## Province invests \$400K at high school

Students, parents and teachers at Princeton Secondary School will see a revamped and refreshed school thanks to \$400,000 going to School District 58 under the province's School Enhancement Program.

The project consists of an upgrade to the school's heating and ventilation system. Along with the provincial government's \$400,000 contribution, School District 58 is providing \$200,000.

The province's \$45-million School

Enhancement Program is improving 80 schools across every district this year. Districts applied to the Ministry of Education this spring, and successful projects were chosen based on need and priority.

As a result of B.C.'s fiscal discipline and its balanced budget, the government is able to support key investments like the School Enhancement Program.

## Province plans improvements to Kentucky-Alleyne

Kentucky-Alleyne Provincial Park will be undergoing major renovations including adding day-use amenities, improving campgrounds

and reducing impacts on toad migration, Fraser-Nicola MLA Jackie Tegart said May 18th.

A \$30,000 concept plan for the

park, 40 kilometres southeast of Merritt, is being developed this season and includes impact assessments (arch, current facilities and

environmental), as well as input from park staff, operator and users.

The park's campgrounds are in need of refurbishing. The Kentucky

Lake campground requires access-road adjustments to prevent user conflicts and improve safety, and some campsites may be impacting toad migration. There is also a need to add day use to meet user demands and mitigate conflicts.

Construction is scheduled to begin next year and completion is expected in 2018.

"The addition of facilities for day-use visitors will greatly improve visitor satisfaction and increase the number of overall visits," Tegart said.

"Kentucky-Alleyne Provincial Park is a very popular spot and these changes will benefit all users."

One of the largest park systems in the world, British Columbia has the highest percentage of its land base dedicated to protected areas of all .....continued on Page 2

## Fireworks out, fireworks in

Town Council gave three readings in January to a bylaw governing the sale, possession and discharge of

fireworks in Princeton. At the May 17 public meeting, Council rescinded the bylaw and gave three readings

to a replacement bylaw.

The new bylaw states, "a person or organization may get approval from Council to discharge fireworks for observance of celebration of a special event or festival; sales of fireworks will be permitted with a valid business licence...sales only permitted between October 18 - 31 and December 18 - 31."

The new bylaw is an amended version of the January bylaw. The

bylaw deals with discharge of a firearm or bow within Town boundaries, including a \$200 fine for violations, and fines between \$200 to \$300 for fireworks violations. Local RCMP will be able to enforce both the new bylaws outside the scheduled bylaw hours and issue tickets.

Disputed tickets can be referred to Provincial Court. Copies of the entire bylaw are available at Town Hall.

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# BC Premier visits Copper Mountain

The Premier and MLA's then attended Princeton Mining Day in the town centre where everyone from grandpa's with a long history of working at Copper Mountain to newly born babies were in attendance showing their support for mining in BC. One of the big charities that are supported by mining and by the BC Mining Week is the BC Children's Hospital that has benefited by more than \$20 million in donations since the Mining for Miracles campaign started back in 1988.

Jim O'Rourke, President and Chief Executive Officer of Copper Mountain said, "we are very pleased to have had the Premier and the MLA's take the time out of their busy schedule to participate in Mining Day and show their support for the Copper Mountain Mine near Princeton and for all of mining in British Columbia. The BC government recognizes the significant contribution that mining makes to BC.

Having the chance for the town of Princeton to come out and meet the Premier and the two MLA's is extremely positive for all involved." *About Copper Mountain Mining Corporation:* Copper Mountain's flagship asset is the 75% owned Copper Mountain mine located in southern British Columbia near the

town of Princeton. The Company has a strategic alliance with Mitsubishi Materials Corporation who owns the remaining 25%. The Copper Mountain mine commenced production in the latter half of 2011, and has continued to improve its operations since start-up. The 18,000 acre site has a large resource

of copper that remains open laterally and at depth. The mine has significant exploration potential that will need to be explored over the next few years to fully appreciate the property's full development potential. "Thanks to our government's fiscal discipline, we are able to assist Princeton Secondary School with necessary infrastructure improvements that will benefit all students."

The projects have to be substantially complete by March 31, 2017.

This year's \$45-million School Enhancement Program builds on last year's \$35-million Routine Capital Program investment, which supported 109 school improvement projects throughout the province.

Budget 2016 provides \$1.7 billion in capital funding over three years to replace aging facilities, build more student spaces in growing communities and improve seismic safety.

town giving hands-on workshops to high school students as part of their visit to the southern interior communities of Merritt, Princeton, and Keremeos.

The Traveling Roadshow is a program started in 2009 by Dr. Sean Maurice from the University of Northern British Columbia that addresses the fact that students from rural and remote regions of BC have traditionally been under-represented in the health care professions. The Roadshow group consisted of eleven university students representing a wide range of health care areas, including family practice, nursing, speech pathology, lab technology, midwifery, massage therapy, and occupational therapy.

Presentation of this program in Princeton was the result of several months of work by Nienke Klaver, Secretary of the Support Our

Health Care (SOHC) Society. She had read about this very effective and successful program and contacted Dr. Maurice to see if he and his group were willing to come to Princeton to give workshops to our high school students. Dr. Maurice liked the idea but indicated that it would be necessary to line up two other communities to make it worth their while. Support for this program was first received from Patrick Kaiser, Principal at Princeton Secondary School. The High School Principals in Merritt and Keremeos were then approached and they all agreed to host the Roadshow in their communities.

In total, the group gave eight workshops, three to students at Merritt Secondary School on May 16, followed by three at Princeton Secondary School on May 18, and .....continued on Page 6

Over the past five years, BC Parks has invested about \$60 million in park facilities, delivering projects directed at attracting young families, offering new recreation opportunities and increasing attendance. In 2015 alone, more than \$13 million was invested into facility and capital projects in parks across B.C.

B.C.'s provincial parks receive more than 21 million visits each year.

Since 2001, more than 2.3 million hectares of land have been added to the province's protected areas system through the establishment of 84 new parks, 156 conservancies, two ecological reserves, 14 protected areas and the expansion of more than 80 parks, six ecological reserves and three protected areas.



# Flip Of The Coyne

Last week I was sitting at work wondering what was happening at the Tourism Trade Show hosted by Town up at the Riverside Centre. I saw one post on Facebook by someone from one of the booths, but that was all I could find online. I started thinking about an event in Prince George that my cousin Norm organized called Northern Fancon where shortly before a presenter took stage, the event would update its social

media page so people knew when to be at what stage. Wouldn't it be cool if someone from the Tourism Trade Show had been live tweeting what was happening?

This is not meant to be a critique of the organizers of the Trade Show. They did a great job getting the first year off the ground. The Canada Day celebrations are coming up soon. What if Town had an official Twitter or Facebook account informing peo-

ple that sack races at town square start in fifteen minutes? People could subscribe to the social media accounts and get live updates on what is happening and when, and for those who don't participate on social media, the feeds could go straight to Town's website, so it would be as easy as visiting the website to get the same information. The News Leader does this with its social media accounts. When one account is updated, the

message arrives across multiple platforms including the website.

I talk a lot about social media, but for good reason. People use it more and more all the time. When people are active on social media they become engaged with what they are following. It is also an amazing way to get information out to the public quickly. For the opening weekend of the Upper Similkameen Community Market we created a Facebook event page that we shared to the appropriate parties on Facebook. Within the first 24 hours, the opening day event was seen by 1,400 unique users. That means within twenty-four hours, 1,400 people knew that the market would be opening on that Saturday. It is hard to argue with the efficiency of social media to disseminate information.

I know many businesses and governments are hesitant to join the world of social media, because if not handled right, your brand can be damaged and you can lose control of the message in the matter of moments. This is a worst case scenario. If your organization has someone with some people smarts, you can turn even the worst social media experience into a good one. I have

seen businesses diffuse irate customers within minutes with a simple acknowledgement of their problem and an offer of a solution. They took what could have been a PR disaster and created a repeat customer who will now go away talking about how helpful your company is. The same could be done by governments at all levels. A quick message on Twitter about an unscheduled water outage on your street turns a frustrating unknown into a moment where people are no longer in the dark about a problem or looking for whom to contact.

Thinking back to the idea of live tweeting at the trade show, it makes me think about all kinds of possibilities for local government, organizations and businesses. I know the News Leader has an active social media presence because George also believes that it is extremely handy in getting information out and connecting with your audience in a way that traditionally was not available to business. As intimidating as it can be there are countless tools online for turning social media into a powerful tool for your business or organization, such as Hootsuite, a social media management platform.

## Museum looks at plans for future

The May 19 meeting of Princeton's Museum Society members began with a short video on today's museums and how they attract visitors. The speaker, a curator of a large museum, stressed that museums are meant to be not just a place to visit to see old things, but a cultural experience. The public is invited to participate in activities taking place at the museum. Artifacts are more than historical objects, they are social and cultural objects.

With that in mind, members heard about the various possibilities for more public participation in museum activities. The processing of accepting and cataloguing artifacts

requires a great deal of help. Volunteers Darrell Dobie, Marjorie Holland, Jon Bartlett and Lori Weissbach gave brief descriptions of areas of work they do in the Museum. Dobie works on the preservation of old newspapers, Weissbach on the preservation and identification of old photographs, and the others on the process and material requirements of managing the collection. It was clear many volunteers are needed to do the work of bringing the museum cataloguing and preservation up to date. John Henry, a volunteer who sorts through the museum's outstanding collection of fossils, explained the

need for more volunteers to assist with this task.

Fundraising is a major concern of Museum Society members, and a number of suggestions were made to bring in money for future projects. Financial goals for each project will be established and acted upon. One of the goals is a celebration of Canada's 150th anniversary of Confederation, and a Canada 150 committee was formed to determine the nature of the celebration and to apply for grant money for an event inviting public participation.

## Earth: A Dangerous Planet

In our solar system, Earth is the only planet where life such as ours could exist. On the other hand, Earth is not nearly as safe as we would like it to be.

Right now, 40 volcanoes are erupting, blowing their tops even as you read this. We are just into the fifth month of the year, and we have five more volcanic eruptions going on that usually occur in a whole year.

The number of major earthquakes have increased during the past year or so. They are doing more than the usual damage. The terrible Nepal earthquakes last year lowered the entire Himalayan mountain range by one metre. The recent Japan quakes appear to be tearing the island in half. The violent New Zealand quakes appear to be tearing apart the North Island from the South Island.

In the wake of the first two major quakes on the Japanese island of Kyushu, a strange foam emerged from the earth and covered the streets in Fukuoku. The source of the foam remains a mystery, but such foam is frequently related to sea water being stirred up, which

makes one wonder just what is going underground.

Water going underground is a big concern in Mexico. In one location, the earth cracked, and the crack ran right across a river bed. The river now flows as far as the crack, and then flows into the crack, leaving everybody downstream without irrigation water. In another location in southern Mexico, a river which feeds into another river developed a sink hole into which half the water volume now flows. Both rivers are now at 50 percent normal capacity. The big question: where is the water now, and what is it doing where it is now?

These are some of the more unusual events on a planet notorious for events such as tornadoes, hurricanes and typhoons. Golf ball size hail happens frequently, but one town in Texas was hit with baseball sized hailstones that smashed windows in cars and homes, punched holes in vinyl siding, and dented metal objects such as tin roofs, cars, and lawn furniture.

In Uruguay, tornadoes are so rare that people are shocked when one happens. We were treated to not only the usual destruction photos, but photos of dead dairy cows thrown against at farm fence during the tornado.

The number of marine animals washing up on beaches is amazing and horrifying this year, and one river in Florida saw all of the marine life wiped out overnight, leaving a 30 km. stretch of river filled with floating carcasses.

The Middle East has seen more rain during the past three months than it normally receives in a decade. People have died from

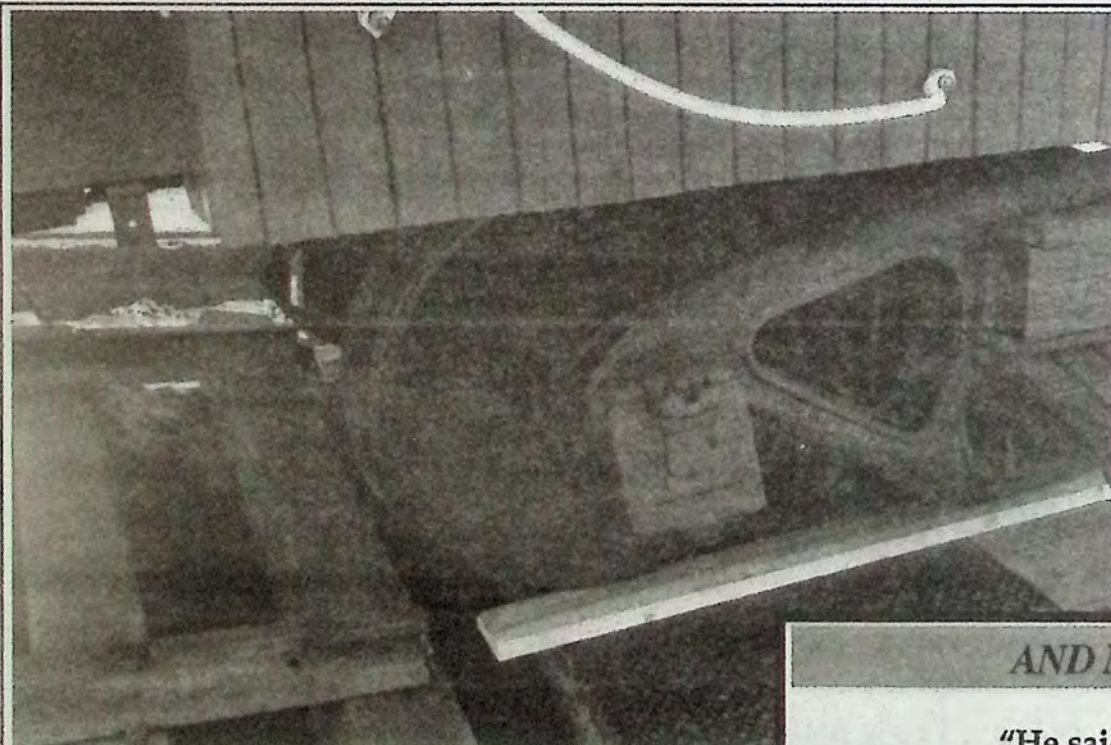
floods in the desert! Snow has fallen for the third winter in Saudi Arabia. Of course, these are not the only floods that have happened so far this year, the most notable of which have occurred in Texas and Nevada. Downtown Las Vegas was a mess for a couple of days.

In Russia, wind became the problem in one city where an entire roof was blown off an apartment building. Russia has had a big problem with sink holes, one of which has endangered an entire suburb as it continues to expand.

In California, beach front properties near Los Angeles have become endangered by the heavy waves in our greatest recorded El Nino, which typically bring stormy conditions to the state's shores. This time, the waves undermined the cliffs to the point where an apartment building had to be evacuated. Perhaps this is easier on the nerves than having your apartment building fall into a gaping sink hole, which is what happened to a building in China.

Our planet revolves on its axis daily, continuously moving the surface and we live on the Earth's crust. This crust is remarkably thin when compared with the volume of semi-dense material enclosed by the crust. The continents shift, the tectonic plates slide over and under each other, the Sun's rays affect the temperature, so we have winds, the oceans ebb and flow with the Moon's influence, and as important and powerful as we may believe we are, there's not a damned thing we can do about it.

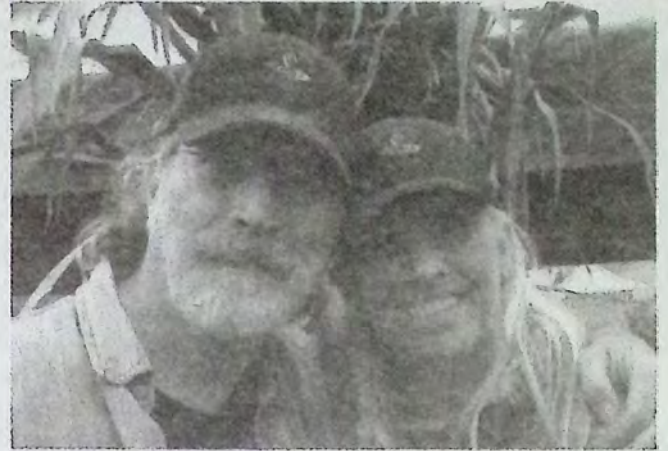
For those who pride themselves in 'living on the edge,' reduce your hat size and face the truth: all of us on this planet are living on the edge every day.

This is the first time that the Traveling Roadshow has toured in southern BC communities. It is hoped that the introduction of this program to our area will establish a Traveling Roadshow sponsored by colleges and universities in the south. Already there is interest

from UBC Okanagan in Kelowna and Selkirk College in Castlegar who sent staff members to observe the tour and learn about the program.

An important side benefit to this program is that it offers university students the opportunity to get a glimpse into what life, and establishing a practice, would be like in rural areas of BC. To achieve that purpose, the Mayor and Council in all three communities sponsored a dinner for the group, where the university students had a chance to meet elected officials and sample the hospitality of each community. SOHC would like to thank Mayor Neil Menard of Merritt, Mayor Manfred Bauer of Keremeos, and Mayor Frank Armitage for their

support of this important program. This program has the potential to address the shortage of health care professionals that exists in most rural BC communities. As Nienke Klaver said in her speech to the students on Wednesday evening, "We witnessed first hand at the workshop sessions how dedicated and passionate the students all are and we hope their enthusiasm will lead to a greater number of rural students choosing to pursue a career in the medical professions." 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# Princeton Health Care Steering Committee

## May Meeting Report by Edward Staples, PHCSC

The monthly meeting of the Princeton Health Care Steering Committee (PHCSC) was held at Princeton General Hospital on May 17. The meeting was attended by representatives from the Town of

Princeton, Area H (RDOS), Interior Health, BC Ambulance Services, and Support Our Health Care (SOHC). The meeting was chaired by Town of Princeton Councillor, Kim Maynard.

Members of the Healthcare Traveling Roadshow were guests at the meeting. Under the leadership of Dr. Sean Maurice of the University of Northern British Columbia, this group of university students were in

town to make healthcare career presentations to high school students at Princeton Secondary School. The group was invited to attend the meeting to observe the collaborative work being done to improve health care in our community.

April 25 and 26 in Kamloops, where he made a presentation on the contribution SOHC has made to the improvement of Princeton's model of health care.

A large portion of the meeting was devoted to the completion of a review of the Areas for Development as outlined in the Health Care Community Consultation Summary Report. The Committee agreed on several areas that will be included in a revision of the Action Plan.

Susan Brown, IH representative on the Committee, announced that NP Tanya ter Keurs is now on maternity leave and Viola Brown will be taking her place, providing continued coverage on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday at Cascade Medical Clinic.

Keith Olsen announced that he will be the official Area H representative on the Steering Committee. In that capacity, he will be serving as one of the three Co-Chairs.

The Steering Committee would also like to congratulate Dr. Ella Monro and her husband Paul on the birth of their son, Walton Myles Wakefield Monro, who arrived on May 1st. The next meeting of the Steering Committee is scheduled for June 21st.

The Community Outreach presenter for this month's meeting was Joseph Savage, Mental Health and Substance Use Manager for Interior Health. His presentation gave information on the broad range of clients that are served by his department, including therapy, counseling, psychiatry, and coordination of care for individuals dealing with mental health issues. Savage informed the Steering Committee that he is heading up a review of services with the goal of providing a more robust model of care for residents of Princeton and Area.

Edward Staples, President of Support Our Health Care (SOHC) Society, gave a report on SOHC's recent activities which included an update on the work being done by Lynn Wells to develop an information brochure on health and healthcare services available in our community. Keith Olsen provided information on the planning being done to have a series of healthcare workshops beginning in September. It was also reported that SOHC Vice President, Bill Day attended the Rural Health Services Conference,

## Princeton's exhibition grounds 'outgrowing' volunteers



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Paul Bedard, President of Princeton Exhibition Association (PXA), says Princeton's exhibition facility is outgrowing the ability of volunteers to do what is needed to keep it running. At the May 17 PXA meeting, speaking from his personal experience of being exhausted by demands made on him, Bedard suggested it is time PXA turned the operation of the facility over to the Town of Princeton. Bedard, who is employed full time, stated he simply cannot keep up with the demands. If the operation of the grounds is turned over to the Town, users would be obliged to deal directly with Town Hall, and taxpayers would be expected to pay more for grounds upkeep and management.

He reviewed the efforts of the weekends to prepare for the Back Country Horsemen's Rendezvous, which will involve 250 people with more than 100 horses to be accommodated at the grounds. The Back Country people came to help with pressure washing and painting the barns, as well as grounds clean-up and repairing pens, but members of local user groups, particularly those people interested in horsemanship events, have shown little interest in helping repair pens.

It was suggested to Bedard that he hire help, but he said he does not have enough free hours to supervise

workers, nor the time to go out and find them. He added that many of the PXA and user group members are older people, not able to do a lot of work.

Councillor Douglas Pateman suggested a meeting between members of Town Council, the PXA and user group members be held soon to discuss what can be done to improve the situation. Members agreed to hold such a meeting at the library conference room on June 7 at 7:00 PM.

In other PXA concerns, the grandstand is under renovation, as is Building #2. The Fall Fair held a work party, cleaning the washrooms and preparing to paint in Building #2, some weeding chores were done, but as only four people showed up, not much could be done. The grounds will be mowed by the Town crew for the Back Country event, at a cost of approximately \$3,000 extracted from the PXA budget. Members gave approval to seeking a multipurpose small tractor unit with a trailer to take care of many of these chores. Doug, Jim and Jen Bernard have done a number of updates to various areas.

The fire safety company inspected the concession gas system and all fire extinguishers, replacing one. A couple of minor improvements were made to the concession area, new

floor paint and new shelving. A new hot water tank is needed soon.

There was no report from Princeton Rodeo Club, as there was no Rodeo Club representative at the meeting. There was no representative from Princeton Riding Club, but Paul Bedard reported the club had held a highly successful event on May 14. Councillor Pateman gave a brief report on Princeton MotoX progress. The group is now a chartered society, and will be expected to send a representative to PXA meetings to report on their activities and plans. There is a potential for an event in Princeton this fall. The Fall Fair advised on work planned for the summer, including removal of a false front and building a fence around the animal display area. Wire fencing removed from the grandstand is available for the project and there are fence posts on site that can be used, keeping costs down.

A document entitled Guidelines for User Groups was circulated. Some amendments were proposed. When the wording of the guidelines is approved by members, the document will become part of the policy of the PXA.

The next regular meeting of PXA takes place on June 21 at 7:00 PM at the grounds office. Anyone may attend.

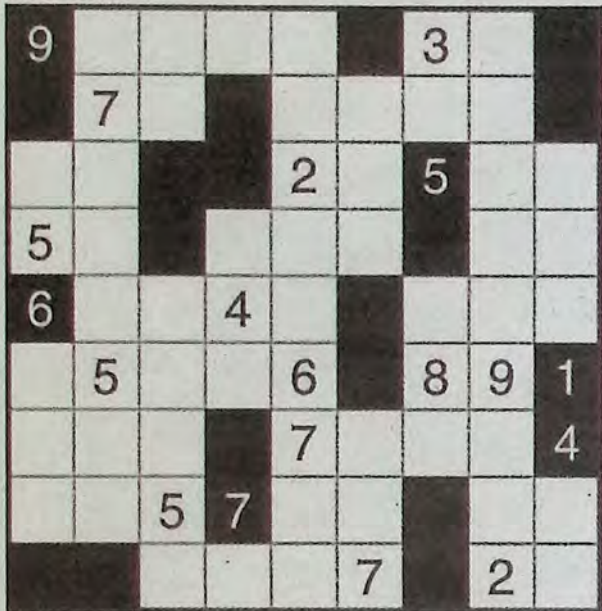

## Province releases South Okanagan/Similkameen national park process report

A report summarizing a public consultation process relating to proposed protected areas, including national park reserve (NPR) status, in the South Okanagan-Similkameen was released May 20th by the British Columbia government. The 81 day process was launched August 13, 2015 and generated 3,460 comments.

"We are really happy the report has finally been released, and we look forward to the BC government sitting down with the federal government and First Nations governments to move this process forward again," said Gwen Barlee,

National Policy Director with the Wilderness Committee.

"Establishing a national park reserve is widely supported here and would be excellent news for BC from an environmental and economic perspective."

The report, which did not identify the number of national park supporters or opponents, found themes related to the inadequacy of protection provisions in the region, the importance of connectivity between protected areas and support for a national park reserve. It also highlighted concerns related to hunting access and

recreational opportunities.

Although the report appeared to minimize comments which supported a national park, the appendices showed that the creation of a national park reserve was supported by a large majority of local and provincial groups. There were 27 organizations supporting national park designation versus six groups in opposition.

The South Okanagan-Similkameen ecosystem is one of the most endangered in Canada in terms of rarity, diversity and species richness. Bobolinks, badgers and burrowing owls are just a

handful of the species at risk found in the region. Thirty per cent of BC's red-listed species, and 46 per cent of the province's blue-listed species are found here.

The consultation process hit a few bumps in the road initially when local MLA Linda Larson proposed striking an anonymous handpicked five-person panel to review public comments. After a

strong public outcry, the secret panel proposal was abandoned.

"At the end of the day the report shows the vast majority of people who participated in the public consultation process support a national park in the South Okanagan-Similkameen. Now we need to respect the public's wishes and get on with implementing it," said Barlee.

A total of twenty participants had tables/booths set up which virtually filled the venue. It was an interesting mix ranging from tourist-related businesses to non-profits to retail

businesses. The idea was to present a gathering place for participants to share information about what they provide to the community. The sharing was with each other and members of the public who dropped in during the six hours the event took place.

I have stood in line at more than one local business and heard a clerk answer the question of "What is there to do in Princeton?" with the standard "I dunno" or a variation of that. These are the people who need to be present at a Tourism Trade Show and I'm sure there were some there.

I'm not criticizing the event here. I'm just tossing out a few ideas because I was quite impressed with the look and feel of the event last Tuesday. I also think that with more participation the need for a larger venue would be next. I know that had it not been during a business day I may have been interested in having a table on site to promote what we do in my office.

Sure, that may sound odd to you but let me explain. We see a fair deal of tourist activity in our office

year round. We find ourselves doing a lot of 'tourist promotion' at the front counter sending people to this restaurant, that store or to somewhere they did not know existed. It never hurts to find out a little more about our community so we can better serve our customers by giving them correct and current information.

I see tremendous potential in a seminar of some kind that the Tourism Trade Show can become and provided local business operators buy into the value of such an exercise, it can help all of us in the downtown core. We get asked a lot of different things in our office and if it is something we can't answer, we know where to send you to find that answer - which is not on Facebook, either.

I think we all need to get back to how things used to be done before social media took over our lives. We need to wander up and down .....continued on Page 20

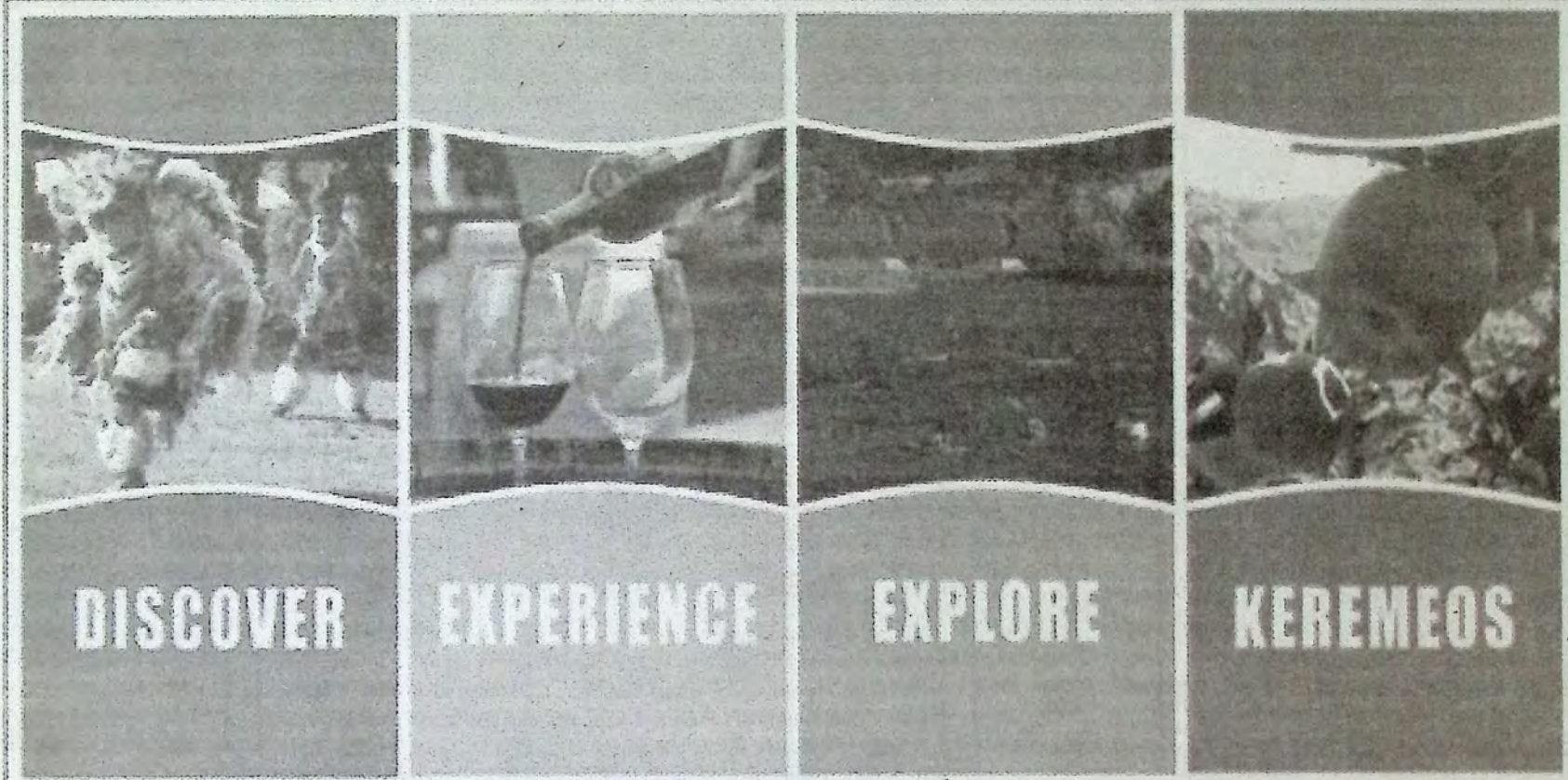

## Province invests \$1.39-mil in SESS

Students, parents and teachers at Similkameen Elementary School in Keremeos will see a revamped and refreshed school thanks to \$1.39 million going to the district under the province's School Enhancement Program.

It was announced on May 19th.

The project is a mechanical upgrade to replace the existing gas-

fired roof-top unit with dual fuel air source heat pumps. Along with the provincial government's \$1.39-million contribution, School District 53 is providing \$100,000.

The School Enhancement Program is improving 80 schools across every district this year. Districts applied to the Ministry of Education this spring and successful projects

were chosen based on need and priority.

As a result of B.C.'s fiscal discipline and its balanced budget, the government is able to support key investments like the School Enhancement Program.

"Through the School Enhancement Program, Similkameen Elementary School will receive much-needed

improvements that will benefit students, teachers and staff," Boundary-Similkameen MLA Linda Larson said.

"This is another example of how schools continue to benefit from B.C.'s balanced budget."

The projects have to be substantially complete by March 31, 2017.

This year's \$40-million School

Enhancement Program builds on last year's \$35-million Routine Capital Program investment, which supported 109 school improvement projects throughout the province.

Budget 2016 provides \$1.7 billion in capital funding over three years to replace aging facilities, build more student spaces in growing communities and improve seismic safety.

As for the aquatic centre, I think that is a good idea. I applaud council for trying to make a new indoor pool a reality, however to construct it in the downtown core may not promote business, dollars or tourism. I have my doubts about this. There is also the very real concern about what will happen once the building is constructed and the finances needed to keep it running and maintained may not be there when the 'novelty has worn off.'

The financials are definitely a concern at this time when our community is not experiencing growth and many shops are closed and boarded up. The reality is the mine - which is a wonderful financial resource for the community at this time, may not be here for us financially if commodity prices were to drop, and this stream of income will be gone. The town has been down this road several times, so we know of what we speak.

We have an industrial park that is having a difficult time enticing outside business interest. I have no idea how the town is trying to sell the land and opportunities for investors.

I would think industry that may fit in to rural living might have the best chance at success. Things like agricultural supply depot, a nursery/greenhouse operation, forestry/seeding operation, wine bottle manufacturing and depot/glass works. Is the town offering tax cuts, 0% interest loans for anyone really interested in investing over a million dollars to start an industry here in Princeton.

In my opinion, what will save the town of Princeton is what has saved it for decades, the rural people, their recreation, their ideas of fun, the way they have made a living and worked in our small community. This is what we should be promoting. By this I mean our theme should include all of this. Art work along the streets should depict our ways of making a living, cattle, horses, logging and mining. Not only that, it informs those seeking the 'rural experience' right away how this community has sustained itself. We are a rural community and we should be promoting 'the rural experience' and doing it with great pride.
