Town receives land donation

Mayor Frank Armitage announced at the May 2nd regular monthly meeting of Princeton Town Council that the Town of Princeton has accepted a proposal from the Save On Foods Group.

The company has donated the four lots that once was home to the Overwaita Foods grocery store on Bridge Street. The donation stipulates that the land be used, "for the purposes of developing the donated lands for civic or public activities."

Mayor Armitage states, "This could be an ideal site for the location of a Community Wellness and Aquatic Centre and be a critical anchor in rejuvenating our downtown."

The Town of Princeton will pro-

ceed with a site evaluation to determine suitability requirements and how to best use the property.

As part of the agreement, the Save On Foods Group will construct an entrance sign at the intersection of Highway 3 and Bridge Street that will be used to promote local activities and events.

"It is very nice to get a piece of property of this value as a gratuity," Armitage added in regard to the million dollar donation.

The Caboose, which sits near where this sign will be built, will be moved to a location along the Trans-Canada Trail near the former Princeton railway station building which is currently the home of two food services businesses.

CMMC announces 2016 Q1 results

Copper Mountain Mining Corporation (TSX: CUM) (the 'Company' or 'Copper Mountain') announced last week first quarter revenues of \$58.7 million after pricing adjustments and treatment charges from the sale of 22.3 million pounds of copper equivalent (including 18.1 million pounds of copper, 6,900 ounces of gold, and 61,200 ounces of silver). Total cash cost for the quarter ended March 31, 2016 was US\$1.61 per pound of copper sold, net of precious metals credits.

Highlights include:

- Copper, gold and silver production for the first quarter of 2016 at Copper Mountain Mine was 23.8

million pounds of copper equivalent which includes 19.0 million pounds of copper, 7,600 ounces of gold and 64,700 ounces of silver.

- Revenues for the first quarter of 2016 were \$58.7 million from the sale of 18.1 million pounds of copper, 6,900 ounces of gold, and 61,200 ounces of silver, net of pricing adjustments.

- Gross profit for the quarter was \$1.6 million.

- EBITDA was \$34.4 million for the quarter, compared to a loss of \$17.7 million in the same quarter for 2015.

- A mining rate of 192,000 tonnes moved was achieved during the quarter, compared to 158,000

tonnes moved during 2015.

- Mill throughput achieved a record of 39,980 tpd in February and averaged 37,100 tpd during the quarter.

- Site cash costs for the quarter were US\$1.16 per pound of copper produced net of precious metal credits.

- Total cash costs for the quarter were in-line with expectations at US\$1.61 per pound of copper sold net of precious metal credits and after all off-site charges, a reduction of 9% over Q1 2015 total cash costs.

- Realized prices on metal sales for Q1 2016 were US\$2.10 per pound of copper, US\$1,188 per ounce of gold and US\$14.89 per ounce of silver.

Jim O'Rourke, President and CEO of Copper Mountain, remarked, "During the first quarter of 2016, Copper Mountain continued to demonstrate solid performance within a challenging commodities price environment by focusing on cost containment and production efficiencies. Total cash costs for the quarter decreased by 9% to US\$1.61 per pound of copper sold net of precious metal credits and after all off-site charges, over Q1 2015 total cash costs. Mine produc-

tion was strong during the quarter with approximately 192,000 tonnes mined per day, well above our 2016 guidance of 174,000 tpd. Mill throughput for the quarter averaged 37,100 tpd, a 9% quarter-over-quarter increase, further demonstrating Copper Mountain's ability to operate above design capacity of 35,000 tpd on a sustained basis."

O'Rourke continued, "At this time, I would like to acknowledge the dedication and efforts of our employees and suppliers for their commitments and cooperation in successfully tackling the challenges necessary to survive in the current copper price environment. We continue to focus on cost control and operational improvements to deal with the reality of the current global economic climate and are well positioned to benefit from higher metal prices in the future."

During the quarter, the Company completed a total of three shipments of copper concentrate containing approximately 18.1 million pounds of copper, 6,900 ounces of gold, and 61,200 ounces of silver which generated \$58.7 million in revenue net of treatment and refining charges

and pricing adjustments. Site cash costs were US\$1.16 per pound of copper produced and total cash costs were US\$1.61 per pound sold, net of precious metal credits for the three months ended March 31, 2016; compared to site cash costs of US\$1.21 per pound of copper produced and total cash costs of US\$1.77 per pound of copper sold, net of precious metal credits for the three months ended March 31, 2015.

Mining activities were mainly focused in the Pit #2 and the Virginia pit areas for the first quarter of 2016. During the quarter a total of 17.4 million tonnes of material was mined, including 5.7 million tonnes of ore and 11.8 million tonnes of waste for a strip ratio of 2.07:1. During the quarter, the mine

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CMMC announces 2016 Q1 results

.....continued from Front Page achieved a new daily mining record of 242,950 tpd, which was made possible by the opening up of short waste haul opportunities and a continued focus on maximizing haul truck hours. For the quarter the mine averaged 194,000 tonnes per day moved.

During the quarter the mill processed a total of 3.4 million tonnes of ore grading 0.312% copper to produce 19 million pounds of copper, 7,600 ounces of gold, and 64,600 ounces of silver. Mill recoveries were 82% for the quarter. Mill operating time during the quarter averaged 91% operating time, with March operating time coming in at 93.5%, compared to 93.2% averaged during Q1-2015. The mill achieved an average throughput rate of 37,100 tpd during the quarter, as the Company had some planned and unplanned downtime associated with the SAG mill discharge screen early in the quarter that reduced the quarter's average.

Update:

At the Copper Mountain site the

exploration work during the quarter consisted of continuous near mine compilation work as well as developing localized exploration drill programs to optimize long term mine planning. The exploration team continues to investigate and evaluate early and advanced-exploration properties as well as development projects, which are predominately located within the America's.

Guidance:

The 2016 mine plan has a majority of ore coming from Pit #2 and the Virginia Pit areas. The 2016 guidance remains unchanged for the balance of 2016.

About Copper Mountain Mining Corporation:

Copper Mountain's flagship asset is the 75% owned Copper Mountain mine located in southern British Columbia near the town of Princeton. The Company has a strategic alliance with Mitsubishi Materials Corporation who owns the remaining 25%. The Copper Mountain mine commenced production in the latter half of 2011,


and has continued to improve its operations since start-up. The 18,000 acre site has a large resource of copper that remains open lateral-

ly and at depth. The mine has significant exploration potential that will need to be explored over the next few years to fully appreciate



Flip Of The Coyne

When your economic recovery plan can be summarized in one sentence, it might be time to stop

rethink your plan, especially when it boils down to "build[ing] the community spirit and excit[ing]

people about the entrepreneurship that's going on around us...to do everything they can to shop local."

Now I will give Councillor Tjerkstra credit where credit is due. Shopping local does help the local economy, but it takes a lot more to respark our picturesque downtown, despite that he and council's idea of their role in economic development and revitalization is very limited and very short sighted. I understand what they are trying to do with their acquisition of the former Overwaitea property, but this is not going to be the silver bullet that will save downtown.

Princeton's economic future depends on more than a recreation, wellness, whatever you want to call it, aquatic centre and telling people to shop locally. I have said it time and time again, we need to find a way to diversify our economy so when we see a drop in commodity prices, the town doesn't shutter up. We need to look towards tourism, and non traditional industry for our regional employment opportunities. Under the Community Charter, Town has the ability to create a tax incentive program for revitalization programs. The province has some very clear rules around this, but communities around the province take advantage of Section 226 of

the Community Charter. The tax incentives can be in place for up to ten years. The tax exemptions can be set for specific areas and they can be based on minimum investments so that only those serious about building a new building or retrofitting an older one will benefit from the program.

The Town should be serious about creating, not just a portfolio position, but a staff position in which one's job is to do economic development. I know there are people rolling their eyes at this one, but if we are serious about selling the lots at the business park, or developing the airport or revitalizing our commercial areas of town or creating a tourism plan, we need someone to do this who knows how. We need someone who will be on the job Monday to Friday who understands that their role is to work with the Chamber of Commerce when need be or to contact Community Futures and Western Economic Diversification for programs and funding availability. We need someone who knows that when a business wants to open up that the Business Development Bank ofcontinued on Page 10

April weather, Princeton style

The weather was good in April, and a record for heat was broken mid-month during a hot spell when the temperature climbed to 30.1 on April 20. For the rest of the month, temperatures were in the normal to cool range. As usual, the month was dry, with warm days and frequent frost overnight. The highest temperature ever recorded in April in Princeton was 31.1 in 1987.

Low temperatures did not break any records. The coldest temperatures for April were recorded between 1954 and 1956, with the exception of a record low of -6.3C in 2008.

Snowfall was minimal in April, and snow on the ground went early. Compare this with an April 26, 1955 snowfall of 10.2 cm. or April 29, 1969, which saw 5 cm on the ground, or April 19, 2011

with 4 cm on the ground.

Princeton enjoyed a much nicer April than the east coast where maritime provinces had enough snow to have to dig out. More unusual were the snowstorms in Britain, Bosnia, Austria, Slovenia and Iceland. In the meantime, extreme high temperatures were killing people in India in late April.

Perhaps the worst April weather hit the southern United States where three violent storms dropped baseball-size hail which was extremely destructive, and where storms caused flooding in a number of southern states.

Why Russia And Iran Are Bad

There has been a lot of bad publicity aimed at Russia and Iran, while neither has done anything really bad. I suspect the major reason we hear about these nations is due to their location on the Caspian Sea.

The Caspian Sea is not really a sea, it is a very large body of fresh water. What is highly significant about the Caspian Sea is its natural gas and oil reserves under the sea. If you look at a map of the Caspian Sea, you will see it is bordered on the northwest by Russia (including Crimea), in the northeast by Kazakhstan, in the southeast by Turkmenistan and on the southwest by Azerbaijan. In the south, in a somewhat crescent shape, the sea is bordered by Iran. Each one of the bordering nations has a piece of the Caspian Sea as part of their own territory. Each of these nations has a claim to the oil and gas reserves under the Caspian Sea.

Any other nation wishing to exploit the oil and gas reserves of the Caspian Sea must be able to make a deal with one of the nations claiming a piece of the sea. Iran and Russia are not making deals. They intend to exploit these resources for their own benefit. Does that make them bad?

At one time, Iran was good buddies with the United States. The Shah of Iran welcomed the involvement of the United States,

Canada and European nations in Iran's economy. Then the Shah was ousted by the Ayatollah Khomeini regime, and since that time, Iran is seen as a bad guy.

Russia, of course, continues to be the bad guy, no matter what it does, even when it defeats ISIS in the ongoing attempts to invade Syria.

To date, Turkmenistan, Kazakhstan and Azerbaijan have not been identified as bad guys. I do not know why, but maybe they are willing to make deals.

On the southwest border of Iran, there is a nation heavily invested in the current war in the Middle East: Turkey. Turkey does not have access to the Caspian Sea, except through Iran, Georgia and Armenia on the way to Azerbaijan. Turkey is a 'client' nation of the United States and a major player in the current state of war in the Middle East.

Turkey and Armenia went to war in 1915, backed by Britain and its empire, who wanted to overthrow the Ottoman Empire. Armenians were slaughtered in what they describe as the 'Armenian holocaust.' Last year marked the hundredth anniversary of that event, and Turkey invited Armenia to share in a memorial ceremony of 'mutual condolences.' Armenia declined.

When we look at the position of Syria, the modern state which is descended from the Ottoman Empire, we see it is located due south of Turkey and shares a border with Iran. Iraq, south of Turkey, shares a border with Syria, Turkey and Iran. Afghanistan is on the eastern border of Iran. Iran is at the center of nations engaged in conflict. Why, then, is Iran the bad guy?

Let's take a look at how the Kurds fit into the picture. The Kurds, after World War I, were promised a homeland to be called Kurdistan. They are still waiting for their homeland. They occupy the mountainous country of the

border between Turkey and Syria, including the northern tip of Iraq.

The Kurds are not culturally or ethnically Middle Eastern. They originated out of northern India, the highly civilized Aryan people who left northern India due to extreme drought, abandoning huge cities and vast farmlands. Forced to become nomadic, they eventually reached the shores of the Mediterranean and sought protection from the Ottoman Empire. The Kurds have been in the Middle East for 2,000 years, but have retained their unique culture to the point that India still has a protective interest in the Kurds.

If you look at the Kurds, you do not see what we would call the 'typical' Middle East appearance, nor the typical Indian appearance. Kurds may have any colour hair and eyes, and any sort of facial features, but are generally good-looking. Among the Kurds, there is a tremendous level of diversity in religious belief. You will find Muslims, Christians, Jews, and even Zoroastrians. None of the women wear veils, though Muslim women may wear head scarves. The relationship between men and women is fairly equal.

The Kurds have been constantly under attack from Turkish and Iraqi forces, but they are accepted freely in Syria, a democratic nation with the same high tolerance for religious and ethnic diversity. The President of Syria, Bashar al-Assad, was elected by democratic process and is supported by the majority of Syrians. The civil war in Syria was instituted by ISIS forces, according to what Syrians say.

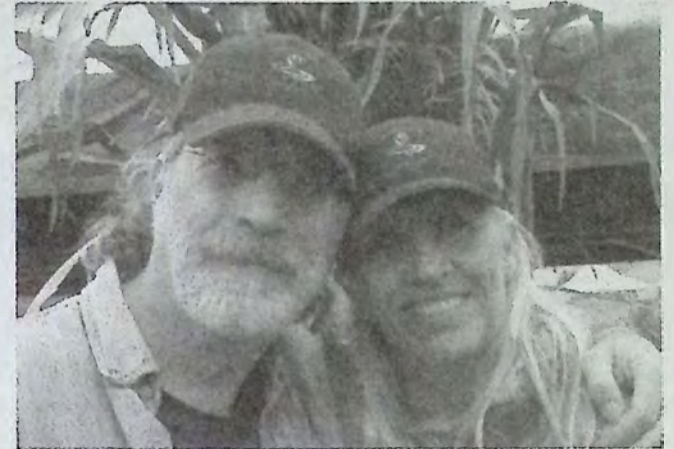
Syria has no access to the Caspian Sea. Its only significance in the Middle East is its geographic position in relation to Turkey, Iraq and Iran. Right now, its significance in the current conflict is its willingness to resist ISIS. Kurdish resistance to ISIS forces has been very significant. Due to their history, the Kurds are highly experienced at war: even a large proportion of their women are skilled at war.

Pretending to be a military strategist, I looked at the map and thought how every country engaged in the ISIS attacks is a country bordering Iran. If one military coalition could surround Iran and attack from all sides, Iran would likely be defeated.

Who would want to do that?

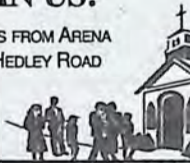

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Lali announces return to politics

"The people of BC are fed up with an arrogant premier and a tired, out-of-touch government that is more

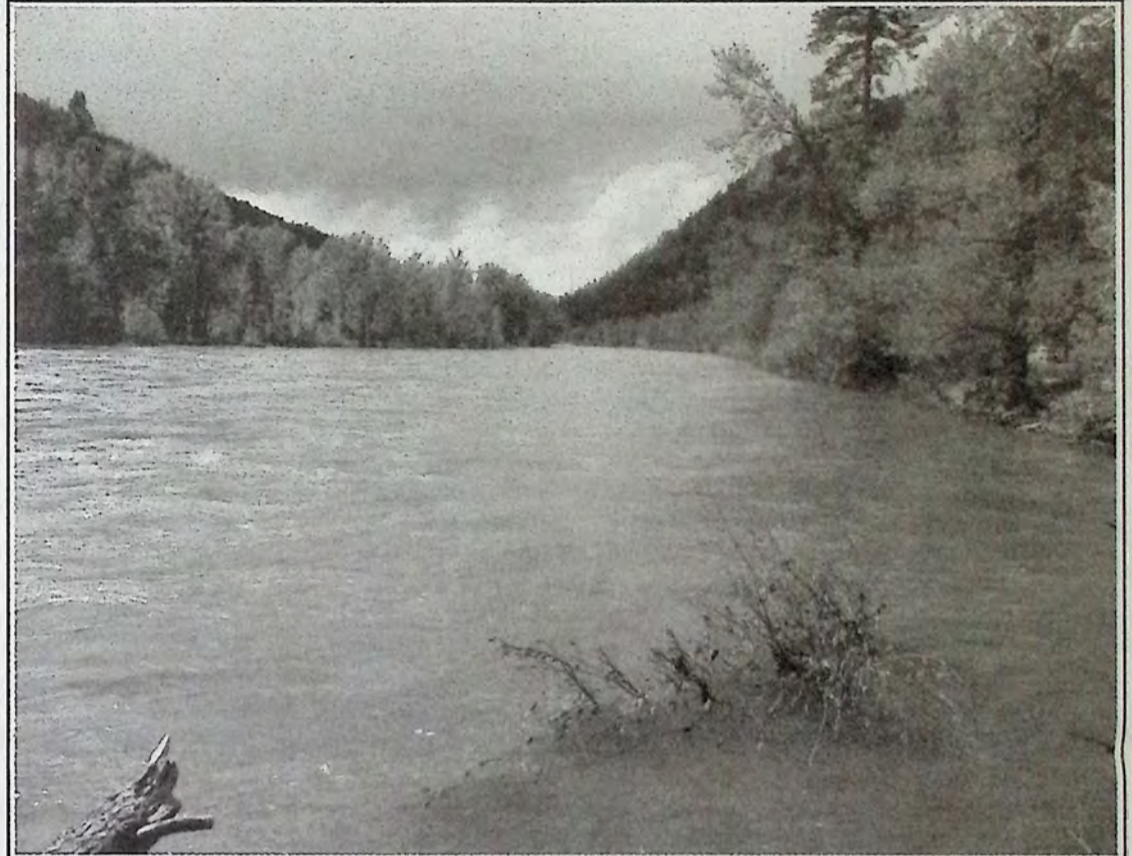
interested in representing big corporations while middle-class and everyday people suffer and children go hungry in record numbers."

Living Past 100

The Vitamin of Youth

Researchers studying how to keep stem cells healthy have made a major breakthrough in understanding what triggers cells to repair themselves. The key to cell repair is Vitamin B3, otherwise known as niacin. When this vitamin is present, the mitochondria (ancient DNA within the cell) tells the cell to repair damage. The mitochondria is the power source of the cell. Mitochondria is like a little brain inside each cell, and it needs niacin to keep each cell healthy. As long as your cells are healthy, you are healthy.

What researchers found in the laboratory studies was that rats fed niacin lived 25 percent longer. Niacin is the vitamin of longer, healthier life.

So, where do we find niacin in great amounts in the food we eat? Here is a list: beef, liver, salmon, tuna, mackerel, avocado, green peas (not canned), sunflower seeds, cooked Portobello or regular white mushrooms, oil roasted peanuts or natural peanut butter, lean pork, breast meat of chickens and turkeys, lecithin, brown rice, molasses and green leafy vegetables.

This list may be very discouraging to vegetarians, but it seems we humans need our niacin sources to live longer and healthier lives.

Some of the foods may be surprising to some people who have not been in the habit of eating these foods. Sunflower seeds can be used in place of nuts in many recipes. Brown rice is excellent, particularly the long grain brown rice which fluffs beautifully when baked. Molasses was the preferred sweetener for our pioneer ancestors. They used it on pancakes, porridge, biscuits, toast, and in baked beans, common everyday foods. Molasses was used in puddings, cakes and pies. Mushrooms and peanuts may not be acceptable to some people who have allergies. On the other hand, an allergy to green peas is not common, so can be used as a substitute source of niacin.

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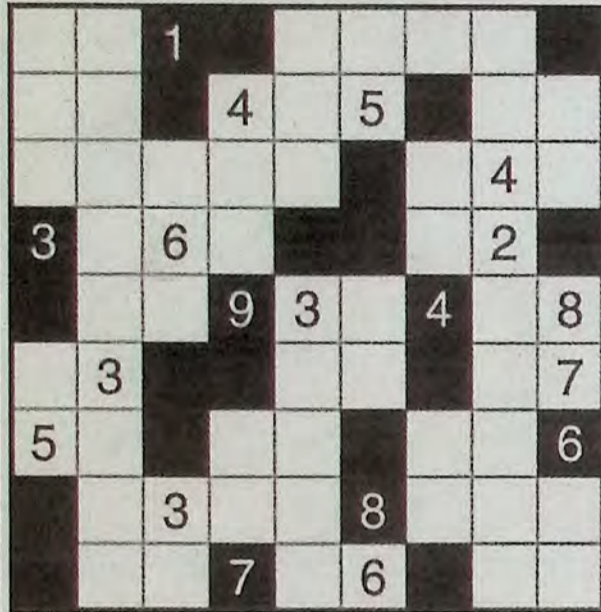

 Canada might be the one who can get them started. Economic development is not a part-time hobby to be contemplated. It is a portfolio that requires - no - demands action.

It makes me cringe when I see council members make comments like, "what we are hoping to achieve, as a council, is to build the community spirit." We don't need more community spirit. You would think at this point Council would know that Princeton has an overabundance of community spirit. It was community spirit that brought a packed house to the Museum AGM not too long ago. When we speak of economic development, we should not be thinking about today and tomorrow only.

We need to be thinking a generation down the road. We need to be thinking about what jobs my children will have when they graduate from our high school and want to stay within the community that their family has lived in since before the birth of this Province.

Economic development is not only about you and me. It is about the generations that will take our place.

We need to think about a bigger picture than today and the next election as some members of council clearly are. If Council believes that economic development is about you and me pulling up our bootstraps, and that they take no responsibility, even though they own the bulk of undeveloped industrial lots after the rezoning of the old industrial area, if they do not believe that now that they have taken on the sole responsibility of Tourism within our community after removing the Chamber of Commerce from the equation, then they do not understand the responsibility that they have taken through their centralization of services. Council, despite what some members may believe, have a role to play, a very big role to play, as they are the ones who have taken it from the community and placed it on their plates. The future of Princeton is not a hobby.

Saving Downtown Princeton...

...An Ongoing Series by George Elliott

There's going to be a three storey high sign on Highway 3! It's going to be bright, it's going to probably flash at times, and it's going to be something that the average driver is not going to miss as they zip through Princeton. It's going to be big enough to see from quite a distance away from the intersection with Bridge Street and as a result it will bring a lot of notice to Princeton and the downtown core.

Doesn't that sound like a wonderful idea?

I have said it time and time again that in order to feed traffic to the downtown core there needs to be a giant sign of some kind on the highway telling travelers that there is a whole lot more to Princeton than what they see along Highway 3. It is for this reason that I applaud Town Council for taking the plunge and getting us one huge step closer to saving downtown Princeton.

What I don't understand is those residents who don't see the giant

blinking and glowing sign as anything more than a gimmick put in place by a large corporation. Well, let's look at this a little differently for a moment.

Personally, I don't care who puts a giant sign on the highway because I know it will work in feeding business into the downtown core. I'm sure if it were Copper Mountain Mine who paid for the enormous welcome sign some residents would be happy and others would not. I'm sure if the sign was 30-foot tall and said Similkameen News Leader all over it there would be some who would be happy and others who would claim "that jerk at the paper is just desperate for attention." There would also be bets in the local coffee shops as to how long it would take before the News Leader billboard was vandalized.

So because it happens to be Save-On-Foods (or more precisely the Overwaitea Foods Group) footing the bill, or sharing the cost with the

Town, some residents are not happy?

Here's where I shake my head.

The Jim Pattison Group, like it or not, it a huge part of this community. They DONATED a million dollar piece of property to the Town of Princeton. The deal included the demolition of the former Overwaitea building, which probably cost local taxpayers nothing, and a giant sign on the highway which the Town of Princeton has access to in order to promote many activities going on in and around the community.

Sure, if and when an aquatic centre or some kind of wellness facility goes in that million dollar piece of land in the centre of downtown Princeton the Save-On name is going to appear on it. That is only fair.

Again, let's look at it this way.

What if the Similkameen News Leader owned the empty lot? We decided we could not afford to

build a state-of-the-art media centre there with a small condo development. So, in an act of kindness, after much discussion and soul searching the bean counters at the corporate headquarters of the News Leader parent company, Bengel Publishing Inc. (owned 100% by some guy named W. George Elliott) DONATED the land to the Town of Princeton to be developed into something to benefit the community as a whole. In exchange, the Bengel Publishing Inc. BoD requested placement of an enormous sign on Highway 3 at Bridge Street to promote both the News Leader and all other town activities. Plus, whatever gets built in the donated land would end up carrying the News Leader name.

Would there be as much of a concern about who is getting all the extra PR and would the Town of Princeton be viewed by some as "selling out?"

Province to reopen treatment facility

British Columbia youth and young adults with substance use disorders will soon have more support with the re-opening of an enhanced, specialized, residential treatment program at the Crossing at Keremeos facility.

Scheduled to open in 2017, the new provincial 22-bed program will provide treatment for youth and young adults, aged 17 to 24 years, with substance use disorders that have not been successfully addressed in community programs.

The goal of the new program at the

Crossing at Keremeos facility is to provide evidence-based treatment, education and support to:

- * reduce problematic substance use;
- * improve overall health and social well-being;
- * reduce the potential of criminal activity;
- * reduce the risk of death due to overdose and infections; and
- * successfully transition youth and young adults back to their home communities.

A team of health professionals will

work together with clients and their families to establish tailored treatment plans that build on strengths and enhance motivation for recovery. Treatment will include group and individual/family therapy, access to therapeutic recreational activities, life skills training and psycho-social education so clients have tools to successfully transition back to their home communities.

When they are ready to return home, clients and their families will be supported by a network, including local health authorities and the Ministry of Children and Family Development, to ensure they continue to thrive even after leaving the Crossing.

The new program in Keremeos is recognition by the Province the importance of having a range of services for youth and young adults with substance use disorders. Young people experience many cognitive, social and physical changes that, if affected by substance use, can have negative implications in adulthood. Recent data suggests approximately 14% of people aged 19 to 35 years experience substance use disorders, and rates of mental health and substance use disorders are highest for people aged 15 to 24 years, at nearly 12%.

The program at the Crossing at Keremeos is supported by BC Mental Health & Substance Use Services (BCMHSUS), an agency of the Provincial Health Services

Authority (PHSA), in collaboration with the Ministry of Health. PHSA and BCMHSUS will provide oversight for the new program, which will be operated by a contracted service provider, who will be selected through a request for proposal (RFP) process. Central City Foundation, which owns the Crossing at Keremeos facility, is offering the space to PHSA rent-free.

To ensure that the province's mental-health programs work effectively together, the provincial government is developing an integrated, cross- government mental-health and substance use strategy for British Columbia. This work includes a review of current child and youth mental-health programs and services. The goal is to address key gaps in the current system and ensure individuals and families can access support services early, before they find themselves in a crisis.

Terry Lake, Minister of Health said, "The new program at the Crossing at Keremeos will be a welcome addition to the network of services available to youth and young adults with serious substance use issues throughout B.C. - providing specialized care to meet the unique needs of vulnerable young people."

Stephanie Cadieux, Minister of Children and Family Development added, "The Crossing will provide

the state-of-the-art specialized treatment and care that young people need to launch their recovery. Once they are ready to return to their home communities, MCFD staff will work with our partner agencies to ensure the youth have the ingredients for continued success, including appropriate housing and access to the community-based health services they may need."


Linda Larson, MLA for Boundary-Similkameen said, "The natural beauty and remoteness of this part of the province makes Keremeos an ideal location for healing and recovery. I welcome the reopening of this valuable service, which will help so many young British Columbians struggling with substance use."

Dan Ashton, MLA for Penticton commented, "I commend the hard work that went into bringing back the Crossing at Keremeos as an important provincial resource for youth and young adult substance use treatment. I look forward to its opening in 2017."

Manfred Bauer, mayor of Keremeos stated, "Council and the communities in the Lower Similkameen Valley are looking forward to opening our hearts again, to help young people who are struggling with addiction back into a life free of substance use."

 Services said, "This is a critical stage of development for young people, where timely interventions are necessary to avoid the loss of opportunity and support skill development with a goal to achieve overall health and well-being. The program will provide a safe place, where these youth and young adults can overcome their substance use disorders and reach their full potential."

Jennifer Johnstone, president and CEO, Central City Foundation

points out, "Central City Foundation, its donors and partners remain committed to children, youth and families in B.C. who are struggling with the challenges of addiction, and are pleased to see a plan to reopen The Crossing at Keremeos. There is still a critical need for this facility and its program. With years of community experience in Keremeos in providing effective care for youth and families, the reopened Crossing will save lives."

Landfill fees change

Fees for the Campbell Mountain, Oliver, Keremeos and OK Falls Landfills operated by the Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen (RDOS) will be adjusted starting June 1, 2016.

Changes coming June 1st includes a fee hike from \$150 to \$200 a tonne for Controlled Waste, such as asbestos. The new charge will better cover the costs of handling these dangerous materials. Oversized industrial and agricultural tires will

increase from \$200 to \$400 per tonne to cover recycling costs.

Fees have gone down significantly on agricultural fruit waste, burned materials from structure fires and pressurized tanks. Pressurized tanks, including propane tanks, under 4.5 kg (10lb) are now free at all RDOS landfills.

"We want to provide a safe and free way for residents to recycle potentially dangerous materials like small pressurized propane

tanks," points out Don Hamilton RDOS Solid Waste Facilities Supervisor.

How does this save downtown Princeton?

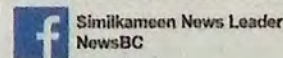
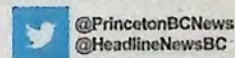
The fact that there will be a sign on

the highway that no one will be able to ignore is a big deal. It will be something the Town of Princeton could never afford to put there on their own and if they did, they would come under fire for it. This is obviously why partnering with a large corporate citizen had to take place. The plan took over a year to work out and the results are nothing short of a win/win for everyone.

As I've said many times before, if you feed people into the downtown core, just as has been happening with the visitors centre, local business benefits. Who cares who paid for the sign as long as it works? Like the saying states, sometimes you just have to "go big or go home."

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
