care (SOHC) has identified three Areas for Development found in the report on which they would like to begin work. They include the development of an information brochure outlining health and healthcare services available in our community, organization of public seminars and workshops on a variety of healthcare topics, and the coordination of healthcare volunteers throughout the community. The Steering Committee passed a motion endorsing the initiative taken by SOHC and indicated their

interest in progress made in these areas.

One of the top Areas for Development identified at the Community Consultation was the issue of wait times and the need to be attached to a primary care provider. Nurse Practitioner Tanya Ter Keurs explained that with the addition of another Family Physician, Cascade Medical Group has developed a process aimed at providing a fair and appropriate approach to attach new patients. Susan Brown explained that Interior Health is working with Cascade Medical to share information about the process with the public.

Because the Summary Report contains a large amount of important information, it was agreed that discussion on other Areas for

Development would continue at future meetings.

Lisa Danby announced the retirement of Beatrice Bibby, Princeton Public Health Nurse, and Marilyn Smyth, Home Health Nurse. Jacqueline Cimbaro, presently with Home Health, will be taking Beatrice Bibby's place. Jessica Sy and Sabrina Mill have been hired as the new Home Health nurses.

Cherie Whittaker, PGH Nursing Manager, informed the Committee that Steve Ball, X-Ray technician, has moved and taking his place will be two part time technicians, Shannon Carlsen and Jennifer Halverson. It was also announced that Dorothy Westfahl, RN at the hospital, has retired.

The next meeting of the Steering Committee is scheduled for April 19, 2016.

Anybody can do stretching exercises without following a stretching program, but there are stretching exercise programs designed to exercise every muscle in the body. They are available on video, or online by searching 'stretching exercises.'

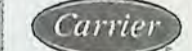

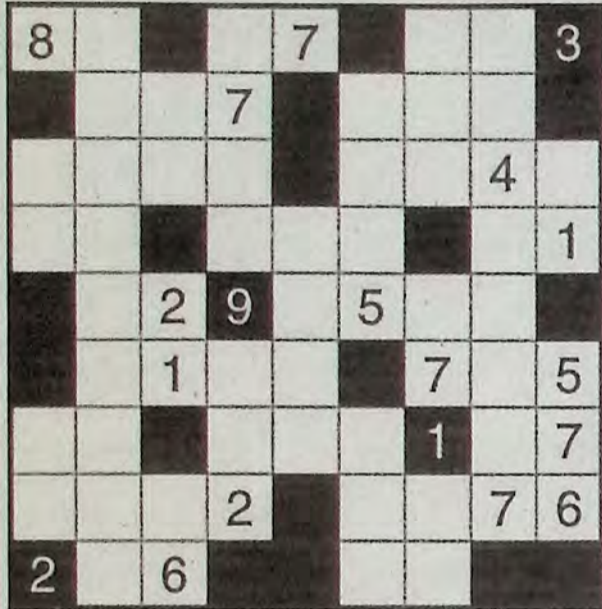

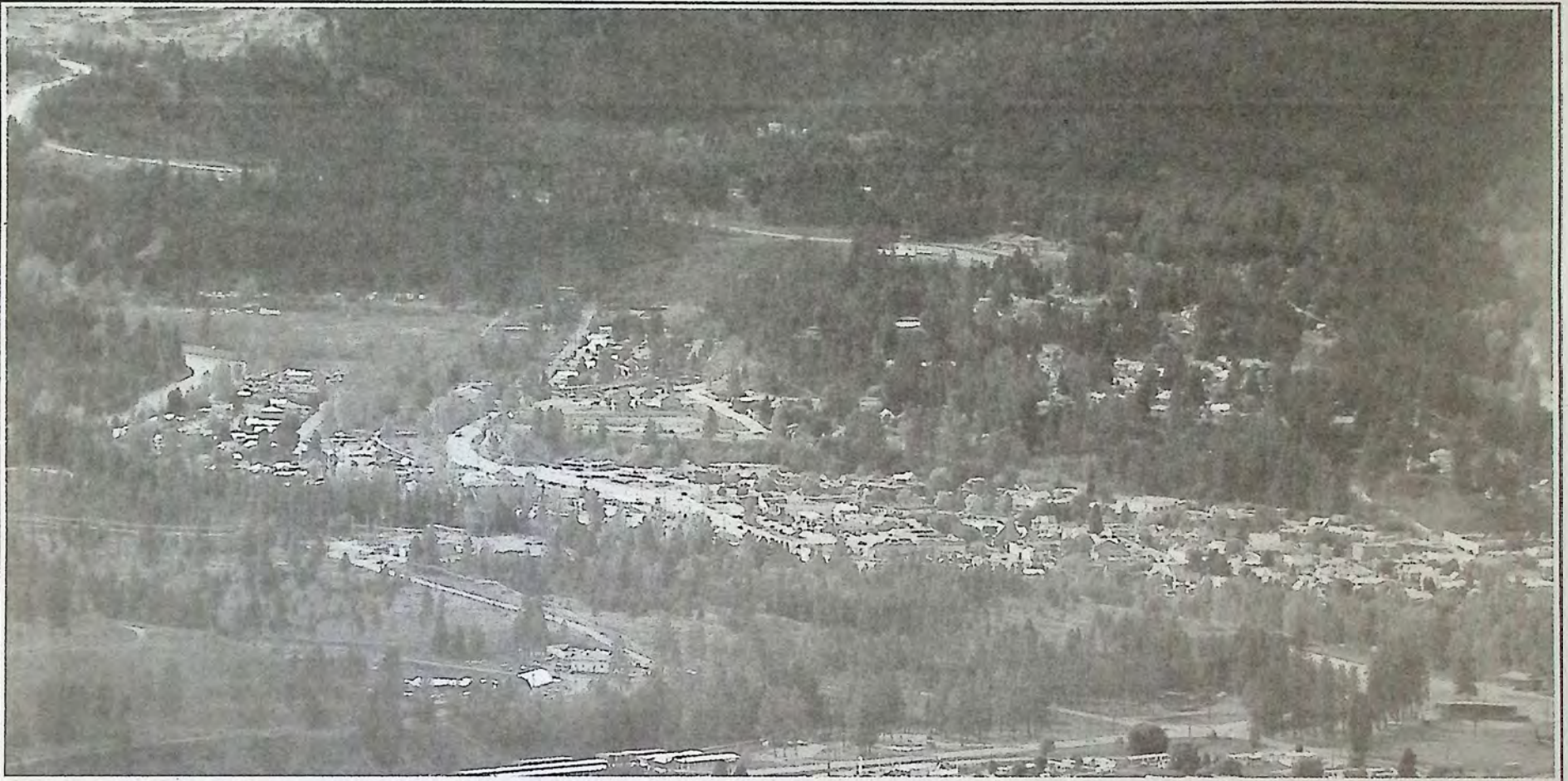

Saving Downtown Princeton...

...An Ongoing Series by George Elliott

This week I am going to look at how local celebrations can enhance business in the downtown core. First off, let's look at some of the events that have come and gone in the years since I moved here in 1986.

Princeton Lions Club used to host Snooshing Days in the winter and a Raft Race down Tulameen River. There was live horse racing at Sunflower Downs thanks to the Princeton Racing Days Association and the Fall Fair Association used to host Chariot Races, mini Chuckwagon Races

and Lawnmower Races.

Other events that have disappeared include Bill Miner Days, SnoCross Snowmobile Races and the Logger Sports Competitions and many other smaller events.

Each and every one of these activities were designed to provide entertainment for locals with the majority of them attracting visitors and participants from out of town.

Any time a community hosts a local celebration it is usually because of some kind of tourism component. The more people you attract to your community from

outside of your community, the better your chances of increasing tourist traffic to your community. Tourists visiting any town or city will spend different levels of money in that area. Often that money is spent in the retail sector of a community.

With Racing Days completely gone from the calendar of events for the future of Princeton there are other developing events that could easily fill that void as well as work in conjunction with, or possibly enhance, Fall Fair.

I'm talking about the wildly successful MotorSports Weekend that featured Mud Bog Racing and a Demolition Derby. There's also the upcoming Motocross event. This one would be new to Princeton but is not a new sporting event in the region. Motocross Racing is extremely popular and would bring a lot of new people to the area.

The potential influx of traffic resulting from MotorSports and

Motocross events at Princeton Fairgrounds could spell a huge win to the community, including downtown business.

As is the case with any kind of racing sport, you don't just see single participants involved. Each racer has family, possibly mechanics or a pit crew that handle all their gear plus the added bonus of attracting fans who follow the circuit going from town to town to catch the latest event. If an average MotorSports event attracted 100 entries and a Motocross event attracted 150 entries, multiply those numbers by four to get a conservative idea of the potential extra traffic coming to Princeton on any weekend these activities are held.

Sure, not all of them will be wandering the downtown core but some of them will. There is some science involved in getting people to your community. Even more so if it's a town that is easy to just drive past on the way to some-

where else. I sometimes look at Princeton as one of those places that people zip past on their trip to either the Coast or the Okanagan. A magnet of any kind will suck people off of Highway 3.

Community celebrations and sporting events do this in every community that has ever held any kind of special event. With MotorSports and Motocross events already drawing crowds, why not have those crowds come to Princeton for a change?

How does this save downtown Princeton?

With tourist season fast approaching, this is the time of year many downtown merchants make most of their money to get them through the slow time of the year. With attractions that bring people to town, they stand a better chance at success than just relying on tourists coming off the highway at random. Special events benefit the local economy in many, many ways.

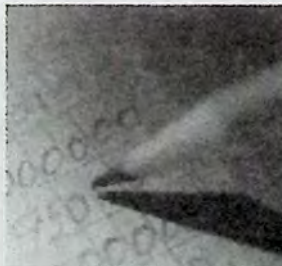
Village of Keremeos 2016 - 2020 FINANCIAL PLAN

Similkameen Valley Planning Society (SVPS) will host a presentation of the Phase 2 findings of the official Watershed Plan.

At the March 21 regular meeting of Princeton Town Council, Mayor Frank Armitage urged citizens to attend the meeting on April 13.

The Watershed Plan Phase 2 report will cover water quality, water quantity, changes over time and

water use impact on rivers and streams. A study of the Similkameen watershed was undertaken by SVPS a few years ago. The study has been ongoing. Presentations of the report will be held in both Keremeos and Princeton.

The Town of Princeton, Village of Keremeos, Regional District of Okanagan Similkameen and

Lower Similkameen Indian Band have been involved in sponsoring the study.

The next phase of the study will deal with water use for agricultural purposes, but the current report will give an assessment of water use and water quantity in terms of all uses of water in the valley. This report lays a foundation for water use in the valley.

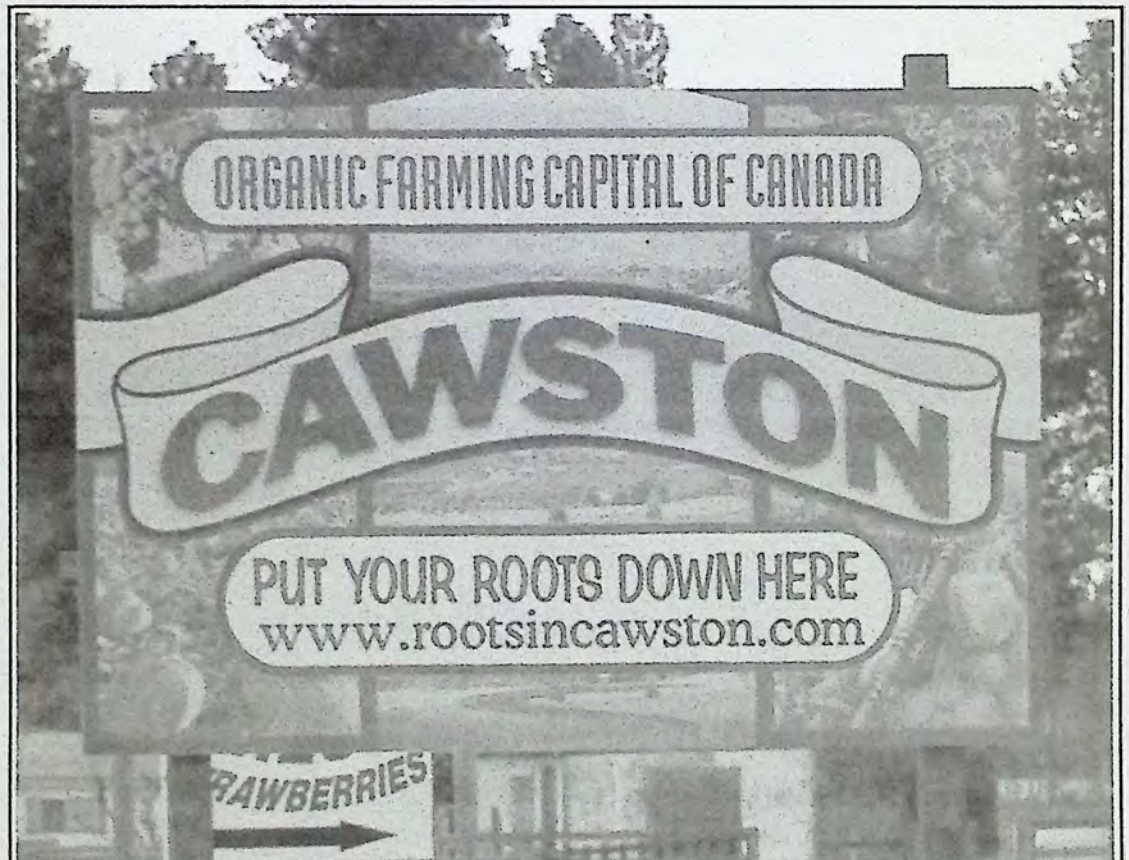

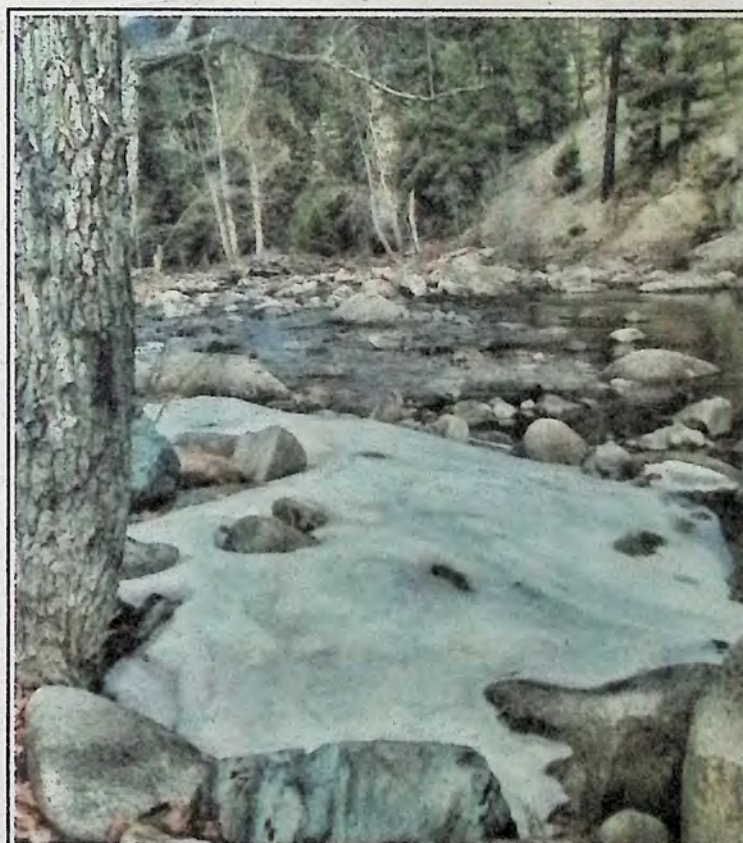
