Provincial motor vehicle crash report

Provincial Health Officer Dr. Perry Kendall released March 31st a report that examines road safety in British Columbia.

"Road safety is still a critical pub-

lic-health issue," said Kendall.

"Any preventable death or serious injury is unacceptable, including those that occur as the result of a motor vehicle crash. Though B.C.

has seen a notable two-thirds decrease in motor vehicle crash fatalities since 1996, we could still achieve lower rates of fatalities and serious injuries-especially in vulnerable road users.

"My report makes a number of evidence-based recommendations to reduce the burden of motor vehicle crashes on our health and improve road safety in British Columbia."

"Where the Rubber Meets the Road: Reducing the Impact of Motor Vehicle Crashes on Health and Well-being in BC" was developed using a wide variety of sources using the most current data available. It found that in British Columbia in 2011, more than 432,000 people were involved in a motor vehicle crash, resulting in 292 fatalities and 3,038 serious injuries.

In 2012, the province's rate for serious injuries (444.5 per 100,000 population) was slightly lower than the Canadian average (475.3 per 100,000). In the same year, British Columbia's rate for motor vehicle fatalities (6.2 per 100,000 population) was the fourth lowest in Canada and just slightly higher than the Canadian average (6.0 per 100,000); however, British Columbia's rate is still more than double the rate of the world's best performers.

Speed, impairment, and distraction were the top contributing factors recorded by police for motor vehicle crashes that resulted in fatalities in British Columbia between 2008 and 2012. Males are more likely to die from speed-related crashes than females, with the highest rates among males from age 16 to 45. Males also have the highest fatality rate from distraction-related crashes. Aboriginal people have a higher motor vehicle crash fatality rate than other residents; however, this gap has decreased over the last 20

years.

One third of fatalities in 2013 were vulnerable road users, which include pedestrians, cyclists, and motorcyclists. Among vulnerable road users, pedestrians have the highest rates of fatalities; motorcyclists have the highest rate of hospitalizations. The highest potential for collisions between vehicles and between vehicles and vulnerable road users occurs at intersections.

Rural and remote areas, and rural highways are also hazardous due to the high speeds at which vehicles travel, fewer people to identify and report crashes when they do occur, and longer distances from emergency services when medical help is needed. In fact, a comparison of British Columbia's health authorities presented in this report shows that while 15.9% of British Columbia's population live in Interior Health, 38.8% of motor vehicle fatalities occur there. Similarly, only 6.3% of the B.C. population live in the Northerncontinued on Page 6

Just A Theory

Here's a thought.

The Town of Princeton is attempting to slowly take over the operation of all of their assets. The Museum and Princeton Fairgrounds in particular. With what is being perceived, as a 'hostile takeover' is actually part of a much grander scheme from where I'm sitting.

Think about this for a moment.

The Town takes control over the Museum and then imposes a flat fee for entry of each person who uses the facility. The Town takes over the Princeton Fairgrounds and imposes a fee schedule that turns each event, activity and user into a paying customer. On the surface it may not seem completely fair but in the process of running these facilities 'as a business' there is a bigger picture.

I am convinced that the Town of Princeton is pushing towards building an aquatic centre. In order to actually make that happen I suspect Town Hall is coming up with every possible way to avoid another referendum.

The best way to sidestep that political nightmare is to build the pool yourself. The only way the Town could do that is to fatten their bank account. The most logical way to do that is to step in and start running their assets (Museum, Princeton Fairgrounds) in a manner that they generate serious cash flow.

The assets shift in revenue creation and operation, some volunteers get hurt in the process but ultimately the Town of Princeton gives us the gift of a pool that costs none of us anything. When you think about it, what a sweet deal.

As for the Town not telling us they are doing this, let's think about that for a moment or two. Suppose there was a huge news release in this paper announcing that Town Council is taking on the operation of all their assets so they can build you and me an aquatic centre without raising our taxes or going to a referendum. Would you applaud that or jump up and down and make a lot of noise?

I think that's why they aren't saying much.

While I still don't completely agree with the method they are using in this apparent 'takeover' I do see some logic in what they are doing. I am also speaking as a volunteer who did a lot at Princeton Fairgrounds. I fear that once the Town assumes responsibility for the operation of their assets, the heart and soul of what created those places will die.

But the reality here is that we aren't attracting enough young people to our community to take up the volunteer banner and keep these places alive. The volunteers who continue to be so dedicated are also getting old and tired. A change has to take place.

If the Town is doing these things to build us a pool and leaving our taxes alone in the process, then I have to say they are on to something good for the betterment of our community. If that isn't the big picture plan, then I have no idea what is going on.

Local governments could use a lot more sunshine, as in transparency

No one could be blamed for wanting to scream "go to your rooms" at some local council meetings across B.C.

Seven of eight Nanaimo city councillors want their mayor, Bill McKay, to quit. Last month, Grand Forks council went to court to force a councillor out. They lost. Greenwood residents tried it last year. Their petition was stayed by the court, but they're not deterred.

Courts should be the last refuge of citizens or councils wanting to overturn election results. Judges are reluctant to do so and it takes more than a dysfunctional personality type to persuade them otherwise.

Meanwhile in Vancouver - under the cover of darkness - council there voted themselves a 12.6 per cent pay raise this month. Add in the additional goodies - such as a \$3,048 annual supplement for extended health coverage for all, monthly supplement increases, one-time payments to councillors and parks board commissioners - and it comes to 17 per cent.

Rubbing salt into the wound, they then made it all retroactive to January 1. Try that with your boss on Monday.

In support of the move, council relied on a report from a hand-picked panel that considered the pay of six other Canadian cities and three in B.C. The panel may have cherry-picked some of the

cities to support their findings. A few like Quebec City didn't make the cut. Might not have been as helpful to the cause as Calgary was. Three councillors - George Affleck, Melissa De Genova and Andrea Reimer opposed the salary increase and lump sum payments.

A reader of this column recently wrote in: "Your article 'B.C. budget 2016 devoid of any real purpose' did not offer any solutions, but there is one universal solution - full and understandable public transparency in the budgeting process."

He drew attention to the Government Finance Officers Association's Canadian Award for Financial Reporting to Central Saanich and Oak Bay's lack of an award. He's right, but could have gone further. The problem with some councils is transparency, period.

When most communities in B.C. have more in-camera meetings than the City of Toronto, there's a problem. In Ontario, councils are entitled to go in-camera to consider six specific matters. According to the Union of B.C. Municipalities, there are four reasons that councils must go in camera and over a dozen reasons why they 'may' close a meeting.

The nuance between may and must seems to have been lost on a few. Scrubbing public question periods - as White Rock did last year - rather than finding a way to make them work is another frequent knee-jerk reaction. Fighting

freedom of information requests tooth and nail seems to be standard operating procedure at most city halls.

In February, a B.C. Supreme Court judge took the unusual step of rebuking the City of Vancouver over its handling of such requests, noting that the city could have possibly averted a "needless" 12-day defamation lawsuit. The city won the lawsuit, but in a telling move the judge didn't award the city costs.

At an International Centre for Criminal Law Reform and Criminal Justice Policy conference - Integrity in Local Governments: Mitigating the Risks of Conflict of Interest, Fraud and Corruption - Vancouver lawyer Maegen Giltrow noted: "A reticence against transparency, taken too far in municipal affairs can reach criminal conduct.


There's the "nope, not our responsibility" syndrome that stretches right up to the Minister of Community, Sport and Cultural Development Peter Fassbender. Fassbender replied to a citizen's complaint last month with: "The ministry does not intervene in the daily functions of a local government...If you believe that the town has failed to comply with provincial legislation, or has otherwise acted outside of its authority, you may wish to seek legal counsel to determine any potential remedies."

That's nice. It falls on citizens to retain legal counsel to enforce provincial legislation. Maybe one day the B.C. government will get around to fixing the Community Charter as it applies to conflict-of-interest rules, but in the meantime councillors could follow a simple one: when in doubt, step out. And if the government ever did decide to accept its constitutional responsibility over local governments, it could start by establishing province-wide policies on everything from councillor salaries to transparency.

Would save everyone a lot of grief.

Do Not Think Like A Slave

tioned by governments and churches, think of what the lack of a sense of community did to slaves. One family of five, plus an overseer, controlled 50 slaves. Fifty slaves could have overcome that family if they had been acting as a community. They did not. They competed with each other to gain favour from their masters.

One group of slaves in Jamaica in 1760 did rebel, and took to the hills. They freed themselves. This was a major blow to the economy of England. The army could have gone out to the hills and killed all the free men, but the former slave owners still needed a work force. What the plantation owners did was fall back to persuasion. They offered employment with wages, and opened a company store where employees could buy, on credit, at easy terms. Guess what? The free men became slaves again through owing money to the company store! If they did not work, they could not pay their debts, and then they could be legitimately sent to jail until somebody paid their debt.

Most of us are on to that game today, and we do not have company stores. We are now enslaved by mortgages, Mastercard and Visa, all owned by the new masters of the universe, the banking system, and by their partners, the insurance companies who dictate what we must do to protect our possessions through our monthly payments. In this sense, we are part of a large community showing almost no resistance.

We are coerced into this slavery in dozens of ways. One of the primary ways is by advertising, which is a form of propaganda. Instead of government political propaganda, advertising persuades us we need a lot of things we don't need, and works hand-in-hand with mortgage companies, Mastercard and Visa. Note that the current mortgage rate of interest is the lowest it has ever been, but Mastercard and Visa have not reduced their rates.

The recent election campaign featured promises by Justin Trudeau to bolster the middle class. In case you don't know it, 'middle class' means 'labour force,' especially unionized labour force, the kind of labour force that makes good money and supports the economy. At the same time, did the fledgling Prime Minister promise to support unions and pass laws against privatization? No, he did not, because

that would have bolstered a sense of community in the work force and reduced slave mentality. Unions are not submissive and although they make the economy stronger, they endanger the power structure of those who think they run the world.

Our slave mentality extends to how we deal with local government. We are so entrenched in slave mentality we forget we are shareholders in the Corporation of the Town of Princeton. We elect a Board of Directors called Town Council to see to the day to day operation of our corporation. When our Board of Directors decide to do something we don't like, we are supposed to go to a Council meeting and express our displeasure. Instead, most of us do not even go to the trouble of finding out when our Board of Directors meets, and we sit at home and whine about what they did. We put it on Facebook, we phone our friends, but we do not attend the meeting and tell them they are out of line, even though it is our job as shareholders to tell them how we want our corporation to function. Not only do we not do it, we act as if we are not entitled to do it, as if we would be punished for tending to our duty as shareholders. Is that behaviour not the ultimate expression of slave mentality? We submit to the people we elect even though they are supposed to be working for us.

How do we break the habit of thinking like slaves?

It is difficult, because it is ingrained in our roots. Our society emerged out of feudalism, when the lords and the kings told us what to do, and if we did not do it, we did not eat. The democratic principles we managed to achieve are constantly being undermined by the daily grind, and the daily brainwashing of government and corporate propaganda, along with some kind of social pressure that makes it seem nobody should question the way things are done.

Power at the top and submission at the bottom has been beneficial to the few and detrimental to the majority. When the majority see themselves as a community, then they threaten the power at the top. That is why we need to see ourselves as members of a community prepared to support one another in pursuit of the principles that set us free.

There are increasingly pressures in our society to make us think like slaves. Worse yet, those pressures attack us at an unconscious level, and we fall into the slave mentality without even putting up a fuss.

A slave submits, and if he does not submit, he is forced to submit or die. Few choose death. So they submit. This is the root of the slave mentality: if I choose to live, then I must submit.

We are taught submission at an early age. We are taught to submit to the rule of our parents. Most parents make the mistake of not engaging their children in decisions affecting their children's lives. Children have no choice about daycare, or going to school, and we teach them to submit to the authority of the teacher because it is for their own good. If a family is religious, the children are taught to submit, as their parents do, to the authority of the church.

I like teenagers. They still have that urge to question authority, to ask why it has to be that way, why can't it be some other way. Still, parents have to put their feet down on some matters because teenagers are not experienced enough and do not have the ability to make sound judgments in certain situations. Nevertheless, we need to let them gain experience by thinking through the pros and cons of decisions affecting their lives.

Mindless submission to authority is not part of the mentality of the average teenager, except when it comes to submission to their peers. That is not a bad thing, either, if they can be taught to question the motives of their peers and resist it.

Today's society functions in subtle ways to enforce submission to authority. Understand that every submission is one step deeper into slavery, and the slave mentality destroys community. Going back to the days of real slavery, sanc-

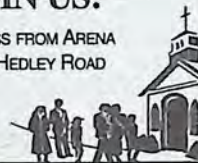

Health area but their proportion of vehicle crash fatalities is more than twice that.

There are 28 recommendations in the report that build upon British Columbia's current successes and identify specific

actions that government can take to improve road safety and reduce the rate of motor vehicle crashes, and related deaths and serious injuries.

The recommendations are focused on taking strategic and comprehensive approach to road safety in British Columbia, including safe road users (such as driver behaviours and conditions), safe speeds, safe roadways, safe vehicles, improving road safety for Aboriginals, updating education and enforcement, and expanding

research and data collection related to road safety. These recommendations endorse the B.C. Road Safety Strategy and its goal of achieving Vision Zero, with "the safest roads in North America and work toward an ultimate goal of zero traffic fatalities."

"Where the Rubber Meets the Road: Reducing the Impact of Motor Vehicle Crashes on Health and Well-being in BC" examines road safety from a combination of a population health approach, a public health approach and a safe

system approach (SSA).

The aim of an SSA is to reduce crashes through systems that recognize the inevitability of human error and that road safety is the shared responsibility of those who use the roads and those who design vehicles and road systems. An SSA is recommended by the World Health Organisation and the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development and has been adopted by several countries including Australia and New Zealand.

Summer and Tick Diseases in Our Pets

With spring starting, soon we will be finding ticks on our pets. Did you know there were multiple tick species, each with a different habitat across Canada? Or that each species carries different diseases between our pets and even from our pets to us? Recently though, climate change has changed the boundaries of our tick habitats and previously unseen tick-borne diseases are showing up in new areas. Your veterinarian keeps up to date on tick disease locations and preventatives, so if you are planning on travelling with your pets, let your veterinarian know. In some cases, there are vaccinations available so you need to allow for enough time before travelling for peak protection - at least 2 weeks post vaccination.

Tick-borne diseases in our pets are seen more often in dogs because they are usually outside more often than cats. Ticks spread these infections from one animal to another through the blood they ingest. Luckily it requires time for the tick to regurgitate the agents so infection is not instantaneous. The following list of common tick-borne diseases are seen in different areas across North America. While most are not seen in all areas, with climate change and pets travelling more, it is important to know that they are out there.

Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever

In this disease, a bacteria-like organism infects blood vessel walls in dogs, humans and cats causing bleeding, swelling and tiredness. A

tick with the rickettsiae must be attached for at least 5 hours to transmit the parasite and clinical signs are seen between 2 days and 2 weeks after infection. In severe cases, your pet can lose their legs, tail or ears. If there are neurological signs the chances of survival are poor. The only way to prevent this disease is by using tick preventatives and promptly removing any ticks.

Lyme Disease

The most common sign of Lyme disease is recurrent lameness that lasts for 3-4 days. In severe infections, kidney failure can occur. To transmit the bacteria, the tick must be attached for at least 24 hours making preventatives and prompt removal a good option to prevent. A vaccine is available as well but, like all vaccines, it requires 2 weeks to be most effective.

Tularemia

This is a bacterial disease that is spread between infected rodents, our pets and us. The disease shows up 2 to 7 days after infection as anorexia, tiredness, skin ulcers and enlarged lymph-nodes. Survival is low in the cases that you can feel the abdominal lymph-nodes. Preventing exposure to ticks and carcasses is best. There is no vaccine for our pets.

Tick Paralysis

Some ticks secrete a neurotoxin in their saliva that causes weakness and paralysis 6 to 9 days after tick attachment. In severe cases, if not treated, death can occur from an inability to breath. It is important to keep your pet quiet and calm and

take it to your veterinarian. There is no vaccine, only preventing tick exposure and promptly removing them.

A great way to preventing tick-borne diseases is by using drugs that kill ticks quickly once they latching onto our pets. There are a few options out there and each veterinarian will carry a slightly different one but all of the common ones are applied to the skin at varying intervals and the active drug is absorbed into the bloodstream. When a tick bites your dog, it ingests the drug in the blood and quickly dies before it can regurgitate, preventing the spread of the disease. Care must be taken with topical tick preventatives as there are some that are for dogs only and are fatal to cats.

A word of warning on over the counter flea and tick preparations: Many veterinarians, myself includ-

ed, have seen much more skin irritation and hair loss in these products than those available only from your veterinarian. While flea and tick collars used to be effective, they generally don't give adequate amounts of drug to work properly. Not only are the not as effective as

the skin drops but if your pet ingests them, they can be toxic.

So talk to your veterinarian about tick control and any travel plans you might have this summer and prevent some serious diseases in both yours and other pets and yourself.

When any level of Government releases an annual budget often the focus tends to be largely and understandably on what programs and projects an elected government will increase or decrease funding on. Seldom is there much of a discussion on the long term impacts of a budget on future generations of citizens. In the case of the recent Federal budget introduced by the Liberal Government last month there are a number of important questions to be asked that I believe all Canadians should be mindful of, one of them I will summarize in this report.

Recently the TD Bank issued a forecast report predicting that the cumulated debt by increased deficit spending of the Liberal

Government will reach \$150 Billion over the next five years. Astute political watchers will know this is very close to the \$154 Billion in debt that was added under the former Conservative Government before it returned to balance. This raises the question if both Governments are increasing similar amounts of debt, why is this now a concern? There are a number of reasons why I raise this issue. In the case of the former Government, this \$154 Billion in new debt was added over a 10 year period with many of those years experiencing a worldwide economic recession not seen in decades. In the case of the \$150 Billion in new debt from the Liberal Government this is being proposed in just half the number of

years (only five) and at a time when Canada is not in a recession but rather a period of slow but positive economic growth.

The question to be raised is that if Government is increasing debt during a recession and still increasing debt when not in a recession but during a period of slow economic growth and aging demographics - at what point does a Federal Government ever pay off debt?

Why is this a concern? The challenge with increasing debt is that there is ever increasing interest on that debt that must be maintained - not unlike paying the minimum balance on a credit card each month. In the case of Canada for the 2013/14 fiscal year over \$28 billion was spent just on debt servicing. To put

that number into context the total amount of health transfers from the Federal Government to the Provinces and Territories in the same fiscal year was \$32 Billion. In other words from a Federal Government perspective we spend almost as much money servicing debt as we do helping to fund healthcare. As another comparison the National Defence budget for the same fiscal year was \$21.5 billion, meaning we spend more on debt than we do on National Defence. From a percentage standpoint currently 10% of the entire federal budget is spent servicing debt and this is before another \$150 billion in new debt from the Liberal Government is added.

Some view Government debt as being solely an ideological or partisan concern. The intent of this week's report is to illustrate that increasing debt imposes real costs that must be paid. Ultimately as debt and interest on debt increases so will the debt servicing costs and money that could otherwise be spent funding more important government programs or services is

instead diverted towards debt servicing. The fact that fiscal capacity is being lost to debt is seldom a focal point in budgetary discussion however it is an increasing problem that future generations of Canadians will be left to deal with.

From my perspective few citizens raise the concern of increasing Government debt and my primary purpose in raising this topic is to ask citizens if debt and having a balanced budget are concerns you view as important. Obviously increasing spending is far easier for elected officials to do than to decrease spending however at some point fiscal capacity will be diminished to the extent that future generations will have serious problems, particularly with our aging demographics, a topic I will cover in a future report. More so as most Canadian Provinces are also heavily in debt and some taxpayers are now paying in excess of 50% in combined income taxes not counting consumption taxes. 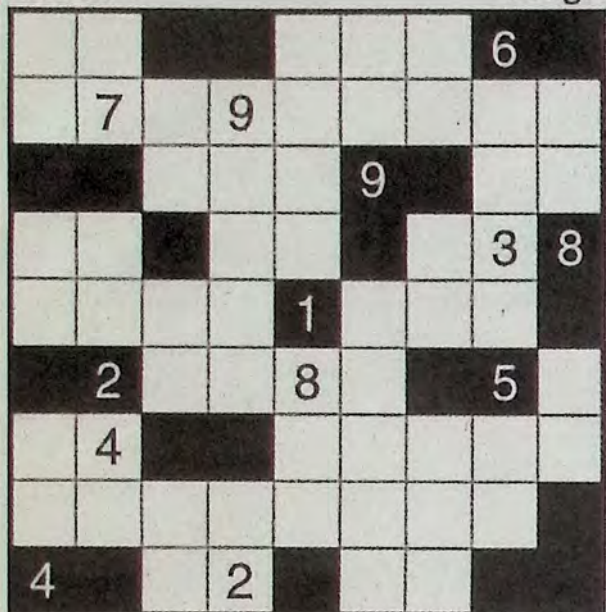

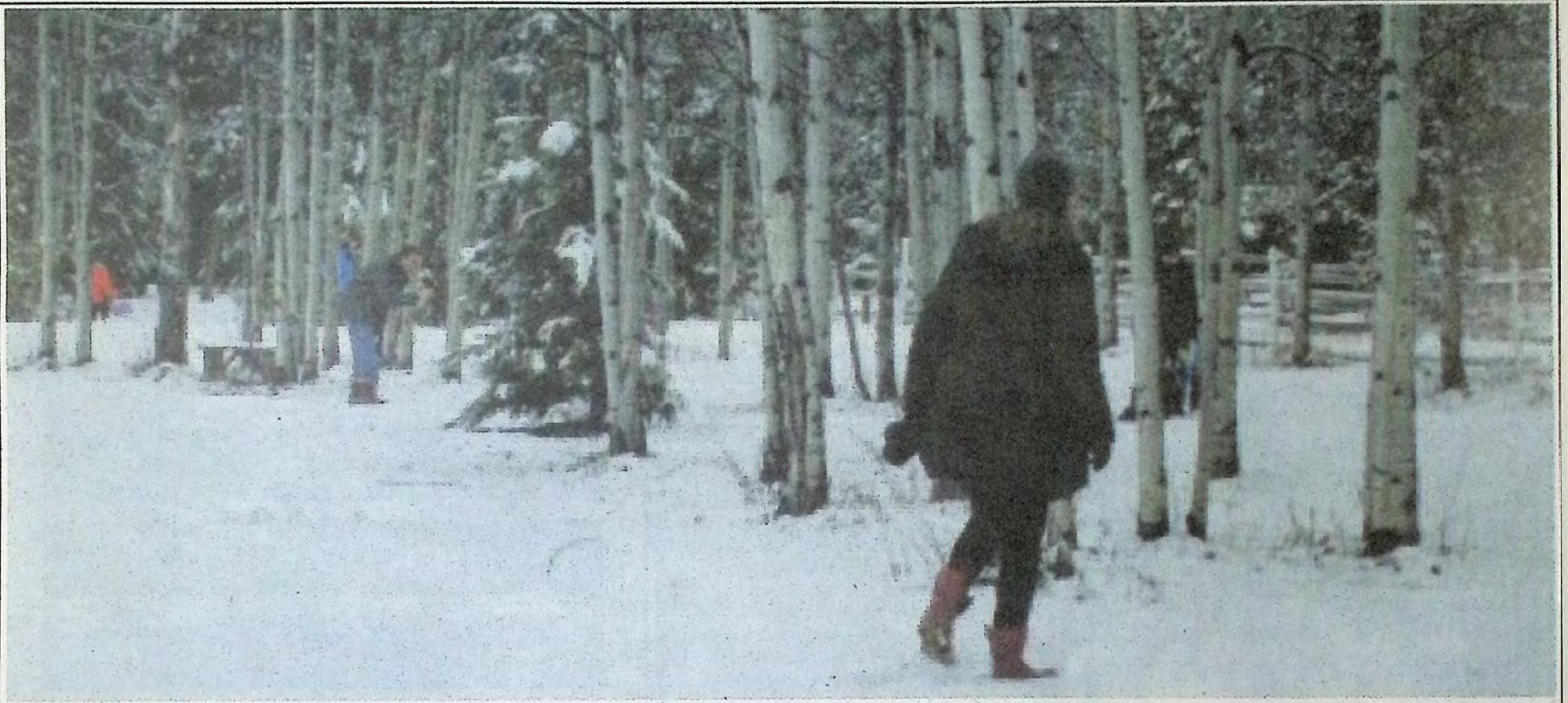

BC Parks and Forest Fire Hazards

The opening of the BC Parks reservation system a couple weeks ago has started the unofficial countdown to summer in the Similkameen. Residents are looking forward to long, warm summer days spent exploring our beautiful region. However, the arrival of spring and summer also means the

arrival of wildfire season.

Wildfires pose a significant threat to communities, natural resources and infrastructure. Firefighting efforts in our province cost taxpayers millions of dollars per year - the 2015 fire season was one of the busiest and most expensive in recent years, with more than \$278

million spent on wildfire management.

You might be surprised to learn that between 30 and 40 per cent of wildfires in our province are human-caused. Careless actions such as throwing cigarette butts out the car window or leaving a campfire unattended can cause large-scale destruction. This is simply unacceptable.

Our government promised British Columbians that we would enact tougher penalties to discourage irresponsible behaviour that contributes to increased wildfire risks. We are delivering on that promise by enacting some of the

largest wildfire-related violation ticket fines in the country.

Legislative changes will result in increased fines for 19 violations under the Wildfire Act, as well as seven violations under Wildfire Regulation. The fine for failing to comply with a fire restriction under the Wildfire Act has more than tripled - from \$345 to \$1,150.

We have increased penalties for those who get in the way of firefighting efforts to ensure that our hardworking firefighters are able to respond to wildfires effectively. The new regulations make it clear that interference does not have to be intentional to be against the law.

In addition, failing to comply with a stop-work order could result in a penalty of up to \$100,000 and/or jail time of up to one year.

It's important to know that you can report a wildfire, abandoned campfire or open-burning violation by calling 1-800-663-5555 toll-free, or dial *5555 on a cell-phone.

Wildfire prevention is everyone's responsibility. This spring and summer, I strongly urge everyone to do their part in eliminating potential wildfire threats. Together, let's keep our forests and communities safe.

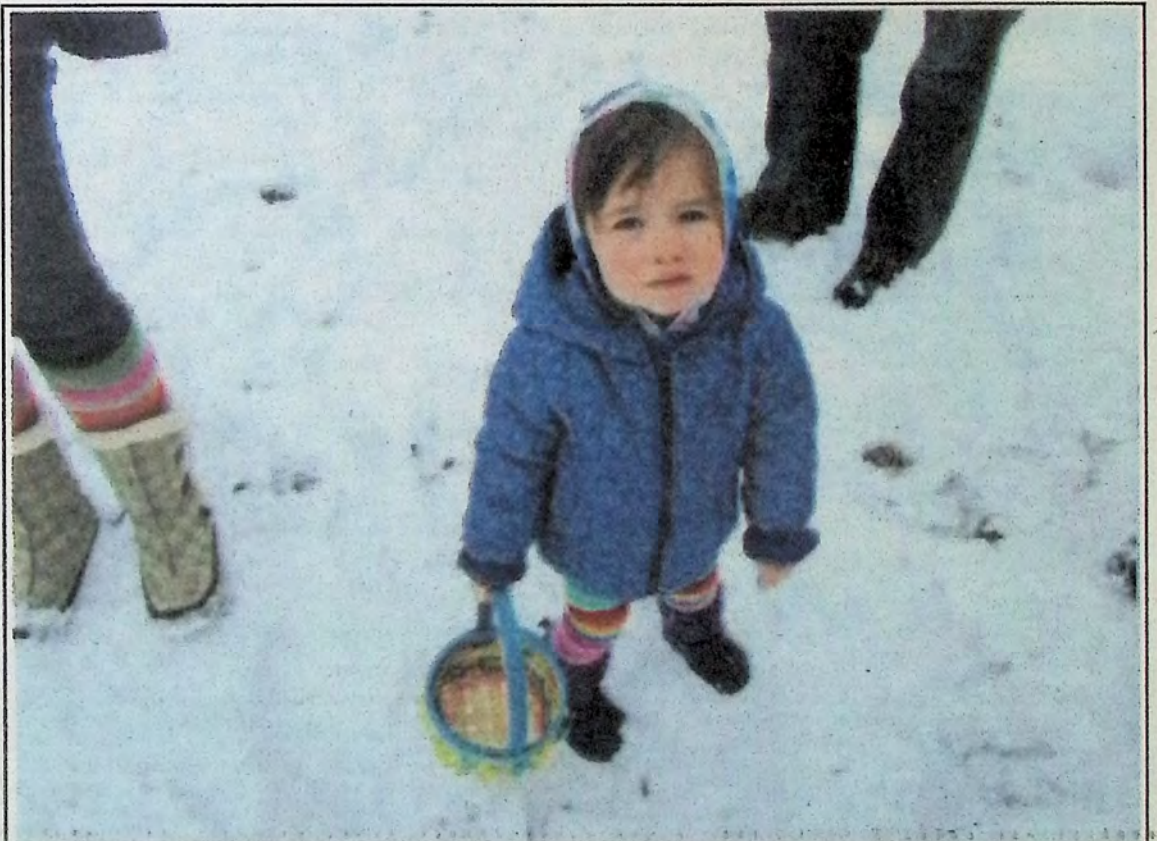

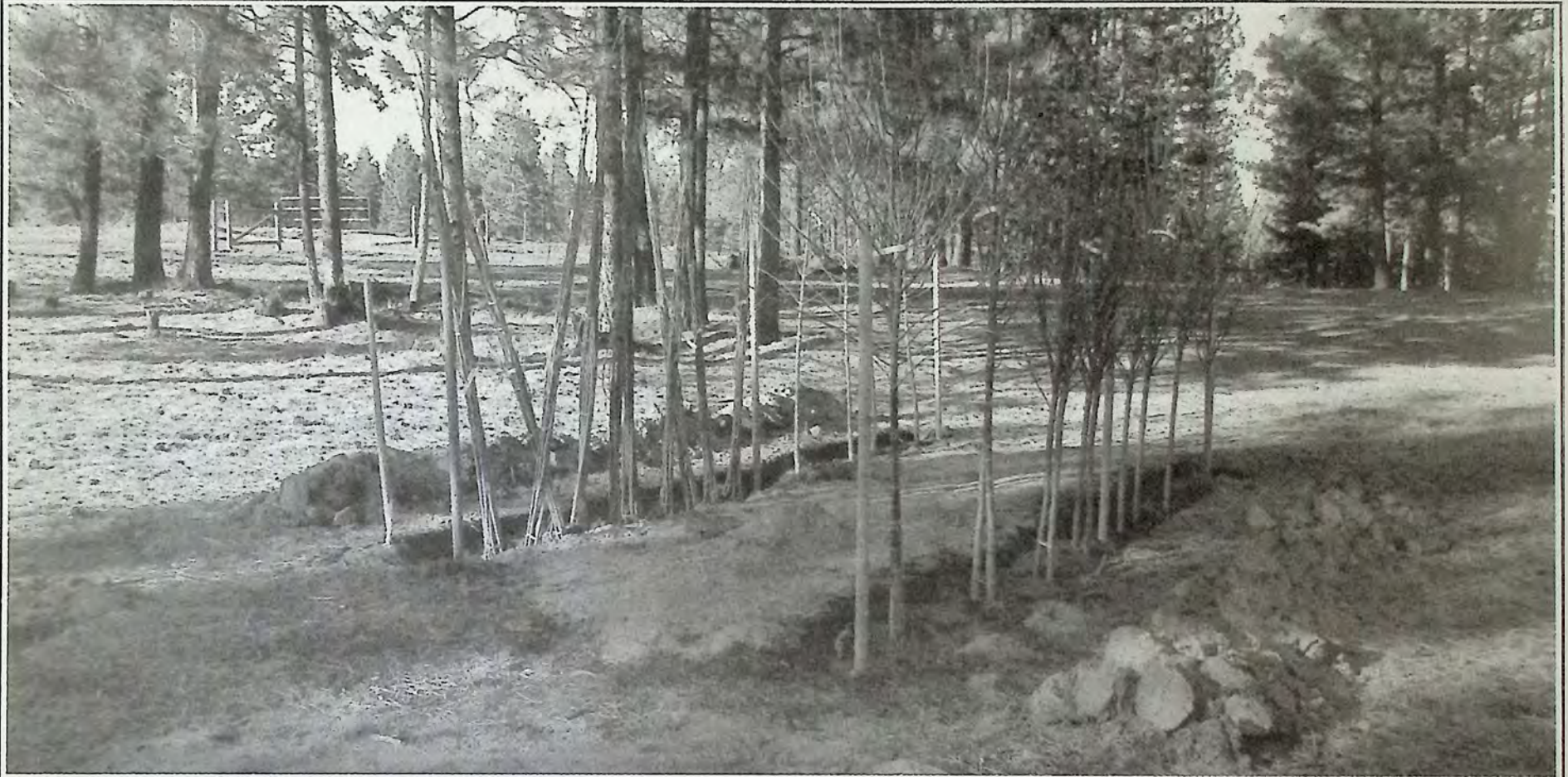

Saving Downtown Princeton...

...An Ongoing Series by George Elliott

Mother Nature did a great job of destroying trees in and around the Southern Interior of British Columbia a couple winters ago. It also was when the beautiful trees lining Bridge Street and Vermilion Avenue were smashed. Some were trimmed down in a temporary measure and others were completely removed once the weather improved with plans to eventually replace them.

Well, you have read here often about how I feel about local volun-

teers and the many contributions they make to this community. Princeton Rotary Club stepped up this time around and, with consultation with the local Garden Club and Town of Princeton, accessed some impressive replacement trees last week from Grand Forks. Rotary Club volunteers went to Grand Forks to pick them up and brought them back to Princeton where they were temporarily planted in a 'top secret' location prior to the Town of Princeton replanting

them downtown.

It's not unusual for a local non-profit group to take on a project like this in our community but when I think that this was a job that the Rotary Club took on, it impresses me even more. Let me tell you why.

I spent five years as the Secretary of the local Rotary Club (2005-2009) and at the time there were in the neighbourhood of between 15 and 20 members. I was in my 40s when I joined and I was not the youngest member, there were two others who were within months of my age. The average age of the membership was pushing 50-something with active members well into their 70s. I suspect the

demographics of the group have not changed much from that point.

I was part of the Board when the first WineFest was held and as you know, it has become a regular fixture in the annual Princeton Calendar of Events. It does not surprise me at all that the group continues to make an impact within their community. The majority of members probably don't even live within town boundaries but they see the value in doing things for the community they serve.

This is essentially what all local community groups do. They have 'pet projects' that are often larger in scope but also put much of their fundraising revenue back into the community. This takes a lot of

pressure off of the taxpayer as I would hate to imagine what those new trees would have cost if the Town of Princeton ended up purchasing them for you and I.

That's the big thing about volunteer organizations. They want to make our town a great place for us to live and spend time. While this often comes in the form of hosting a local celebration of some kind, there are other little things these groups do that are done quietly out of their service to us all.

How does this save downtown Princeton?

The majority of 'service actions' provided by non-profit organizations or volunteers in our community that are aimed at the downtown core fall until the category of beautification projects.

Any form of beautification that takes place downtown - including the replanting of damaged trees - benefits not only the retail core, it benefits the community as a whole.

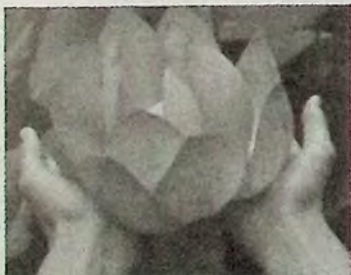
