Stabbing attack nets jail time

People who break off romantic relationships are entitled to live without fear of their former lovers, a judge said Wednesday, April 27 in Penticton before handing down a six-and-a-half-year jail sentence to a man who admitted to stabbing his ex-wife.

Although originally charged with the more serious offence of attempt-

ed murder, James Ronald Buhler, 54, accepted a plea deal that saw him admit to the aggravated assault of his former wife and unlawfully causing harm to their daughter during a grisly February 2014 incident outside a Princeton restaurant.

The charge of attempted murder was dropped Tuesday, April 26th in exchange for his pleas on what was to be his first day of trial in B.C.continued on Page 2

served, he has three years and three months remaining on his sentence. Court heard James and his ex-wife,

Lydia, separated in September 2013 following an incident of domestic violence, after which she moved from Princeton to the Lower Mainland.

When Lydia returned to pick up mail on the day of the attack, the two got into an argument that ended with James dealing her 11 knife wounds in the parking lot of the local Dairy Queen.

"The attack was determined and it was brutal," Justice Austin Cullen said in his reasons for sentence, noting the assault "was only thwarted by the remarkable courage of their daughter, Amanda," who snatched away the knife from her father and

sustained severe cut to three fingers doing so.

After the women fled into the restaurant for help, James then began cutting his own throat, but was stopped by police before his suicide attempt succeeded.

Cullen cited as aggravating factors the planning involved in the attack, the fact James violated a previous court order to have no contact with Lydia, and that the stabbing happened in the context of a domestic relationship.

"This victim, and others like her, are entitled to break off romantic relationships. When they do so they are

entitled to live their lives normally and safely," the judge said, quoting a landmark 1994 decision from the Ontario Court of Appeal.

"They are entitled to live their lives free of harassment by, and fear of, their former lovers. The law must do what it can to protect persons in those circumstances."

Cullen went on to cite as mitigating factors James' guilty plea, his apology to his family, and mental health issues he was dealing with prior to the attack.

Court heard James struggled with alcoholism, depression and feelings of abandonment after Lydia left him, and that he viewed suicide as a way to end his suffering.

Lydia, 53, and Amanda, 24, were present in court to see James sentenced, but declined comment afterwards.

James, who mouthed something to his family as he was being led out of the courtroom, is still scheduled to stand trial in June on a charge of uttering threats against Lydia in September 2013.

BC small business confidence grows in April

According to the latest monthly Business Barometer survey results from the Canadian Federation of Independent Business (CFIB), BC's small business optimism increased 2.9 points in April to 65.4.

Small business confidence among BC's entrepreneurs increased for a second straight month, while the overall Canadian index rose nearly seven points on the back of significant gains in the majority of provinces. BC's margin over the national index (59.2) increased to 3.5 points, making it the second highest provincial index in Canada, trailing only PEI (70.8). At the bottom of the list was Alberta, up 3.3 points to 28.6, the first increase in six months.

Measured on a scale between 0 and 100, an index level above 50 means owners expecting their business' performance to be

stronger in the next year outnumber those expecting weaker performance. An index level of between 65 and 75 means the economy is growing at its potential.

"The gain in small business confidence in BC for April indicates businesses are feeling increasingly optimistic about the economy and the future performance of their business. The provincial results across the board point to a recuperating national economy," says Aaron Aerts, CFIB economist in BC.

Hiring intentions remain relatively buoyant, with 28 per cent of business owners in April saying they plan to increase full-time staff in the next three months, up a point from last month. That compares to 9 per cent expecting to cut

back, also up a point from last month.

Forty-eight per cent of entrepreneurs in April believe the general state of health of their business is good, versus 12 per cent who describe it as poor. Both are up one point from March.

The national Business Barometer index increased 6.9 points in April to 59.2. The provincial numbers were: PEI (70.8), BC (65.4), Nova Scotia (64.6), Ontario (62.6), Quebec (62.2), New Brunswick (57.5), Manitoba (54.0), Saskatchewan (48.8), Newfoundland (46.4), and Alberta (28.6).

The April 2016 findings are based on 672 responses, collected from a stratified random sample of CFIB members, to a controlled-access web survey. Data reflect responses received through to April 18. Findings are statistically accurate to +/- 3.8 per cent 19 times in 20.

CFIB is Canada's largest association of small- and medium-sized businesses with 109,000 members across every sector and region, including 10,000 in B.C. including the Similkameen News Leader.

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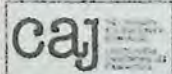

There's Nothing Like A Little Good News!

Do you sometimes get the feeling that no matter how you complain, no matter how you oppose something that is wrong, nobody pays attention? I have had that feeling for a long time when it comes to genetically modified organisms (GMO's) and chemicals containing glyphosate. Then, after several years of what seemed like fruitless action, I got a little good news: Monsanto is losing money!

Profits for Monsanto dropped 25 percent in the past year, primarily in its biotech sales. Guess what? People are NOT buying as much GMO product nor as much of the weed killer needed to make GMO seeds work. People are hitting Monsanto where it hurts: right in the moneybags. Monsanto lost millions of dollars last year.

No, Monsanto is not about to go bankrupt. That's the bad news. That company made a profit last year, despite the fact that it lost a

lot of business. Monsanto just did not make as big a profit as usual.

We consumers always have the last word in the market place. If we will not buy, it means we do not want or like what's for sale. This is what is happening to Monsanto. They are still in business, but more people do not like and do not want some things Monsanto has for sale.

There is an old saying, "You vote with your dollar."

The business article discussing Monsanto's reduction in profits noted part of the problem is the increasing demand for organic produce. Organic produce has not been doused with the stuff Monsanto sells. Why? You did it, you the consumer, by buying organic produce. Your willingness to spend a little extra on non-toxic food resulted in more producers stopping the chemical sprays and going organic to get the extra bucks from selling organic produce. When there's more money in switching products, the producer will switch. He wants your vote (dollar).

Another phenomenon of today's world is related to organic produce, perhaps not certified organic, but coming from a producer you know and trust. The phenomenon is the farmer's market, a marketplace becoming more popular every year. Local producers take their produce to the market and get a higher price for it than the marketing board will give them (or they have a roadside

stand, as in the Similkameen Valley). The consumer can go directly to the farmer, buy produce fresh out of the ground or off the tree, and it lasts longer and generally tastes better, than what they bought in the supermarket. In addition, because producer and consumer live close to each other, there is no long distance haulage involved, so it is better for our air quality.

As a gardener, I contribute absolutely nothing to companies like Monsanto. There are many brands of herbicides, pesticides and other toxic substances used on crops, including fertilizers. I know there are more and more people digging up their back yards and planting gardens, and I hope they, as I do, contribute nothing to the manufacturers of toxic crop additives. I am voting with my dollar. When I buy things I am not able to grow, I try to vote for non-toxic.

When we support our local producers, we do something else: we provide those producers with an income, and they will probably spend it locally. This keeps local money where it should be.

If you are one of the people who has voted for non-toxic food when you buy, then good for you! If you are one of those people who pay no attention to what goes into the food you eat, I suggest you learn about it. There is plenty of information on internet. The more you know, the smarter you'll vote with every dollar you spend on food.

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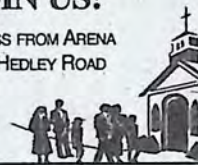

Pets 'n' Vets

Porcupine Quills and Pets

While porcupines don't hibernate over the winter, they do stay closer to their dens. Now that it is warm out, they have begun to roam further and we are starting to see more and more dogs with porcupine

quills stuck in them. The only way to prevent your dogs from getting into a porcupine attack is to keep them on a leash or in a kennel and away from porcupines, alive or dead; any dog off leash can encounter a porcupine, in the cities

as well as in the country. Porcupines have been known to live in alleys and parks in cities as they spread into the porcupine's habitats. Even if the porcupine is dead, letting your pet smell it can lead to a muzzle full of quills. It is quite common

for dogs to try and bite or roll on the body. Many people think that porcupines throw their quills or they have to be alive to release them but the quills are actually loosely held in the skin and are pulled out when they stick into another animal.

pulled by your veterinarian under proper anaesthesia. Many people try and, some succeed in pulling quills themselves, but just as many still have to bring their pet in to get the last few pulled under sedation or full general anaesthesia. Is the struggle and damage to your relationship with your dog, not to mention the risk of bites, worth saving money by not going to the veterinarian? What about the risk of breaking the quills off and having them migrate into your pet's spine, paralyzing it?

So what can you do when your pet experiences porcupine quills? There is an old wives tale out there that if you cut the quills, air gets into them and they fall out - this is the worst thing you can do. When you look at a quill under the microscope, it has a bunch of overlapping scales that create barbs, preventing falling out. In actuality by cutting the quill you have just shortened it. This lets it migrate quicker, giving us less of a chance to pull it before completely imbedding in your animal. Quills only move in one direction because of these barbs and come out one of three ways - pulled out, cut out or migrating completely through your dog's body and falling out. While they are migrating through your pet though, they can damage the lungs, hearts, stomach, intestines or even lodge in its spine!

The sooner you get your pet in to the veterinarian to get the quills pulled, the better. As your pet moves and you try to pull the quills unsuccessfully, the quills migrate deeper into the tissue, making them harder to remove. Not only do they become harder to remove with time, the risk of your pet's mouth becoming infected increases, requiring antibiotics. In severe cases, if the quills are deep enough in the mouth, the back of your pet's mouth could swell and close off their airway, suffocating the pet. If you leave it overnight, this could happen while you sleep!

If your pet does end up with quills, the best thing to do is to get them

Beware of Antihistamines

This is the beginning of "sneeze season" for many people who suffer from allergies. Pollens are triggers for many people. For others, this is the season of contact allergies, such as coming into skin contact with various plants and developing a skin rash. Most people go to the local pharmacy to buy and over-the-counter remedy containing antihistamines.

We see a wide variety of anti-allergy over the counter medications advertised on television from now until November. While all of these medications will do what they promise, such as stopping the sneezing, clearing your eyes, or dealing with your skin rash, when you buy them, think of them as real medications with side effects. These medications do list side effects such as dry mouth, drowsiness, light-headedness, and so on. What they do not say is what can happen with you mix antihistamine medication with other medications or with alcohol.

All medications should be treated with respect. Medications are deliberately concocted to alter your bodily functions in some way. Antihistamines should never be mixed with alcoholic beverages, nor with other medications without first consulting your physician or pharmacist. Even if these two health care professionals say there will likely be no problem, remember you are unique, and you could have a problem. When you take your first antihistamine pill, do so at home and wait to see what happens. Do not drive your care or operate potentially dangerous machinery until you are sure you have no side effects.

Because antihistamines are sold without a prescription, many people believe they can take them for years without any problems. This is not true. Long term use of antihistamines can have an impact on your liver function. It is also possible to overdose on antihistamines, so never take more than the recommended amount in any 24 hour period, even if your nose does not stop running. Again, consult your physician! Better still, consult an allergist to find out exactly what causes your allergic reaction and learn whether you can be de-sensitized.

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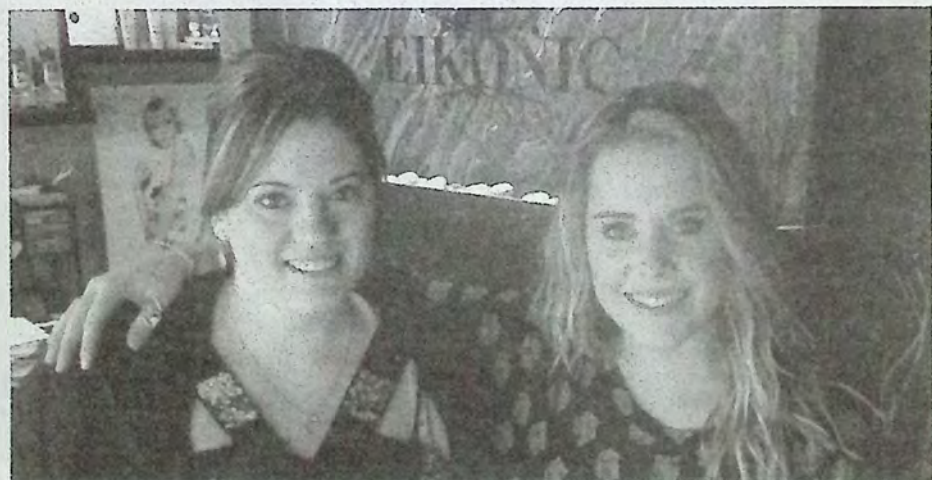

understand them and to appreciate the pieces of them we've felt inside ourselves. Performing this piece in competition will be a wonderful and valuable experience for each of us.

To help us prepare, we will be performing our show in advance in Princeton for one night only. We know this is different material than you usually see us perform, we know that the subject matter and language may be difficult for some of our long time audience, but we hope that you will come out and support us nonetheless.

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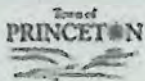
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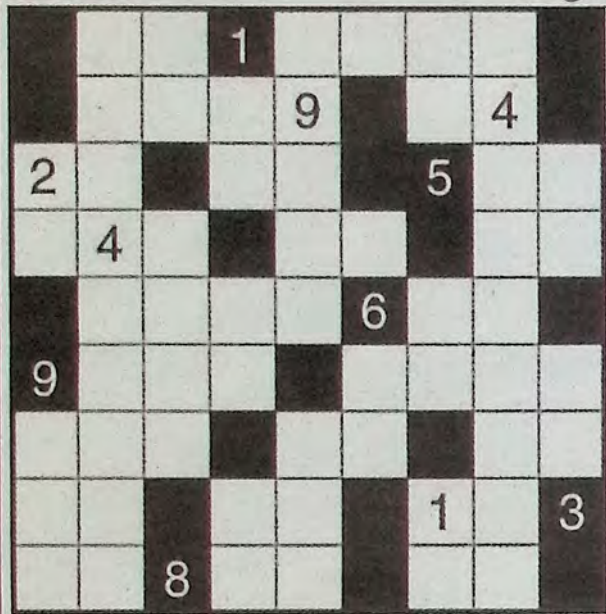

Council shall be open to all members of the Chamber." The Council being referred to is the Chamber Board of Directors. This replaces a previous change that restricted all Chamber meetings to just Directors.

"I'm big on transparency," states Chamber Vice President George Elliott.

"Having all meetings as closed door meeting did not sit well with me and sends a message that did not encourage participation from members who do not sit on the board."

The private meeting to discuss the matter went a long way in forging a better relationship between Town Hall and the Chamber of Commerce and Pateman said that Town Council looks forward to building on that partnership.

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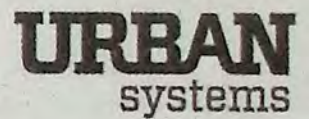

Saving Downtown Princeton...

...An Ongoing Series by George Elliott

The Town of Princeton hosted Urban Systems last week in an Economic Development Session. Part of the process is to develop an accurate community profile of Princeton to be used as a tool to attract investment to the area.

The data currently in use comes from the 2011 Census, which shows Princeton to have a population of 2,724 (up 1.8% from 2006). The projection based on this is to see an additional 180 residents in Princeton over the next 20 years.

The 2011 population is also old with the median age pegged at 52.5 years.

Of that population, 1,305 live in private dwellings with 77% of them being single detached homes and 27% rental units.

Employment data from 2011 shows that 27.7% of local employment comes from sales and service, 19.7% from trades and transportation and 10.3% from manufacturing. The unemployment figure for Princeton in 2011 was 11.4%, high-

er than the provincial number of 7.8%.

The primary industries in the community are forestry, mining, agricultural, tourism and retail.

While all of this information is five years old, it still paints a picture of our community. At the very least, it shows us where we were in 2011 and hopefully there have been some noticeable changes since then on some of these figures. The difficult part for me is to see how we can build the community without attracting new residents. In order to attract new residents you need infrastructure. For many in today's world that infrastructure has to contain interesting and fun 'things to do' in order to keep new residents occupied when not working.

I struggle with this a lot as I am convinced there is no simple, magic answer.

It's difficult to attract people to a community that has a scaled down medical system and limited infra-

structure. There are some good paying jobs, but with shifts moving to seven on/seven off scheduling, it is also hard to convince new workers that they should stay here on their days off. The things we think we have working in our favour like countless recreational opportunities, affordable industrial land and generally low tax rates may not be the things that attract a lot of potential new residents.

As much as I think the Town of Princeton is wasting time and money on hiring outside consultants to tell us things most of us already know about our community, I'm as glad that they are still trying to find solutions.

In my mind it is a multi-tiered issue that will take many, many years to resolve.

If cost to the taxpayer were not an issue I would concentrate on building up the infrastructure. That can be a lot of different things ranging from amenities to services. I think

we need to have lots prepared for development and if you look around, that is already happening and has been for some time. Some of that infrastructure has to include 'fun stuff' to make old and new residents want to hang around the community and explore. That can come from many different things. I like to think the local history can play a role in that and when you consider the efforts of the Granite Creek Preservation Society, Princeton Museum and the development of historic trails in the area, some of this is already in place.

Before we throw open the doors to new investment and new residents we need to have the things in place that will not only attract them, but also keep them here. I keep looking to the many different cultural activities hosted in the community as being part of this. Even to a lesser extent a market of some kind will help to stop traffic that typicallycontinued on Page 20

BC Paramedicine program expands

Health Minister Terry Lake announced April 27th the 73 rural and remote B.C. communities that will welcome community paramedicine, a program that offers residents enhanced health services from paramedics.

"The Community Paramedicine Initiative is a key component of our plan to improve access to primary health-care services in rural B.C.," Lake said.

"By building upon the skills and background of paramedics, we are empowering them to expand access

to care for people who live in rural and remote communities, helping patients get the care they need closer to home."

The program is just one way the Province is working to enhance the delivery of primary care services to British Columbians. The services provided may include checking blood pressure, assisting with diabetic care, helping to identify fall hazards, medication assessment, post-injury or illness evaluation, and assisting with respiratory conditions.

Under this program, paramedics will provide basic health-care services, within their scope of practice, in partnership with local health-care providers. The enhanced role is not intended to replace care provided by health professionals such as

nurses, but rather to complement and support the work these important professionals do each day, delivered in non-urgent settings, in patients' homes or in the community.

"As a former BC Ambulance para-

medic, I understand the potential benefits of community paramedicine," said Jordan Sturdy, MLA for West Vancouver-Sea to Sky.

"Expanding the role of paramedics to help care for the health and well-.....continued on Page 19

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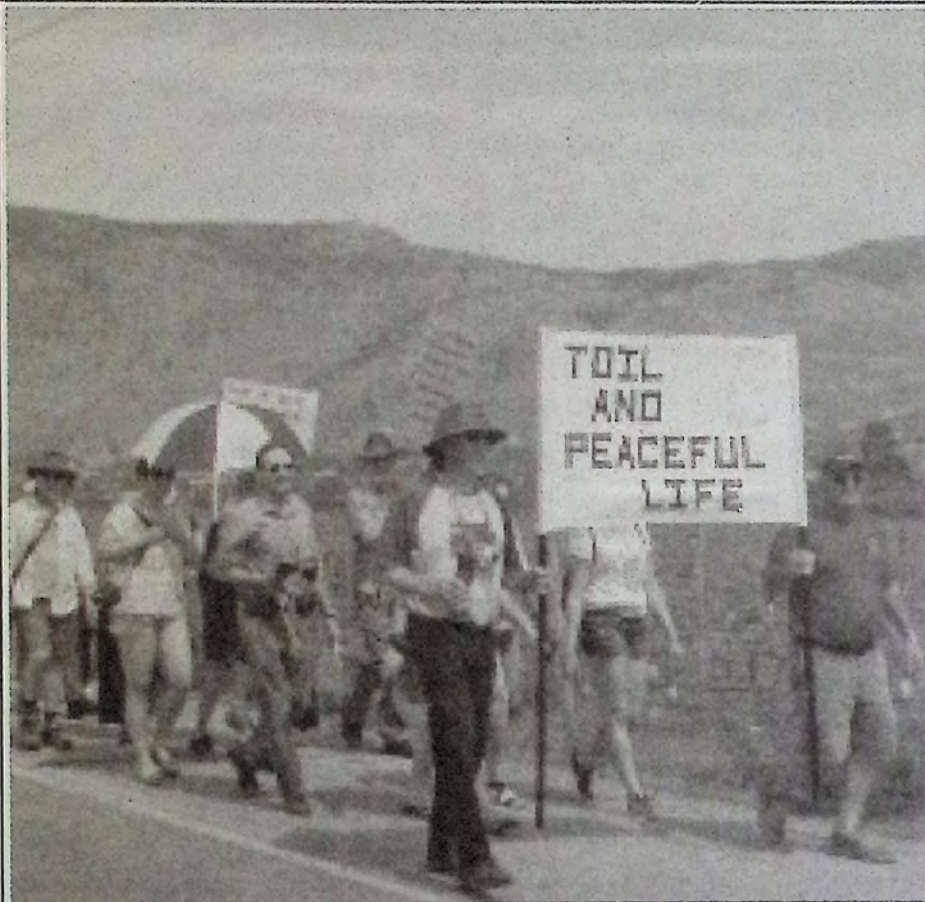

BC Paramedicine program expands

.....continued from Page 18 being of British Columbians just makes sense."

Community paramedicine broadens the traditional focus of paramedics on pre-hospital emergency care to include disease prevention, health promotion and basic health-care services. This means a paramedic will visit rural patients in their home or community, perform assessments requested by the referring health-care professional, and record their findings to be included in the patient's file. They will also be able to teach skills such as CPR at community clinics.

"Community paramedics will focus on helping people stay healthy and the specific primary care needs of the people in these communities," said Linda Lupini, executive vice president, BC Emergency Health Services.

"This program also allows us to enhance our ability to respond to medical emergencies by offering permanent employment to paramedics in rural and remote areas of the province."

"Community paramedicine brings improved patient care and more career opportunities to rural and remote areas," said Bronwyn Barter, president, Ambulance Paramedics of BC (CUPE 873).

"Paramedics are well-suited to take on this important role in health-care provision."

Community paramedicine was ini-

tially introduced in the province in 2015 in nine prototype communities. The initiative is now expanding provincewide, and will be in place in 31 communities in the Interior, 18 communities in northern B.C., 19 communities on Vancouver Island, and five communities in the Vancouver coastal area this year.

At least 80 new full-time equivalent positions will support the implementation of community paramedicine, as well as augment emergency response capabilities. Positions will be posted across the regional health authorities. The selection, orientation and placement process is expected to take about four months.

Community paramedics are expected to be delivering community health services in northern B.C. this fall, in the Interior in early 2017, on Vancouver Island and the Vancouver coastal area in the spring of 2017.

BC Emergency Health Services has been co-ordinating the implementation of community paramedicine in B.C. with the Ministry of Health, regional health authorities, the Ambulance Paramedics of BC (CUPE 873), the First Nations Health Authority and others.

BACKGROUND

Community Paramedicine Initiative - Communities

There will be 73 rural and remote communities participating in the community paramedicine initiative, including the eight prototype com-

munities, which began implementation in 2015.
