Violet Noreen Miller (nee Cornish) peacefully passed away, surrounded by family on June 20, 2011. She was born on March 4, 1922 in Vancouver, British Columbia. Sadly, she is predeceased by her parents, Herbert and Florence Cornish, her husband Frederick, son David, brothers; Vern, Herbert (Jr.), John and Howard. The Cornish family lived in Princeton from about 1928 until about 1938. Fred worked with Herbert (Jr.) Cornish at the Blakeburn Coal Mine. The family then returned to Tulameen, where they resided for about five years, before settling back in Princeton. All of the Miller children attended Princeton Secondary School. In 1975, Fred passed away and Violet moved to Lake Cowichan to care for her aging mother. When her mother was moved to a senior's facility in Duncan, Violet relocated to a small apartment nearby. She remained

there until a few years after her mother passed away, in 1992, returning once again, to Princeton. As her age caught up with her Violet decided to move to Kamloops to be near her daughter Valerie and her husband, Richard Lisenbee, and granddaughter Jennifer Miller. In 2010, she was diagnosed with cancer. She spent her last week at the Marjorie Willoughby Snowden Memorial Hospice Home, in Kamloops, where she received so much loving care. She will be lovingly remembered by two sons, two daughters, thirteen grandchildren, and fourteen great-grandchildren. Her life was one of caring and dedication to family.
