Margaret especially enjoyed the long-time dear friends of her bridge club, the days with the members of her book club, and the good times she had at Dell's yoga classes. Margaret was a wonderful lady who had many friends in Princeton and elsewhere. She will also be missed by her bridesmaid, Diane Pullinger, of Nanaimo, Rod and Evelyn Hourston, of Vancouver, and old friends June Senini, of Nanaimo, and Peggy Leard, of Vancouver. She loved the cruises she had with her friends and especially her three month stay in Britain in 1990. Margaret was predeceased by her parents, Aaron and Mary Bamford and her very special aunt and uncle, Belle and George Wallace. Aaron worked in the coal mines of Nanaimo and spent several years at the Blakeburn Mine during the Nanaimo coal mine strike of the 1920's. The world lost a special lady on December 1st and we will miss her terribly. She leaves us with great memories.
