RDOS expense claims high for two

Two members of the Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen board filed five-digit expense claims last year, according to the organization's most recent statement of financial information. The top spender was board chairman Mark Pendergraft, the director

for Area A (rural Osoyoos), who billed \$12,294, and also received a \$60,456 salary for what amounts to a full-time job representing the RDOS. The next most-costly director was Elef Christensen, who represents Area G (rural Keremeos and Hedley). He billed taxpayers \$11,017 on top of his salary of

\$28,214. Christensen said travel costs for meetings in Penticton and around his area helped drive up costs. "That's the only thing I can think of that brings it up," he said in an interview June 19. Mileage indeed accounted for \$6,656 of his total claim, according to an analysis prepared by RDOS

finance manager Sandy Croteau. (The two directors from the Princeton area, Mayor Frank Armitage and Bob Coyne, who have to travel even further to attend meetings in Penticton, claimed total expenses of \$3,852 and \$4,886, respectively.) Christensen also billed \$1,727 for a Federation of Canadian

January 6, 1998 - July 26, 2016

I have recently been thinking about what I have been calling Firsts and Lasts.

For example, in the past week I attended my first PSS Paint Run as well as my last PSS Grad Ceremony. It has been an interesting mixture of Firsts and Lasts with mostly Lasts.

In the process of thinking about these things I have also been mentally reviewing some personal and business highlights. For me, I consider 'the experience' as a large part of what I would measure as a success. The Paint Run was a lot more fun for me than I expected it to be and I was only there taking photos.

When it comes to news, there are some very specific highlights that come to mind and three stand out for me.

At the top of the list would be the January 27, 2014 rockslide on Highway 3 a few kilometres West of Keremeos. It was a Monday and typically both Brenda and I travel to

Penticton to pick up the new issue of the paper from the print shop. For some reason I decided to stay behind to do some work in the office. Brenda was on her way back with the papers shortly after the slide occurred. She was close enough to it that she took her camera and snapped a series of photos from within the debris field until an RCMP officer escorted her out.

She went to a friend's in Olalla and started sending me photos taken up close of the slide. I started posting them on our Facebook page and I swear that barely 60-seconds passed from when the first photo was posted and the phone in the office starting to ring. CKWX in Vancouver, all major TV networks, regional news sources, KPQ Portland, Oregon and overseas sources soon latched on to this story and in addition to Brenda getting various interview opportunities, the majority of her photos continue to live online credited to Brenda

Engel/Similkameen News Leader.

That story and the speed in which it ignited a following and intense interest will forever be something I will remember. The "cat up a pole" story a couple months ago did much the same but it was not just the News Leader playing a major role in that one so it doesn't get on my list.

The second biggest story in my mind was the fire that destroyed the Princeton Hotel. The fire itself was big news, but what it did for this newspaper, will be what I will recall most.

I remember the morning quite well as I could see from our neighbourhood a tall black column of smoke climbing straight up into the sky. It was Saturday, April 8, 2006. I was on my way into work and by the time I turned onto Bridge Street from Highway 3 it was obvious that there was a major structure fire. I got into the office, grabbed a camera and tried to find a good spot for pho-

tos.

Access was denied in many places, which made sense so I chose to go 'up high' and climbed partway up the old 'zigzag' where Miner's Climb now sits. I was not alone and snapped a few photos.

The front page of the April 11th issue was finished but I changed it so I could replace the photo there with one from the fire and added a story with some details. I've made many last minute changes to front pages over the years so this was not an unusual matter. What I did not expect was to just about completely sell out of that issue of the News Leader. At the time we were printing between 1,300 and 1,400 issues weekly. That paper drained our complete supply, including any extras we received from the printer outside of our normal press run. Normally we receive another 50 to 100 extras per week.

We have never had a single issue

sell so many papers since. The issue that followed this one featured stories and photos of the Princeton Hotel with an emphasis on the history of the building. It did not sell as well.

The third story that stands out for me dates back to when I was still working at the local radio station and still figured significantly with the News Leader. It was in the first year the paper was in business when the night deposit safe was plucked out of the CIBC.

I was on my way into work at the radio station early the morning of May 13, 1998 when I came upon an unusual scene where a Cat 950F loader was left running in the middle of the street and a gaping hole was visible from the wall of the bank. RCMP on scene indicated I had missed the event by just minutes (it was noted as taking place at 4:15 AM, I was there 15-minutescontinued on Page 3

In some ways I can't help but think that we just witnessed the end of the United Kingdom. As a small majority voted for the United Kingdom to leave the European Union, Scotland and Northern Ireland did not and when the dust had settled the morning after the vote the discussion about Irish unity had began and Scotland was talking about another referendum to leave the the UK. While so many are asking what is next for the European Union we should be asking what's next for the United Kingdom?

To many of us the news that the people of the UK had voted to leave the EU came as a shock although

the polls were tight they were leaning towards 'stay.' The markets reacted the same way that we all did too - with shock. Northern Ireland. There are companies who have announced that they will be looking at leaving the UK for mainland Europe so they do not get caught up in what trade restrictions will arise from no longer being a part of the European Union and their trading zone. This will be a scary time for global markets.

One question we need to ask is will this help the Commonwealth? It is a very good question if Britain is left out of the European markets they will look towards traditional partners and that would be the commonwealth and especially Canada. The problem for Britain is that Canada is in the middle of a trade

agreement with the EU and if that goes through it could hurt the UK's chances with Canada.

Any way you look at the results of the Exit vote by the UK it will have long term impacts on trade around the globe. As other EU states examine their relationship with the Union more economic uncertainty will arise some of the smaller EU nations could face economic downturns and we could see the EU in the mess it was during the recession.

Closer to home the exit of the UK from the EU will encourage Quebec separatists. If Scotland and Northern Ireland leave the UK as a

result of this we will see more pro-Quebec independence rhetoric and possibly another referendum. For Canada's sake hopefully the economic uncertainty and worries will slow some of these whispers and Quebec will see that it is better off as part of Canada than on its own.

Whatever the end result of this decision by residents of the United Kingdom we can only sit and watch as it unfolds in front of us. We can hope that the economic ripple will not be as powerful as it is expected to be and that in the long run things will be ok. On the bright side Northern Ireland is talking about maybe uniting Ireland.

The Public Figure Penalty

I want to start by saying I mean no offense whatsoever to Jerome Tjerkstra or his business.

Last week his bid to take over the operation of the concession stand at Princeton Arena was turned down at the June 20th Town Council meeting.

Before you start jumping up and down, Tjerkstra, in case you don't know, is an elected (acclaimed) member of Princeton Town Council.

I'm not going to get into the nuts and bolts of the bid proposal itself because I'm not a very good judge of what should or should not be on a menu in an arena. I'm a 'burgers and fries' kind of guy when it comes to general concession food.

What I want to look at is how being a public figure has hurt the proposed change at the arena.

Let's suppose Tjerkstra's bid - which was the only one submitted - was selected. How do you think the average taxpayer would have looked at that? The only bid submitted, which happened to be submitted by a member of town council, in a facility operated by the Town of Princeton...do you see where I'm going with this?

I'm going to assume it was advertised and very likely promoted on the Town of Princeton website. I've said it before, the ToP website is not the easiest thing to pull information from and thankfully it will be replaced with something more user friendly.

Back to the arena concession stand bid.

When you are a public figure you end up under a magnifying glass. We have experienced that very same situation in our business and is one of the things I am looking forward to once we close the doors to the News Leader - the opportunity to blend in and be invisible.

Elected officials are under a much stronger magnifying glass. All you have to do is ask any of the previous Mayors who are still in Princeton (and owned and operated businesses) what happened when they made an unpopular decision.

Councillor Tjerkstra was just trying to expand his business which would have been a good move overall but in the eyes of the people he represents, it would have had a much different appearance. I feel for Jerome and his business because no one in business in Princeton should be penalized for trying to do something to solidify their future in the community. However, that seems to be how things go in a small town - we tend to look at things with a different filter than anyone else jumping to conclusions and trying to tear down someone's business venture without getting the full story.

We feel exactly that way at times in my office so I can completely relate to whatever Jerome may be feeling about this whole situation.

That being said, he deserves your support just the same.

Let's Remember What We Inherited

The history of North America is my family history. I can trace some of my ancestors back 400 years to Spokane's native Americans. Back then, some of my Scottish ancestors were arriving in Virginia along with the Crocketts and the Boones. Those early settlers fought the English in the American War of Independence, then fought in the War of 1812, the 'Indian' Wars, and the War Between the States. A few of them fought the war with Mexico to claim Texas, and one of them died at the Alamo. Some of them were slave owners, and others married Cherokees and were forced to suffer the indignity of being 'removed' on the trail of tears.

These were on my mother's side of the family, and from them came my great grandfather, half Cherokee, who came to British Columbia from California in 1858 to make money from the Cariboo gold rush and later the Granite Creek gold rush. When he died, his wife, a Similkameen native woman, would go to court and win the right for Indian women to inherit from their husbands.

On my father's side, the story was not so long. My grandfather was raised in a hovel in England's coal mining country, trying to raise a family on the pittance paid to coal miners by the rich mine owners. He snared some rabbits on the local lord's estate and was jailed for a week because all game belonged to the lord. My great-grandfather also lost his job because of this crime. His eldest son, John, went to work at age 10 in the local coal mine, and at age 12 was fatally burned in a mine explosion. My grandfather, as well as my grandmother, went to work in the mine at age 10. In those days, Sunday School was a real school, where these children learned to read and write.

My paternal grandfather became a union activist, campaigning for decent hours and decent wages. When he began, miners worked 12 hours shifts six days a week. Due

to his activities, my grandfather was blacklisted and emigrated to the United States. He was part of the last of the 'wild west,' traveling from mine to mine with the family in a covered wagon, preaching the gospel and trade unionism wherever he went. After eight years of this, my grandmother announced she would go back to England if he did not take her to a civilized place. He found a job in Nanaimo. During the remainder of their lives, they were to live in Prince Rupert, Stewart, and Vancouver as well as in Nanaimo.

That is the background of my family, but there is more to it than just those facts. What drove them was the search for social justice, always, the right of people to be treated with respect, no matter who they were. The Scottish ancestor came as an indentured prisoner for fighting the English for the freedom of Scots to rule their own lands. As Americans, the descendants fought the British for the freedom to rule their own lands. In the War Between the States, they fought to preserve the Union (they had freed their won slaves), and they had fought the Indians and Mexicans for the right to settle land and make a living.

My father's people campaigned for respect for the working class, those who made money for the rich. My grandfather loved the spirit of North America. He loved the right of the ordinary citizen to hunt and fish without having to beg permission from some lord. He loved that his children could go to publicly funded schools and if they were intelligent enough, they could go to a university regardless of social class. He helped bring in many of the safety laws that protect miners and other workers, and the Worker's Compensation and insurance for the unemployed.

When I lived in Belgium, I recall asking my Belgian neighbour why so many Belgians seemed to resent the Canadians from the NATO base.

"It is because you walk the earth like you own it," she said.

I understood. The police there could walk up to anyone and demand an identity card, and if you had left it at home, you were thrown in jail until it could be produced. You needed a permit to move from one house to another, a permit to travel from one town to another. When you moved, or traveled, the police would check to see you were living where you were supposed to be. Of course, you could not hunt or go fishing without a permit, just like here, but getting a permit was nearly impossible.

I sat at a sidewalk cafe in Paris and watched the people go by. It was easy to spot the North Americans. They did walk like they owned the earth. They did not walk along with their heads bent, wondering if a policeman or some person of power might accost them. The North Americans had never grown up in a system in which one was not free to go about one's honest business without bowing to others or being accosted by police.

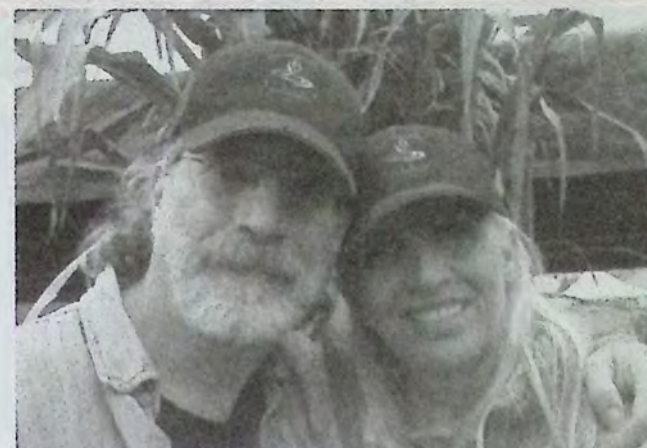
This is changing. There are more and more petty rules and regulations, more and more incidents of innocent citizens treated violently by police, more and more pressures to keep the working person poor. Increasingly, the citizen is expected to serve the government rather than the government serving the citizen. I see genetically modified foods being forced on us, and no labels offering us a choice, even though we have demanded it. I see efforts to force us to vaccinate our children despite increasing evidence of damage. I see plans like Agenda 21 trying to curtail services to rural populations to force us to move to cities, an agenda heartily supported by big real estate corporations. I see our heritage of freedom and respect for everyone being eroded, and I know that we must stand up against it.

I see those of us who do take action labeled as not just activists, but terrorists, and I hear of government programs that urge us to report our neighbours, just like the Nazis did. I hear of people writing on Facebook condemning others for minor things, demanding conformity to some sort of social 'norm.' I hear all kinds of scare tactics to try to make the population afraid of anything and anybody, which will lead them to demand the kind of security so rigid it becomes a form of prison. Worst of all, I hear of people losing their jobs, even being put in prison or murdered, for telling the truth.

This is not the pathway to liberty, it is the pathway to slavery, to dictatorship, and to the kind of life so many of our ancestors escaped by coming to North America. Will we keep on letting it happen? Or will we be among those who protect our society from endless conformity, imposed security, and censorship?

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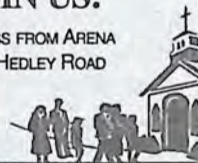
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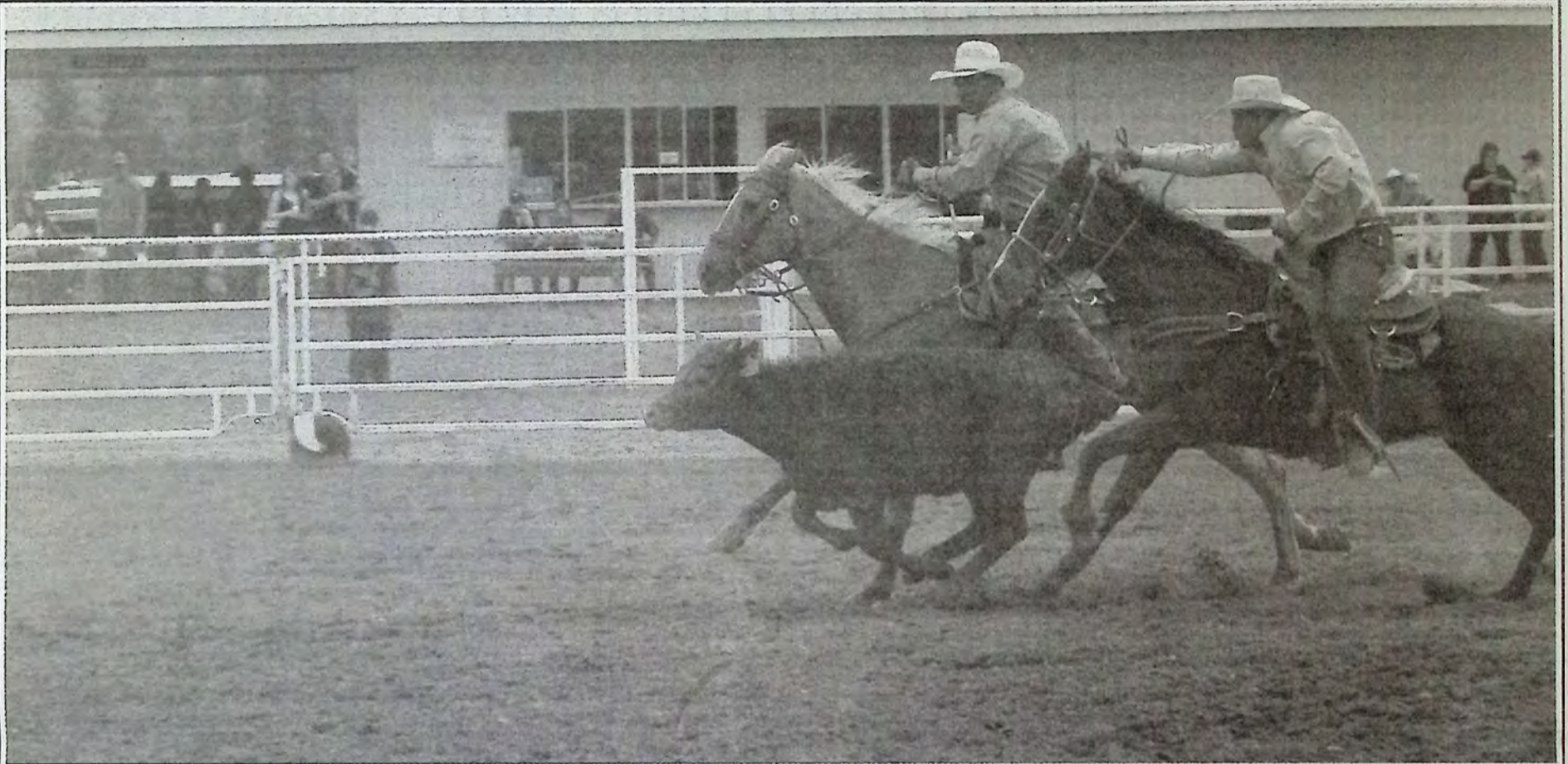

Town gives PXA new deal

Paul Bedard, President of Princeton Exhibition Association (PXA) was pleased to report to PXA members there is a new deal with the Town of Princeton. The Town has taken responsibility for the care of the exhibition grounds from the front of the grandstand to the main gate. Bedard said this will

free PXA and user groups to do more to other areas of the grounds while keeping the front ready for business.

Progress is being made on the Moto-X track, but it is far from ready to use. Princeton Motocross President Dan Lankinen told PXA members he has volunteers work-

ing on the project but they can do the work only when they have time off their employment. A fence will be built and gates secured in the future to prevent unauthorized use of the track. When complete, the track will offer practice hours twice a week for Motocross club members.

Bedard offered praise to Princeton Rodeo Club for the success of the 2016 rodeo, which was one of the best in years. Attendance was good, and people stayed to watch the horse races on both days. Brittany Shopshire won both races. Many foreign tourists attended, including an Australian who won the Best Butt in Blue Jeans contest. He left with the trophy and a good deal of exuberant bragging.

Praise for the Back Country Horsemen's Rendezvous showed Bedard was impressed with the way the group had worked before the event as well as their conduct during and after the event. Jennifer Bernard gave a report on problems encountered at the concession during the event. Electrical power was not adequate for the size of the crowd who

came to the buffet supper. The PXA will have an electrician look into the situation and find a solution.

PXA has purchased a small tractor and is going to buy attachments suitable for a number of different purposes. This equipment will greatly assist volunteers when preparing for an event or other activities.

Plans to renovate the tool crib are underway, and more painting and clean-up will be done during the summer. A weed-pulling crew will be hired in July to pull up noxious weeds on the grounds. Improvements will be made to the area used to exhibit livestock during the fair. The grandstand will be painted during the hot weather. No events are scheduled for the summer.

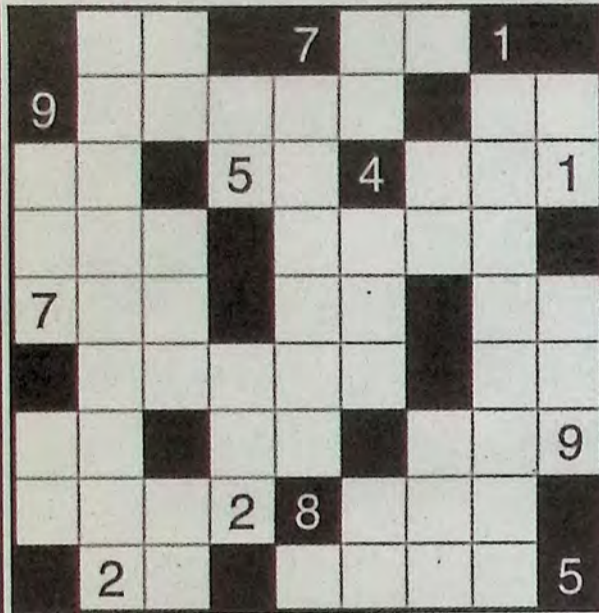

Worker at VFE, Barb Parker, organized a drumming lesson visit from Oly Bent, who traveled from Hedley. Oly had helped the students with the hides and drum-making and now visited Miss Batts' classroom in the final stage of the process to teach the students the 'Welcome Song.'

On June 21, Miss Batts' art students joined Oly at the Museum to celebrate National Aboriginal Day.

They proudly played their hand-crafted drums and celebrated the cultural experience in style.

It takes a village to raise a child and it certainly took many hands to make this special occasion happen.

GMO Crops Fail To Meet Promise

Genetically modified organisms, commonly known as GMO, were originally promoted as a means to increase crop yield and save a starving world.

The American National Academy of Science (NAS), founded by Abraham Lincoln, says GMO crops have not fulfilled their promise.

This might not seem like big news to the average consumer, but it does provide more ammunition for those groups who have fought, and lost, the battle for GMO labeling as well as eradication of GMO crops. The ammunition provided by the NAS is in a report filed in the May 2016 edition of the NAS journal.

The NAS has clout. It is the most respected organization of scientists in North America, and only those scientists of highest reputation are members.

When such an organization publishes a study that shows GMO crops yield no more than regular crops, that study is pure gold, and undermines the foundation on which GMO crops were approved.

A French scientist who did a study on rats fed on GMO foods saw a rapid increase in incidents of disease, particularly cancer. One of the people engaged in the research declared the study a fraud and not valid, and that fact was published and broadcast by news media across the world. What was not broadcast to any extent was the outcome of a court case two years later, in which it was shown that the study was accurate, and that the person who called it a fraud was probably 'bought off' by somebody to say the study was a fraud. The study, when published, was enough to alarm the public.

Despite the fact that the majority of consumers do not want their food messed with at the genetic level, governments have continued to balk at GMO labels and continue to allow GMO crops in Canada, as well as importing food from the United States with no indication of GMO contents.

The research done by NAS, added to the research by the French scientific study, should provide consumer groups and agriculturists with new strength to go back to government and demand an end to GMO crops.

Canada Day was traditionally in the shadow of Racing Days Weekend, regardless of how the dates fell on the calendar.

Saving Downtown Princeton...

It wasn't long ago when Canada Day weekend was a tiny little affair in downtown Princeton with balloons, free swimming at Centennial Pool, some cake and possibly games at Princeton Museum.

This was back when Princeton Racing Days more or less ruled the weekend that fell either just before or on July 1st. Racing Days was a long tradition that dated back to the

1900s but became a project in 1963 when a number of locals decided the community could use some tourism.

Sunflower Downs Race Track at the Princeton Fairgrounds was not the first race track in the area but it was the best known. By the time I came to Princeton in 1986 live horse racing was all the rage during summer months in the BC Horse

Racing Association with Princeton being the smallest event running but, according to many horse owners, riders, trainers and tourists, it was their favourite of the BC Interior Horse Race circuit.

It was a steep learning curve for me when I became Racing Days President in 1990 and missed my first event as "Co-President" due to the death of my father in Kelowna.

What I learned early on was that Racing Days was the anchor all other events latched onto for the big celebration known as Racing Days. The first year there were no races due to a shortage of horses and various other issues showed me how true this was. Attempts were made to replace the incredibly popular live horse racing event with bed races in downtown Princeton.

It was a good try, but did not attract the interest that spending time at Sunflower Downs did. That being said, events that were part of Racing Days still continue to this day long after the end of live horse racing in the region.

The Rotary Parade and Youth Ambassador Coronation are two examples. The Lions Pancake Breakfast and Duck Race continue but are now handled by the Legion. Class Reunions, Golf Tournaments and other smaller activities live on although many may not realize they got their start from the giant summer celebration known as Racing Days.

Since last year the Town of Princeton has taken on the Canada Day Celebration hosting many activities with a focus on July 1st. It

was a good idea to put a lot of effort into celebrating our Canadian Heritage as it had not been much to get excited about when Racing Days ruled the summer. One year Brenda and I attended Canada Day Celebrations in Keremeos and could not believe the all-day activities at Memorial Park there.

Of course, at the time Keremeos did not have a 'Racing Days-type' event to work around so it was easy for the Village (and mostly the Chamber of Commerce there) to put together something significant for July 1st.

I do think the Town of Princeton has done a good job of building Canada Day into a big celebration. What is still missing - in my view - is the 'big draw' item. There still needs to be that giant magnet to pull people into Princeton for more than the parade, coronation and cake. I said it this time last year and I will say it again: think about the roots and history of this celebratory weekend. It came from racing and I still feel that the MotorSports event, or maybe the MotoX motorcycle racing event will fill the void left by live horse racing.

Last year it was just MotorSports as a 'racing' option. The more I think about it, the more I think the newer MotoX event would be a perfect fit to bring back Princeton Racing Days.

All you have to do is ask anyone who has had even a remote connection to the world of motorcycle racing and they will tell you that the track at Princeton Fairgrounds could put Princeton on the Racing

Map once more - only not with horses.

I know I was saddened by the passing of Princeton (horse) Racing Days but as I have been learning with the upcoming closure of the Similkameen News Leader that everything has a cycle, a natural lifespan and some things cannot go on forever. Changes in economic conditions, interests, trends and many other variables tend to have a lot to do with those changes.

From where I'm sitting, MotoX would be the most logical 'big draw' that could easily re-energize the magnet we once had pulling people into Princeton for a weekend of fun and celebration.

The Town of Princeton's Canada Day Celebration is a start but it is not the complete answer to increasing tourism to the community.

If you agree that MotoX will add that one giant piece of the puzzle to the annual Canada Day/Racing Days Celebration, let your elected officials know. They represent you and me and need to hear your thoughts so they can properly do their job. Give them a hand by supporting MotoX.

How does this save downtown Princeton?

Any event that is part of a sanctioned circuit draws traffic. That traffic is not only in the number of entrants and their crews/family. Also, there's fans who follow circuits and are the ones you want wandering the downtown core with all of it feeding into the local economy much more than a giant Canada Day birthday cake will.

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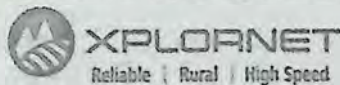

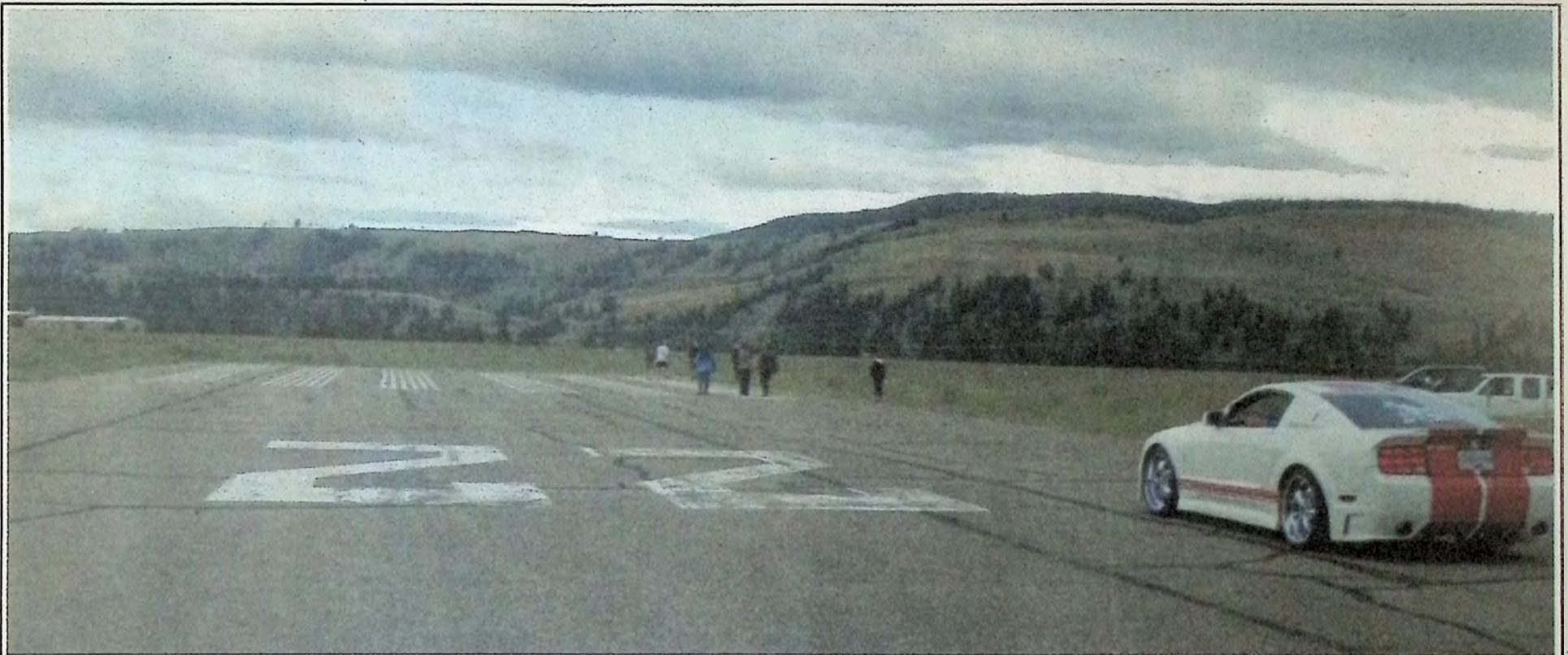

Municipalities conference in Edmonton, \$1,446 for a Union of B.C. Municipalities conference in Victoria, \$770 for Southern Interior Local Government Association meetings, \$315 for a local government leadership academy, and \$103 for a hotel stay in Penticton to accommodate back-to-back meeting days in November.

In 2014, Christensen and his predecessor, Angelique Wood, had combined expenses of \$10,105.

Meanwhile, two other regular directors, Judy Sentes and Andre Martin, both of whom represent Penticton city council, claimed no expenses while earning \$13,908

and \$13,097, respectively last year.

Penticton Mayor Andrew Jakubeit, who also serves as vice-chairman of the RDOS board, earned \$21,144 with expenses of \$390. Combined with his pay from the City of Penticton, Jakubeit made \$81,375 last year as an elected official.

The RDOS also added another four employees last year to its list of those making at least \$75,000.

Of the 23 top earners, chief administrative officer Bill Newell was the highest paid at \$157,528, followed by community services manager Mark Woods at \$104,593 and development services manager Donn Butler at \$102,100.

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
