Princeton contributes \$750 million

BC Premier Christy Clark spoke to a fair sized crowd in downtown Princeton May 13th. She was in town to celebrate Copper Mountain Mining Corporation's annual Mining Days event and spoke on the tax contribution made by the Town of Princeton.

She asked those in attendance, "Do you know how much money Princeton sends in taxes to British Columbia and Canadian govern-

ments?" Following two guesses she answered her own question, "\$750-million."

The Premier went on to discuss the importance of mining in today's world despite opposition from those who feel resources should stay in the ground. She admitted that the world is changing and with it will be a greater demand for such things as more internet.

Historic 1849 HBC Trail to reopen May 21

The Hudson's Bay Company 1849 Bridge Trail is not only a recreation trail that stretches across the Cascade Mountains from Hope to Tulameen but it was of great historical significance in the development of British Columbia and the

creation of Canada. Much of this ancient route was originally used by Aboriginal peoples for millennia. It was a series of survival trails that they used to trade and to gather and hunt for food.

During the fur trading era various

trails were connected and improved to used be by the HBC horse brigades as an overland passage to move the rich furs from the north to the Pacific Ocean.

One of the oldest and most used routes was the section of the

Hudson Bay Brigade Trail from Hope to Tulameen as it was the main line of communication (in what is now the province of British Columbia) from 1849 - 1860.

Back in the 1960s, Penticton resident, Harley Hatfield and others

worked for over thirty years to find, map and have these extant sections of trail protected. Harley passed away in 2000, but many have been following in Harley's footprints to help keep his vision alive.

In celebration of BC150 in 2008, an event was held to unveil a heritage trail kiosk at Jacobson Lake. The eastern section of the HBC trail had been re-opened as well as the Rice and Vuich Trails in the Cascades Forest District. Over 200 people attended including all five of Harley Hatfield's grown children and members of the Okanagan Historical Society. Dan Rice of Granite Creek and Eric Jacobson of Princeton did the honors of unveiling the kiosk. They had worked with Harley to locate and mark the trails along with Pat Wright and other locals. Most of

.....continued from Front Page these gentlemen have since passed away but they were so pleased to see our generation enjoying the fruits of their labour. The highlight of the day was the arrival of the Backcountry Horsemen of BC, in full brigade style, leading pack horses. They had left Fort Langley National Historic site 9 days earlier.

In 2009 the western section of the trail was located that went west of Palmer's Pond towards Hope. A group was then formed consisting of the Hope Mountain Centre, Backcountry Horsemen of BC, government agencies and other interested people in the HBC Trail. As a result of that meeting a detailed plan was developed to resurrect the entire HBC trail over the next five years. The western section of the trail had been lost in the paperwork but sections were still visible on the ground.

Since starting the project in 2010, many organizations, government agencies, individuals and groups have contributed financially. With this financial assistance, backed by

thousands of volunteer hours, this goal was achieved.

The last two years was the final push towards completion of the trail and it resulted in a 74 kilometre continuous route over the Cascade Mountains. Some sections that were lost to industrial activity and private ownership had to be re-routed enabling the completion of the main route of the fur traders through the formidable Cascade Mountains of British Columbia.

Come out to Tulameen on Saturday, May 21st and help celebrate at the official re-opening event. Some highlights will be white water canoes, horse brigades, HBC booth and costumes, bannock and black powder guns!

The event is being held at the eastern trailhead kiosk, 3 kilometres out the River Road from Tulameen at 1:00 PM.

James Douglas known as The Father of British Columbia once stated, "It is a great relief to have established the practicability of this route to the interior through the formidable barrier of mountains which

separates it from Fraser's River - while it will have the effect of imparting a greater degree of confidence of our own operations, it may

also have an important bearing on the future destinies of the country at large; a triumph, probably the last of the kind reserved for the Fur Trade."

(August 7, 1850 in a letter to London, HBC Chief Factor James Douglas reported to headquarters of the HBC Company in London).

Princeton GSAR Swiftwater team members spent the weekend of May 6th to 8th on the Tulameen and Similkameen Rivers honing their swiftwater rescue skills with the regional response SOSSAR (South Okanagan Similkameen) Swiftwater team. Members practiced all aspects of water rescue from river behaviour/hazards to tethered and free swimming, rafting response, and entrapment escape.

Lindsay van Genne, one of the team members that attended said, "It was scary fun to jump into the river when it was SO high, and then having to swim a person to shore untethered was the hardest thing that I've ever had to do, and I'm a lifeguard."

Congratulations to Slim, Clint, Pete and Lindsay on certifying as Swiftwater techs.

The Princeton GSAR's trackers

also attended a BC Tracking Association Advanced Tracker course in Comox. On the Friday evening members reviewed the Advanced Tracker criteria and discussed techniques. They then spent the rest of the weekend working on a variety of tracking scenarios such as missing teen runaway/possible abduction, and overdue mushroom pickers.

On Sunday's scenario, a mock 2

car accident was staged and members had to determine how many possible occupants there were and where they went. As an added twist, one of the instructors came wandering out of the bush hysterically screaming where is my baby! Members quickly found all subjects and the 'baby.' It was a great weekend of training. Congratulations to Jim, Scotty, and Randy on recertifying at the Advanced Tracker level.

Princeton Ground Search and Rescue, an all-volunteer team, provides 24/7 emergency response for the RCMP, BCHS, Town of Princeton, and Regional District of Okanagan Similkameen in the Province of BC.

Dictionary.com defines community as "a group that could share a cultural or historical heritage, a social,

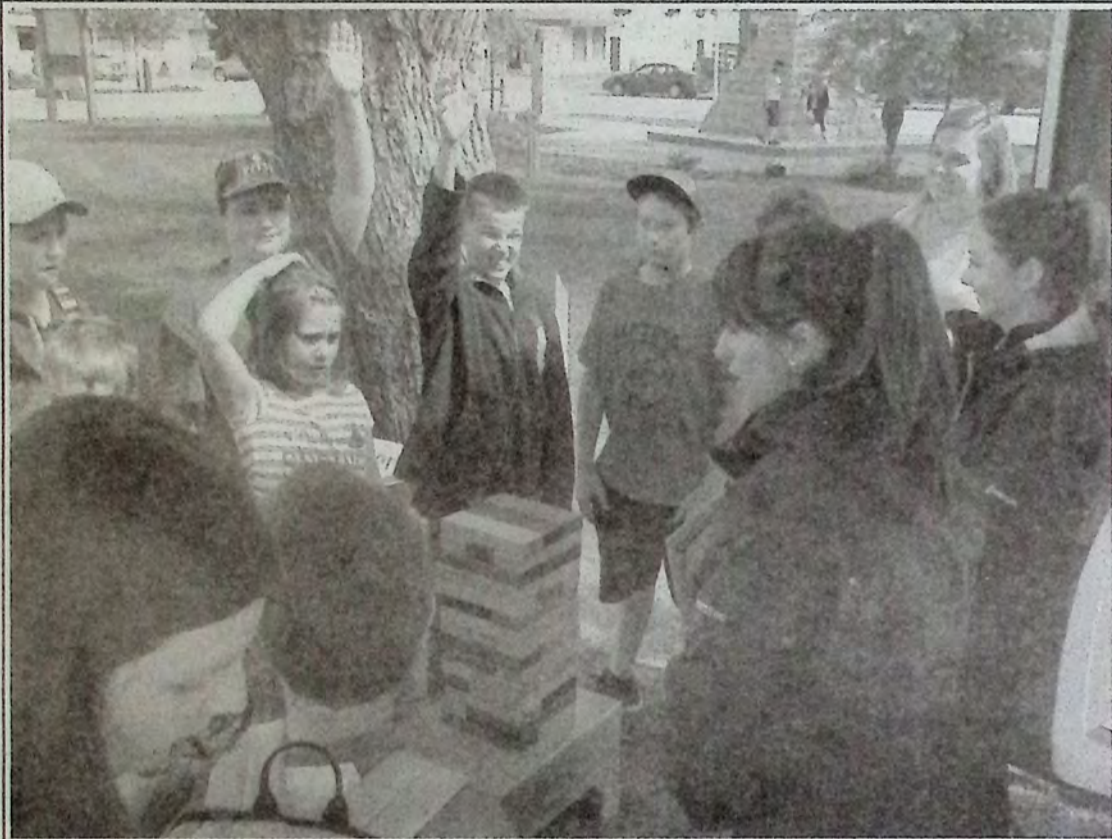

If the community is to grow and prosper, they cannot segregate the rural residents who spend their money in Princeton, invest in property within Princeton, own and operate businesses inside Princeton, employing workers who contribute to the local economy. We need to be united as one community to ensure that Princeton grows and is prosperous.

I understand that it can be frustrating at times when 'rural' residents are outspoken, but it is because we are passionate about our community just like you. We want to see Princeton succeed and we want to see opportunity for the community to grow, just like our neighbours within the town boundaries. It will make our community the envy of most out-of-town residents who drive past it after being directed to turn down Bridge Street - thanks to the ginormous Save-On-Foods Welcome Sign on Highway 3.

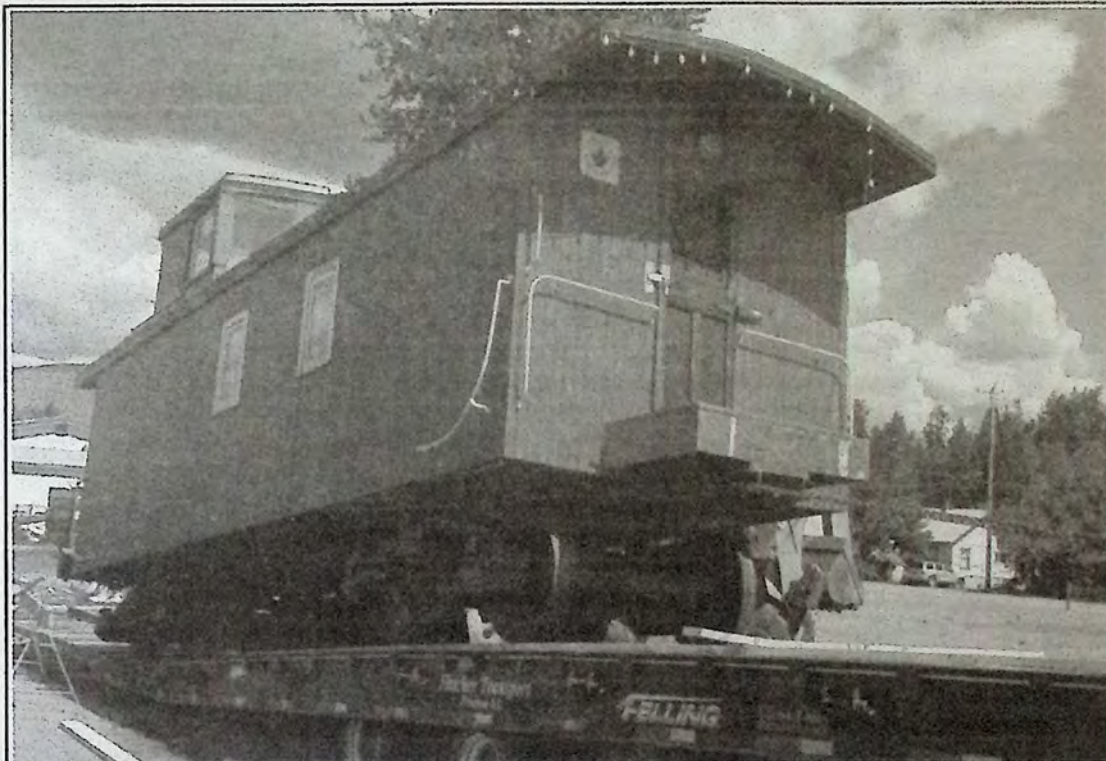
Who wouldn't be excited about what all the fuzz will be about once concrete starts to get poured, foundations laid and a structure starts to take shape in the Save-On-Pool construction zone. Once all the spit and polish is applied, wouldn't it be as great to see this jewel of an asset shine amongst the many other beautiful, shiny and clean downtown buildings and businesses with doors flung open to welcome the massive amount of foot traffic the pool will bring to the downtown core?

This reminds me of the downtown clean up project that was pitched around local businesses by the Town of Princeton and Chamber of Commerce. A few took the hint and did some tidying. Others looked at paint samples not sure what did or did not match with flashing neon signs and whether or not there were bylaws in place to help with the final colour choices. Ultimately, the downtown clean up program is a good idea due for a dusting off and some serious up selling.

Perhaps better than discounts on paint prices the Town of Princeton could, you know, dip into the Community Forest bank account a bit and devise some sort of facade treatment grant program to entice some business owners to get on board. The Village of Keremeos has put a facade grant program in place this year.

Here are the general details of their program: "Successful applicants will be provided with a 50% reimbursement grant up to a maximum of \$2,000 per building project to improve the storefront facades of commercial buildings. Eligible improvements may consist of - but are not limited to - new exterior lighting, exterior architectural features, signage, awnings, new siding and facade painting. Projects must have a minimum total cost of \$500 in order to qualify for this program."

Maybe Town Council will do the same in order to prepare the downtown core to more or less match the quality of the Save-On-Pool. It would be nice to have a completely beautified downtown core once the pool is open for business as the cosmetics will go a long way in attracting interest in our community and showing our community pride.

"What do you need for internet? You need copper," Clark stated.
"The world is changing and we are going to need more electric cars and what do you need for electric cars? You need copper and

Clark went on to point out that, "the changes in the world don't mean we need less mining - the changes in the world mean we need more mining in British Columbia."

Two Candidates Oppose Globalism

The American presidential race is heating up in unexpected ways. Two candidates on opposing parties are gaining the votes of Americans despite heavy pressures of the ruling elite to stop their rise to power. The two candidates are Bernie Sanders, Democrat, and Donald Trump, Republican. A vast body of American voters are prepared to support them due to their stand on globalist trade treaties.

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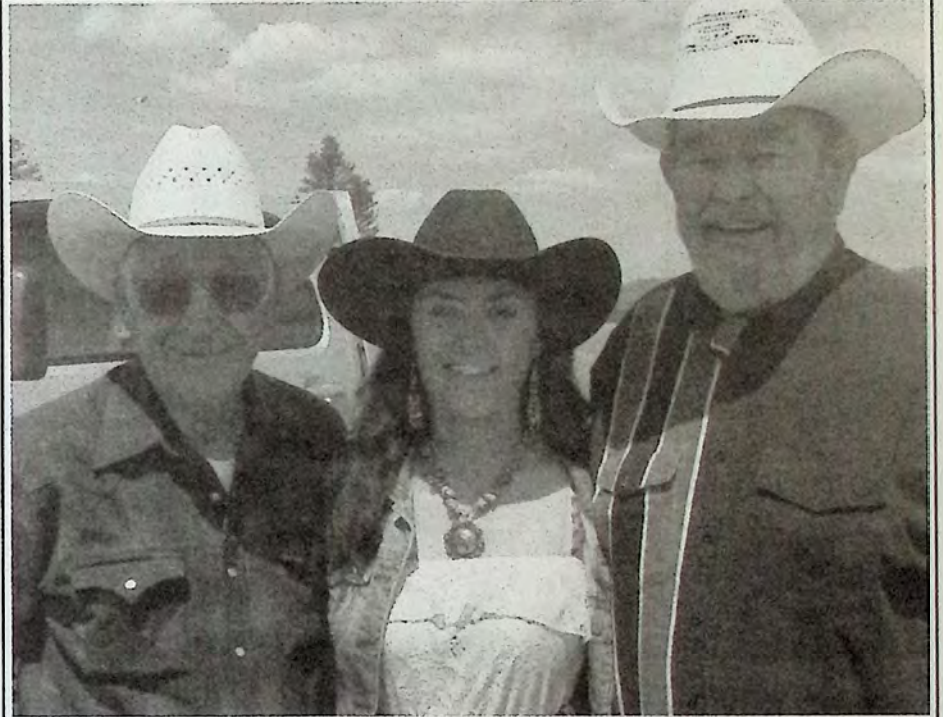

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Pets 'n' Vets

Make Your Visits Less Stressful

Many pet owners dread taking their pets to the veterinarian because of the stress on the pet regardless of the type of visit. Veterinarians also don't like seeing their patients stressed when they come to visit. Unfortunately, this is a large number of our patients because they only see their veteri-

narian for vaccinations or when they are sick, so it is not a very familiar experience. On top of that, stressed animals leave scent signals that other pets pick up on, not to mention the fact that they can become stressed when they smell other species. The good news is that there are very simple ways to

make your visits to the vet less nerve-wracking for you and your pet.

A good first step is to get your pet used to going for a vehicle ride. Many only go for car-rides when they are going to the vet. During the drive, they have plenty of time to get worked up, knowing that

they are going to the vet. If you drive past the vet clinic randomly without stopping in, your pet won't always associate the drive with a trip to the vet. This is especially important for cats since they rarely go on rides in vehicles.

Once your pet is used to going for vehicle rides in the area of the clinic, you can start stopping in randomly for visits. Most clinics encourage pet visits but you should always double check first. If it is busy, please respect the other patients and stop by another day.

Here's a tip: Stopping in for a weigh-in is a great, low-stress visit to get your pet over their fear of the veterinary clinic. It also lets you keep track of your pet's weight, preventing future joint problems.

Your veterinarian should also be a part of making sure the visit is as stress-free as possible. First and foremost, they should be calm and

try and let the patient become comfortable with them. Secondly, their clinic should be set up to reduce stress. Many veterinary clinics offer separate exam rooms and kennel areas for dogs and cats if they have the room for it. If their building is too small, they can utilize pheromone diffusers, much like plug-in air-fresheners. These pheromones are the same as those released by relaxed animals, and cover the scent of previous stressed pets.

Other clinics offer house-calls, either as a fully mobile clinic or for a slight service charge. By bringing the veterinary care to your pet's own environment, they are not stressed over being in a new place with other animal smells.

By working together, your veterinary team and you can help get your pet over their fear of the veterinary clinic, making it a more enjoyable experience.

Living Past 100

Protect Young Men's Sex Drive

Studies done in Italy and the United States have shown the use of, and addiction to, pornography is causing erectile dysfunction (ED) in men aged 15 to 25. Studies done prior to 2010 showed an ED level of a maximum of three percent. Current levels are 1,000 percent higher in an age group noted for being at its sexual peak.

Researchers found the influence of internet streaming of pornography has increased the availability of pornography to young men. For those who become addicts of porn, the problem is their inability to become sexually aroused except by porn. One out of every three young men found it difficult to become aroused with a real sexual partner, making a bonding sexual relationship impossible.

The bonding sexual relationship is the foundation of marriage and raising children. A good bonded relationship includes not only sexual pleasure, but intimacy, sharing of deep affection, and sharing of goals, plans, emotions and responsibilities. When a young man's perception of sexuality is based on images of fake relationships, and when sexual arousal and satisfaction occur as a single response dependent on a computer, there is just one person and a machine involved. There is an absence of real intimacy with a real partner.

The problem of addiction to pornography has real life consequences in the sense that the natural social environment of young people, that is, social interaction leading to finding a life partner, is hampered by the inability to successfully form a bonded relationship. Sexual expression is isolated in a relationship between the man and his computer. This is unnatural, and researchers found more and more young men are seeking help to end the addiction.

As in all addictions, the goal is to stop the addictive behaviour. This requires treatment in a specialized environment. As pornography addiction is a new social behaviour, treatment facilities are not readily available.

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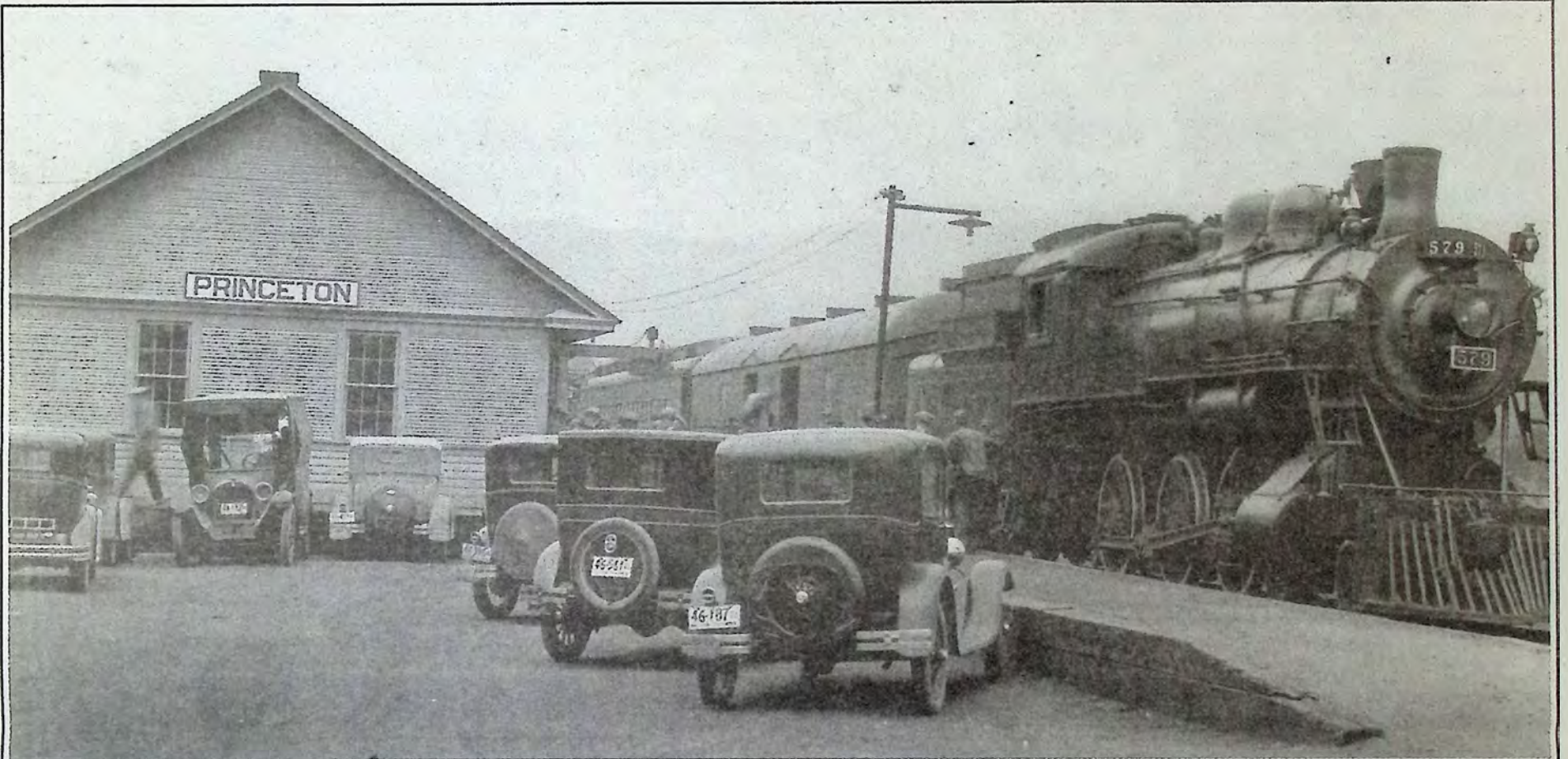

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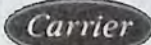
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Museum seeks your input

Recently the Museum hosted several very popular presentations by Joe Smuin about the Kettle Valley Railway as it runs through Princeton. Last summer a presentation on the Princeton area's fossil history attracted a standing room only audience. In the fall the Museum hosted a presentation on 'Soviet Princeton,' a book Jon Bartlett and I wrote about the 1932 Princeton coal miners' strike. If you have ideas about presentations you would like to see, the Museum would love to hear them.

The basement of the Museum is a treasure trove of artifacts and archives. The artifacts are all catalogued but are in need of detailed and ongoing organization. The archives, especially the newspaper collection, need to be digitized. Paper deteriorates over time and eventually the written records of our local history will become inaccessible. Digitization will preserve

them and will also make the contents of the archives much more user-friendly for researchers. At the moment, anyone searching for information about a topic must ask the manager to find the appropriate documents. Then they need to search through the documents to find what they need. With digitization they can type in a key word relating to their research and immediately find all the relevant information. Digitizing the archives is expensive so any fundraising ideas towards this project would be enthusiastically received.

Another focus of the Museum is education. School groups come to the Museum to explore and experience our local history. It would be wonderful to enhance these activities by producing resources for teachers or setting up visits to schools for historical presentations. The Museum welcomes any suggestions for improving and expanding our educational footprint.

These are just a few of the activities that the Museum is involved in. Please come to the 'Tea and Talk' session on May 19th to share your ideas. Refreshments will be served.

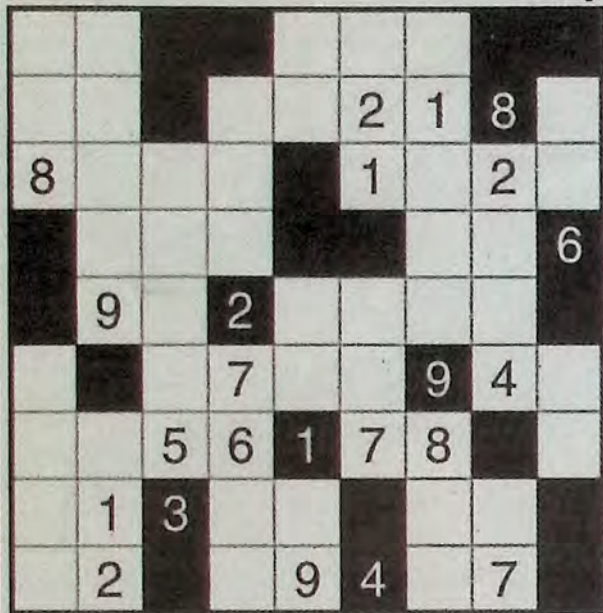

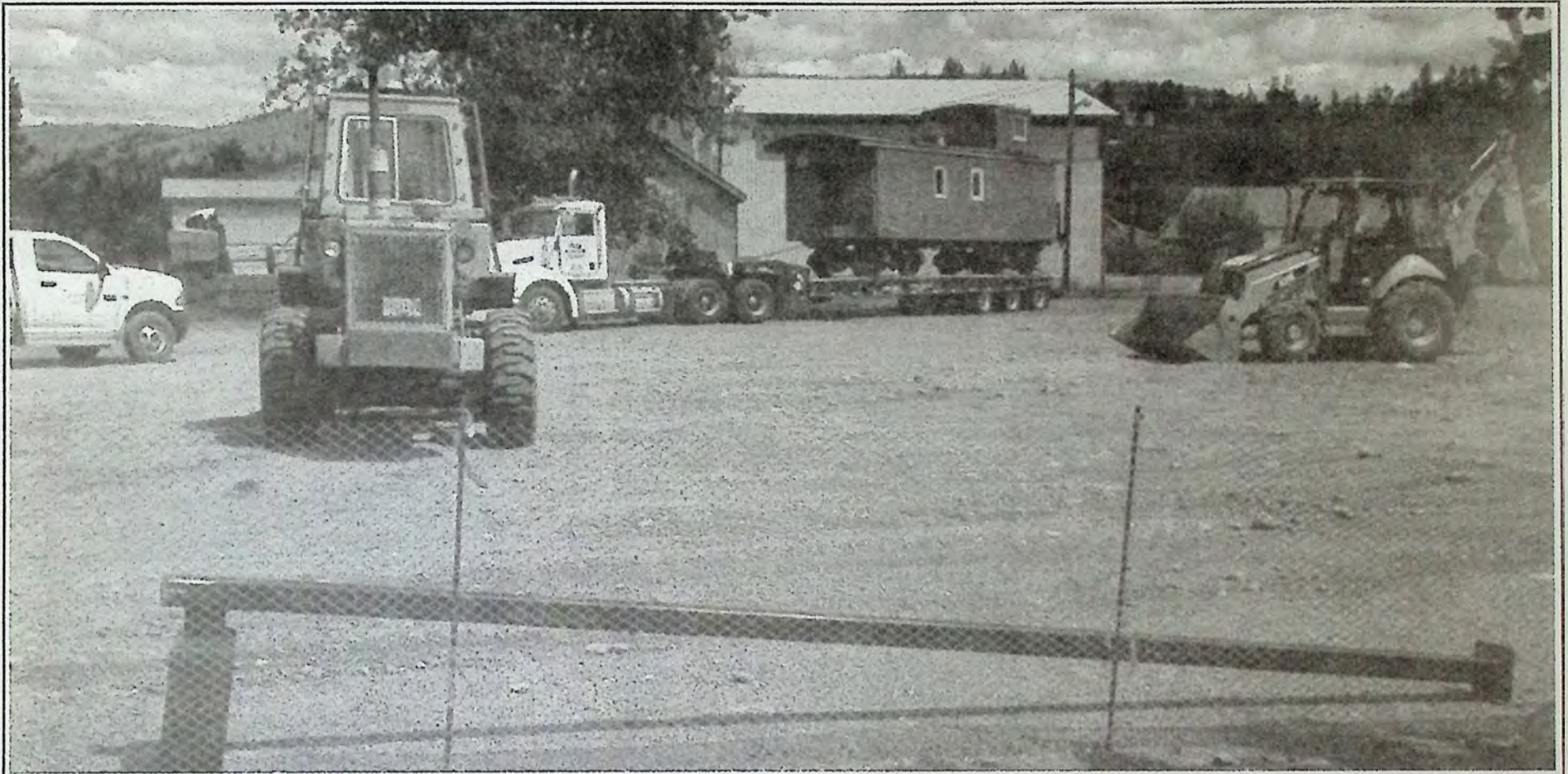

Saving Downtown Princeton...

...An Ongoing Series by George Elliott

Two key pieces of the puzzle fell into place last week.

I'm talking about the puzzle that will eventually solve the economic woes of the Town of Princeton. The move of the caboose to a highly visible location along the Trans-Canada Trail suddenly makes the

promises made by Town Council seem a bit more real. Let's face it, they had to do something to show they are serious about the plans they have for our community.

The other puzzle piece was the opening of the new Upper Similkameen Community Market.

From what I have heard from more than one of my contacts involved in that project, the quick turnaround caught many by surprise - including members of Town Council. Regardless of who said what to whom, we should be embracing these changes because, for a change, nobody is saying that something can't be done "because we've always done it this way."

So why do I think these are important parts of a bigger puzzle?

First off, the moving of the caboose makes way for the giant information sign that will sit on Highway 3 at the foot of Bridge Street. It will have a lot to do with traffic flow into the downtown core. I don't care how big it is, the politics surrounding the deal or anything else related to the sign. I know it will work.

I do think you will find some signage bylaws will suddenly change or get amended to accommodate the 3-storey, bright, flashing structure. I

say this simply because if you venture downtown late in the evening you will discover little in the way of bright, flashing lights due to outdated signage bylaws.

The Town of Princeton has expressed more than once a willingness to be flexible when it comes to some bylaws. I heard this with my own ears during numerous meetings between town representatives and business owners/operators at Riverside that ended once recommendations were shared with our elected officials.

Secondly, as for the new market, it was no surprise to me whatsoever that 'band land' became the new home of the weekly activity. It could have been downtown providing a magnet to the retail core, but parking was probably the main issue. Regardless of whether or not you agree with me that these two changes are going to be beneficial to our community, at least something is happening.

As for the hinted-at wellness aquatic centre, I think we all need to take a giant step backwards and look at Princeton from the eyes of someone who has never been here before. Do you find it attractive? Sure, the downtown core is looking better and there are some really, really nice features to our town. Would that be enough to make you suddenly move here?

I have stressed before the need for upgraded infrastructure to attract and retain population. It's more than sewers and water. It's a whole lot of things that define the character of our community. I'm not in the least bit worried about how an aquatic centre, if that is the overall goal to fill the former Overwaitea Foods property, is going to be built in Princeton. Building it is the easy part. Funding will be available and now taxpayers will not have to foot the bill on buying the property for such a venture.

My concern has nothing to do with the construction. My concern is centred on how it will be kept

open after it has been built and the novelty wears off. Our mortgage is paid off in two years. Possibly that'll be our cue to leave Princeton

for someplace with better medical services and activities to keep us occupied. Those are infrastructure items as well and it is those kinds of things that add to what makes a community attractive. I don't fault our current Town Council for trying to make Princeton a better place to live. The sad thing is that the time bomb is ticking and more and more residents are running away to not

get hit by any of the shrapnel.

Some are setting up roadblocks and hurdles to make it more difficult for these changes to take place. I know I'm tired of waiting for progress but that's the funny thing about progress - it takes time.

How does this save downtown Princeton?

There is nothing wrong with forcing elected officials to slow down

and take things a step at a time with anything related to infrastructure. That being said, it also doesn't hurt to try to see things in a positive light. Will a pool improve the town? Possibly. Will a pool increase the population? Possibly. Will a pool save Princeton? Possibly. No one really knows and sometimes we just have to step out into the unknown in order to push for change. I'm not convinced a pool is the answer but I do admit that it is most certainly part of the solution. With that in mind, I support the notion that a wellness/aquatic centre isn't going to kill the community. How much it'll help us is anybody's guess.
