Work is underway at Memorial Park in two locations. The ball diamonds will be improved, and the picnic area near Centennial Pool will have more picnic tables and playground equipment. The beach volleyball pit will be 'refreshed.' A new feature will be appreciated by people picnicking in the area: a 'cool off' water spray will be added. The Centennial Pool park area

offers access to the Similkameen River, which is a popular advantage enjoyed during the summer months when the river is low. It is a great spot for a family picnic.

## CMIMC receives mining award

## Town decides tax rate

At the April 18 Town Council meeting, the 2016 tax rate bylaw was given three readings. This bylaw followed the adoption of the Town of Princeton five year Financial Plan.

The Town of Princeton tax rates bylaw includes the tax rates for the town, Okanagan Regional Library, Regional Hospital District and

Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen.

This year's tax rate total for the average home, in dollars, will be \$28 higher than last year, at around \$740 for an assessed value of around \$180,000. Business taxes will be slightly lower this year.

The actual tax bill sent out to

property owners will be higher than the amounts calculated for the Town.

The total tax bill will include property taxes for education, policing, Municipal Finance Authority and BC Assessment Authority.

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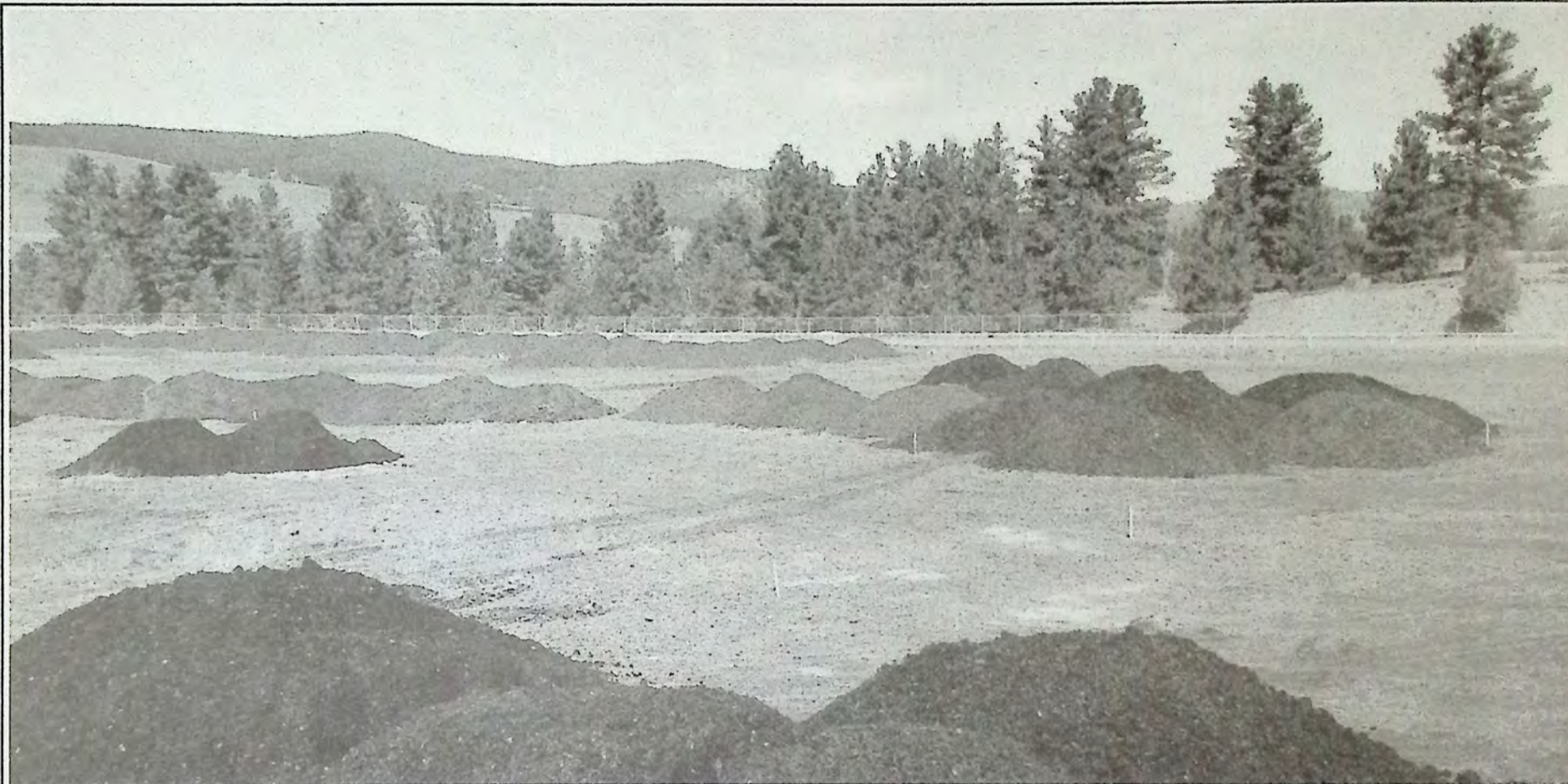

# Princeton fairgrounds sees plenty of action

There is plenty going on this month at Princeton's exhibition grounds. Spring is always a busy time for Princeton Exhibition Association (PXA), but this spring is filled with action. At the April 19 PXA meet-

ing, President Paul Bedard reported the many activities taking place this month.

Tons of soil were delivered to the grounds courtesy of Weyerhaeuser.

This is being used to build the

Motocross track. The Town has hired a contractor to do renovations on the grandstand and work has begun. Work is in progress in the concession, improving convenience and safety. Work has begun on the tool crib to make it more efficient.

Last weekend, barns were power washed in preparation for painting.

Work parties will take place April 30, May 7 and May 14 and 15 as various groups work on a variety of projects, including cleaning the grounds. Repairs to the pens will be

one of the projects.

May 14 and 15, Princeton Riding Club hosts a horse show. On May 27, 28 and 29, Back Country Horsemen hold a Rendezvous to celebrate the 25th anniversary of the founding of their association. Members of the group are working with Paul Bedard on barns and pens.

On June 11 and 12, the annual rodeo will take place. Sometime in June, an information session on toxic weeds will be held at the grounds. The public will be invited.

A team roping event was discussed as a possible June event, but the PXA has not received a proposal from the Rodeo Club in regard to the event.

When the initial round of work and events is done, work will begin on renovating the livestock display area used by the Fall Fair Association. This will include removal of false fronts, for safety reasons, and the construction of a new fence so animals can be brought from their pens and shown more effectively.

Work parties will continue until November 1.



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## Town Council news

### Violation

A residence located at 475 Similkameen Avenue is the subject of an injunction resulting from a violation of Building Bylaw 751, 2003. A Section 57 notice on title will be filed.

### Mural approval

The Town of Princeton has approved an Arts Council project which will see a mural painted on the wall of Home Hardware. The mural will be painted this year.

### OCP and zoning change

A property located at 600 Similkameen Avenue will be the subject of a hearing to be held 6:30 PM on Monday, May 2 at the library. The owner, White Pine

Holdings, has asked for a change to the zoning of the building from light residential to business transition. Town Council has requested cosmetic upgrades to the property as conditions for approval of the change.

### Host a dinner

Town Council has agreed to co-host a dinner for a group called the Healthcare Traveling Roadshow which is coming to Princeton on May 17 and 18. The Roadshow is a program in which students from UNBC, UBC and CNC travel to rural communities to explore career opportunities, and while in the community the university students .....continued on Page 6

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# Flip Of The Coyne

The Town is going to be holding a Tourism Trade Show in May. It will be an opportunity for businesses to get to know what there is to offer here in Princeton and how to be community ambassadors. This is a great idea. I have been saying for years that we need to do something to get everyone on the same page to sell Princeton to anyone who stops in our community. This got me thinking back to the early 2000s when I was on Council and about some of the work we were doing with the Similkameen Valley Planning Society.

Back then we had all kinds of Bed and Breakfasts spread across the district. We had people offering tours in different areas from Tulameen to Chain Lake. Although most of the operations were based within Area H, the Town saw at that time the Chamber of Commerce's Tourism Information Centre as the hub that would inform travelers of all the great things to do while in our end of the Valley. With our partners in the Similkameen Valley Planning Society, we were working together to create a valley wide marketing tool that would not only sell the great things to do in

Princeton as well as from Manning Park all the way down to the US border. We were looking at tourism not only as a Princeton thing, but a regional opportunity that would benefit all of the communities within the valley especially Princeton.

Being the largest community in the Similkameen, we envisioned Princeton being the main hub for day trips, fishing trips, and countless other adventures that would see people exploring all that the Similkameen had to offer. Through the Chamber and the Similkameen Valley Planning Society's model of cooperation, we saw not only the Town of Princeton as well as the Upper Similkameen Indian Band

and the Area H director working towards this goal. Through this model of cooperation we saw the Upper and Lower Valley both get new community forest licenses. We had made plans for tourism development where the USIB was interested in creating a RV Park down by the Chamber Building beside the river, an interpretation centre, and we saw it all being tied in with a walking bridge across the river to what is now called the Two Rivers Park. Unfortunately at the time we were unable to get the needed funding to move forward, but to us that didn't mean the idea was dead in the water.

Over time things change.

.....continued from Front Page from Allison Flats to the wooden bridge, a pathway dating back far into the past century. It was privately owned land until last year when it was purchased by the Town to keep the pathway open in perpetuity. The site includes river dyke walking space.

Phase one of the development of this new park will involve cutting

brush overhanging the path, identifying legal boundaries and leveling the site. Phase two will see underground water lines for irrigation, paving the pathway, planting shade trees, installation of benches and basic landscaping work. The next two phases will lead to a play features for children and an outdoor fitness area for adults, but these phases are not yet funded.

Administrations change, and with that agendas changed. What made me think of all this is talking about economic and tourism development, we can't do this on our own. We need to work regionally to develop our tourism market. Sadly a lot of those operators who were

here back in the early 2000's are no longer around, and I personally feel that the focus on tourism development took a back seat to other plans. I am glad to see there is some sort of plan by the Town to at least start talking about tourism again.

Due to the warm weather, early spring melt, and increased number of complaints, the RDOS Mosquito Control Program has started earlier than usual this year. If you reside in the RDOS Electoral Areas or municipalities listed below, and have areas of standing water bodies too large to drain on your own, call: RDOS Mosquito Control Program: 1-877-610-3737 x 4142 or 250-490-4142

Electoral Areas: 'A', 'B', 'C', 'D', 'F', 'G', and 'H' as well as the City of Penticton, District of Summerland, and Towns of Oliver and Osoyoos

At your home be sure to mend screens and reduce sources of standing water on your property. Clean and unclog eaves-troughs, gutters and remove water from any depressions on your roof or driveway.

Remove standing water from yard items such as tires, plant pots, small troughs, pool covers, rain barrels, tarps and wading pools. Look around your property for anything that can hold water for 72 hours or more will provide an excellent habitat for mosquitoes.

### Important Information for Owners of Fruit Bearing Trees or Shrubs



Since 2001, to protect the commercial fruit industry, the RDOS has had a Bylaw in effect to better control pests that attack tree fruits and/or berries in Electoral Areas: 'A', 'B', 'C', 'D', 'F', 'G' and the Town of Oliver. This Bylaw has recently been updated to include new species and emerging threats. All owners or residents with fruit bearing plant material that reside in the areas covered by this Bylaw should refer to Bylaw 2711, 2015 to review the requirements and schedule of pests.

Local nursery staff can be very helpful in assisting residents with products and information to reduce the risk of tree fruit pests from infesting their fruit. Some of the common and destructive pests are the Western Cherry Fruit Fly and the Spotted Wing Drosophila (which can affect all soft fruits and berries).

The RDOS has dedicated staff members to follow up on complaints of possible pest infestations.

## Fraser-Nicola grants fight invasive plants

The provincial government is providing a combined \$275,300 to five regional organizations to help control the spread of invasive plants, Fraser-Nicola MLA Jackie Tegart announced April 22nd.

*Southern Interior Weed Management Committee:*

\$130,000

*Thompson-Nicola Regional District:*

\$20,000

*Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen:*

\$12,500

*Okanagan and Similkameen Invasive Species Society:*

\$71,300

*Lillooet Regional Invasive Species*

*Society:*

\$41,500

These are five of 31 grants, totalling \$1.727 million, being distributed throughout the province in 2016 to local governments, regional invasive species committees and the Invasive Species Council of B.C. This funding will assist with these groups' ongoing activities and also support the objectives of the provincial Invasive Plant Program.

"Controlling invasive plants is just one example of how our government is investing in the future of the Fraser-Nicola region," Tegart said.

"Our communities and economy

rely heavily on ranching and agriculture, so it's important that these invasive species are not allowed to become established."

The grants will be used to help raise public awareness of invasive plant concerns, survey invasive plant populations and actively treat high-priority sites to control the spread of these destructive plants.

Invasive plants are species that have been introduced into British Columbia from other areas. They displace native vegetation and can cause considerable economic and environmental damage. Some pose a health risk to people (e.g. skin irritation). Invasive plants can

## Just How Stupid Are We?

The discovery of a human bone in Siberia has led to the discovery of another species of human in addition to so-called 'modern' man. Thanks to DNA, we have had to adjust our thinking to, first, all of us originated in Africa, and second, the majority of us are the result of interbreeding with Neanderthals. As we now know, Neanderthals did not disappear, they merely interbred with the rest and are part of our DNA.

Now there is a new group discovered, and they are part of most of us, too.

In a cave in Siberia, there was a species of human science has called Denisovans (pronounced Deh-NEE-so-vans). They occupied the cave with Neanderthals, with whom they interbred, and there is evidence from a cave in Spain that the Denisovans were there, too, along with the Neanderthals. Both these species interbred with modern human species, and all of us who are descended from those who left Africa are made up of these three

species.

DNA from a 400,000 year old hominid femur showed the Denisovans probably predated the Neanderthals. However, this DNA, like the Neanderthal DNA, appears to have existed as an add-on after the first people left Africa. We are told, by Richard Leakey, that humans left Africa around 70,000 years ago. This leads us to the conclusion there were two other species of humans outside Africa, which seems to contradict the idea that all of us came out of Africa. Conversely, if all of us came out of Africa, then there must have been Denisovans and Neanderthals in Africa to begin with.

Today, Denisovan DNA is a higher percentage in native people living in Melanesia and Australia, but it is prevalent in native people of two places in Canada, and across the American southwest and Mexico, as well as throughout Europe and Asia. The Denisovan bone, from the cave in Siberia, dates back 41,000 years. So, 41,000 years ago, Neanderthals and Denisovans lived together in a cave in Siberia. That does not tell us much about who they were and what they looked like.

There is a scientific reluctance to refer to Neanderthals and Denisovans as 'human.' They are called 'hominid,' or "some sort of human type." We know from scientists creating a likeness, based on DNA, of what a Neanderthal looked like. The individual from which the DNA came was short and stocky, heavily muscled and fleshy. He had light brown skin and black hair, but carried the

genes for red hair. At this point, there is no doubt he was human. I would guess the Denisovan was human, too.

Think about this whole picture: these humans had come out of Africa and had traveled thousands of miles, braved the elements and the dangers, adapted to diverse landscapes and climatic conditions. They had to have been adventurers, brave people who survived and adapted. They must have been highly cooperative, because it would have taken a group in order to survive. The bone found in Siberia was juvenile, so they must have lived as a family group, which implies caring for one another. Although they found shelter in a cave, or at least died in a cave, we do not know how they lived. All we know is they traveled far and wide and left their DNA nearly every place on earth.

These are our ancestors. Their descendants went on to create empires, magnificent structures, advanced agricultural techniques, arts and crafts of every kind. Our ancestors were not stupid, bumbling creatures, or they would not have survived. Yet we, their descendants, are far more stupid than they were. We have wars, and we threaten each other with weapons that could kill every last thing on earth. We pollute our planet every day in ways which, if we do not stop, will kill every living thing on earth.

Just how stupid are we? Our ancient ancestors managed to survive everything, even the great flood that devastated every continent on earth, and they rebuilt, passed on their knowledge, and contaminated their skills with making war on each other, but nothing like what we are doing today.

We need a new vision of reality, one that shows we are intelligent enough to keep on surviving on this planet, despite what the planet throws at us. We need to see ourselves in terms of our ancient ancestors, who braved everything and managed to go on. Our key to survival is not only the intelligence and adaptability of our species, but the adventurous spirit, the ability to cooperate and accept others as humans like us, and the ability to care for one another.

Purpose of Repair/Improvement:

Repair major leak(s)

Scope and Details of Repair/Improvement:

The 6-inch water supply line, which runs at a steep angle from the elevation of Highway 3 along a bank down toward the Similkameen River, was found to be leaking badly (as reported by a Princeton resident during a morning walk in the area of the leak) and was subsequently repaired by the Town Public Works Crew.

Approximately 110 feet of new

water line was installed. The installation included a proper sand base for the new piping and a new isolation valve which will provide for better service options to area properties in the future.

Contracted excavator service and Town of Princeton Public Works Crew completed this work by end of day Friday April 8, 2016.

It was determined that the most likely cause of the damage to the section of leaking pipe was improper bedding of the line on the incline during initial installation.

This work should be considered an improvement to the town water system as the materials used have a life expectancy of 50+ years.

1-inch Town of Princeton water service line to commercial property.

Purpose of Repair/Improvement:

To replace failed (leaking) Town of Princeton waterline serving private commercial property, located on the corner of Bridge Street and Highway 5A that runs across Highway 5A from Town main supply line that runs parallel along Highway 5A.

Scope and Details of Repair/Improvement:

This water line is located under Highway 5A at the intersection of Bridge Street and Highway 5A and runs across Highway 5A from

Town main supply line that runs parallel along Highway 5A to the served property. The work requires excavation across Highway 5A requiring formal arrangements with the MOT, contracting of traffic control services, and Town of Princeton Public Works Dept. performing the work.

The water line is leaking from the connection point at the main supply line and will be corrected by replacing the entire line from connection at the main supply line to the shut off located at the served property.

Town of Princeton Public Works Crew commenced this work on Tuesday April 19, 2016 and com-

pleted this work by end of day Wednesday April 21, 2016 and included the patching of the road.

To mitigate traffic pattern interruption/inconvenience at this intersection southbound traffic on Bridge Street was re-routed via Vermillion Avenue to Highway 3 by using barricades and signage to direct traffic flow. Motorists can access further information regarding this and other traffic pattern interruptions by contacting Drive BC.

also disrupt natural ecosystems, reduce biodiversity, increase soil erosion, alter soil chemistry and adversely affect commercial crops.

This funding is in addition to the \$935,000 already allocated by the Ministry of Forests, Lands, and Natural Resource Operations for invasive plant control and management in 2016-17.

### Quick Facts:

The provincial Invasive Plant Program identifies sites where new invasive plant species have been found and responds rapidly to contain and eradicate them before they become established and start spreading. Currently, some of the targeted invasive plant species in B.C. are

marsh plume thistle, European common reed, garlic mustard, knotweed, Spartina, orange and yellow (non-native) hawkweeds, knapweed, giant hogweed, blueweed, common tansy, tansy ragwort, hoary alyssum, field scabious, leafy spurge, purple loosestrife, yellow flag iris, Himalayan balsam and Scotch broom.

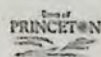

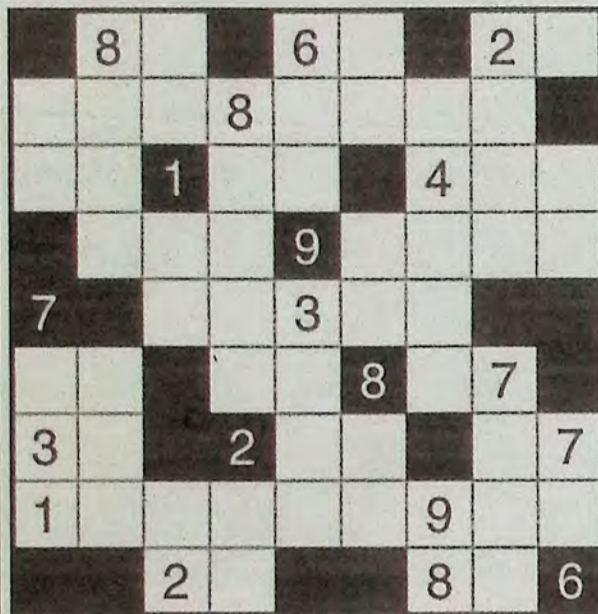

We observed 20+ species, among them Wood Ducks, Cliff Swallows, Eurasian Collared Doves, a Belted Kingfisher and California Quail, while one of our

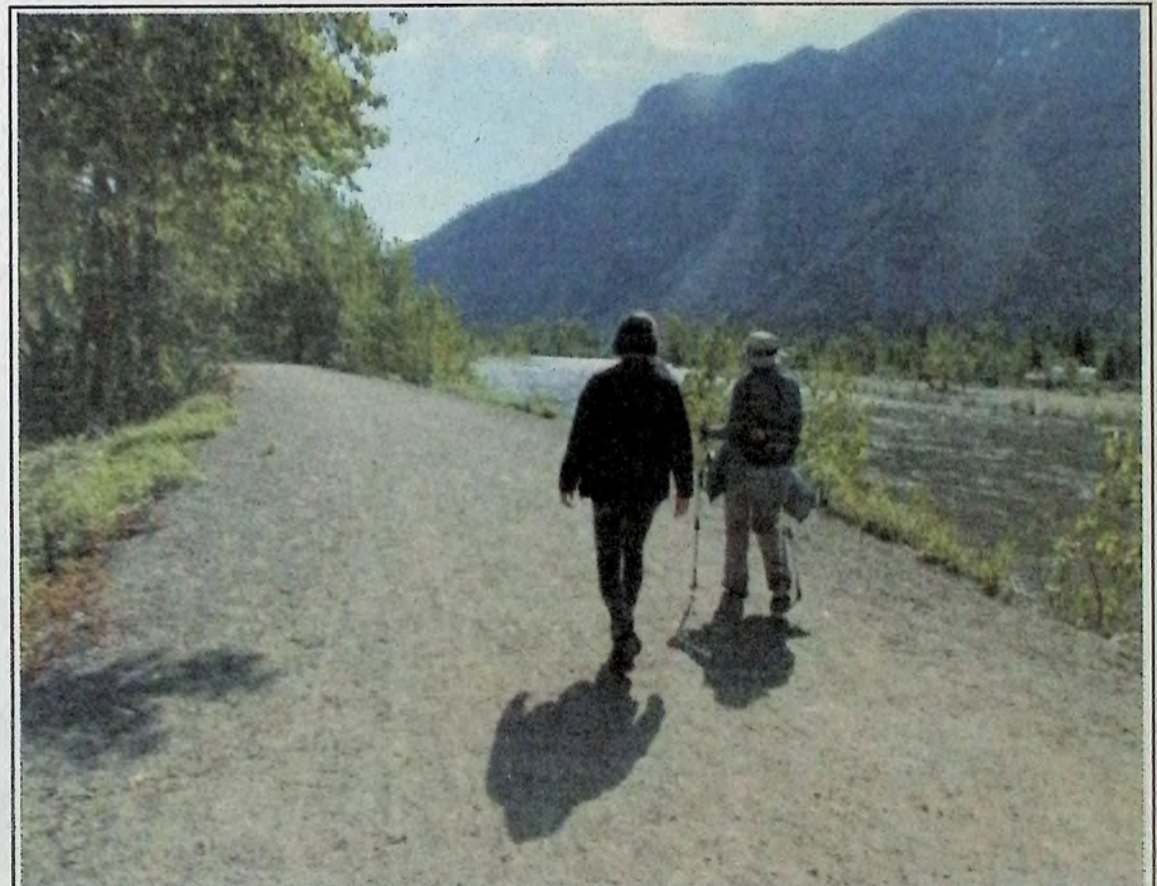
avid birders spotted 3 flocks of Sandhill Cranes flying overhead!

Once into Keremeos we walkers continued along the river dyke, and met up with the cyclists at Pine Park (which we had to ourselves), where we relaxed and enjoyed our lunches. Once again we parted as each group headed back, somehow managing to arrive at our vehicles at approximately the same time! The walk was just under 10 kilometres, whereas the cyclists incorporated some of the village's quiet side roads in their extended 'Tour de Keremeos.'

bined outing with visiting field naturalists from Langley, a birding expedition that will be led by Tip Anderson and take place at Wolfe Lake on Saturday, May 7th. We will meet at Billy's Restaurant parking lot at 9:00 AM with food and drink.

# Saving Downtown Princeton...

What does the high school Family Fair have to do with downtown business?

Well, quite a bit actually.

Princeton Secondary School's 2016 Grad Class hosted the 56th annual Family Fair last week. The Family Fair has been a local tradition that was originally started as a fundraiser by the school PTA. Over the years it shifted to the responsibility of the graduating class.

Although the event runs for just a

couple of hours during one afternoon, it generates a great deal of revenue, which is turned into bursaries for Grade 12 students. The bursaries, along with other scholarships and bursaries, are all presented during the PSS graduation ceremonies. These monetary awards help local students with costs associated with post-secondary school education. I would suspect for many of the students who receive these bursaries that they make the difference on whether or not post

secondary school will be pursued.

I did not receive a single bursary in my graduating class and my parents were what I would call lower-middle class so post secondary school was way off the chart for me. It meant entering the workforce right out of high school with the hopes of finding a rewarding career path without the added bonus of extra education.

Today's world is very different to the one I encountered as a member of the KLO Secondary School Grad Class of 1978 in Kelowna. There were several job options in my hometown.

As that is not exactly the case in Princeton, many grads will end up leaving the Similkameen and very few will ever return. I can count on

one hand the number of former PSS graduates I know who have left Princeton and come back. The number is even smaller of those who came back and started businesses in the community.

I really think there is a serious 'missing link' between graduation and starting a business in Princeton. The more entrepreneurs we have in the downtown core would enhance the shopping and service selection for the rest of us. The more entrepreneurs attracted to downtown Princeton would create additional jobs and perhaps encourage other future PSS Grads to consider the benefits of setting up a business in a small town.

The Family Fair does carry that message, although it is subliminal

at best. All the revenue collected from the single afternoon event comes from within the community. It comes from students' neighbours, friends and family members as well as residents and business owners who have no family tie to any of the students. We all support it, year after year, because we believe in the young people coming out of our high school. We want them to look back one day and think fondly of Princeton as the place that helped them move on instead of the place they couldn't wait to get out of in order to move on.

There's a lot of compassion built into this 'donating to students' concept of Family Fair but it doesn't end there. Princeton and area residents rushed to the aid of locals who lost belongings in a downtown house fire last week. Nobody really cares what the circumstances were around the fire because the main thing was to make sure everyone

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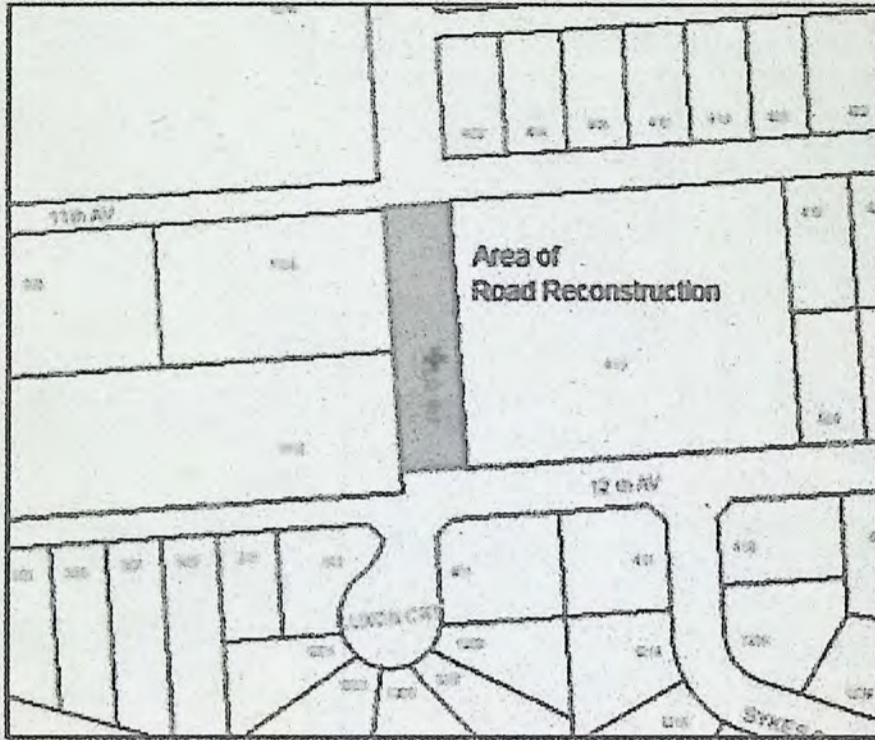

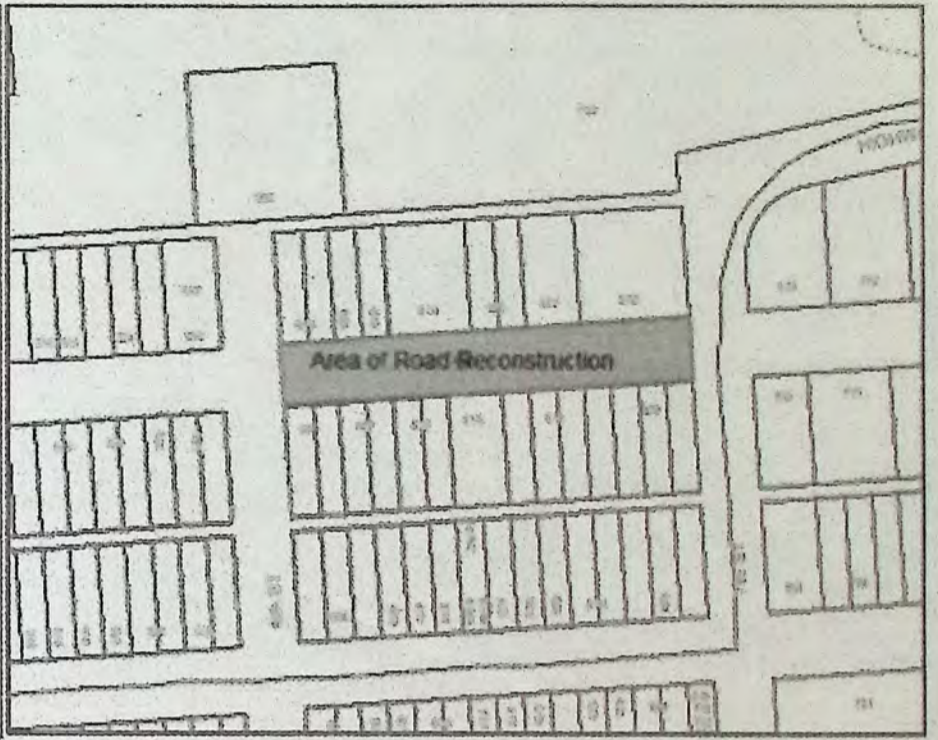

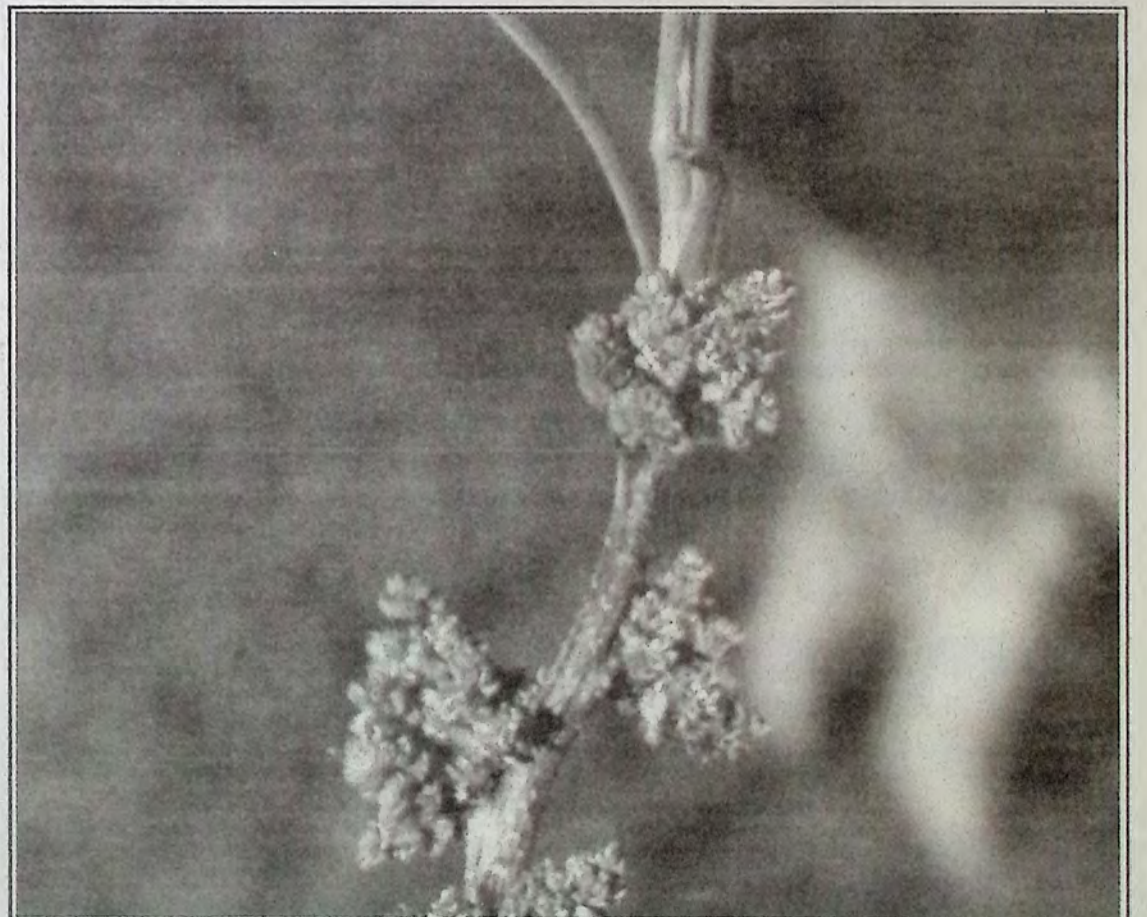

Donald and Barbara plan to lay tarps on the ground beneath each tree once the trees are ready to be harvested: pistachios are harvested by shaking the tree that they grow on.
