- 3,000-5,000 years ago Native Peoples in area (according to Jennies(?)– Similkameen's are a branch of Athapaskan tribes that migrated south and intermarried extensively with Thompsons)
- 1812 Alexander Ross travelled from Kamloops through Similkameen valley. He was with both the N. West and Astorian fur trading companies – located Astoria Ft Okanagan
- 1821 Union of Hudson Bay Company and the North West Company
- 1826 Archibald McDonald (hbc) visited and described the area
- 1846 A.C Anderson's trail to Kamloops via Tulameen not implemented for some years
- 1846 Boundary treaty: U.S. (Canada) and Britain. Not implemented for some years
- 1856 Gold found in the Thompson and Fraser rivers.
- 1858 John Fall Allison arrived in Similkameen-found gold, coal & copper showings. He settled here, operated a way station ranch, raised cattle and horses. He is considered the "Pioneer Settler."
- 1858 Nora (Yakumtekum) Upper Similkameen Indian Band, HBC packer from Hope to Fort Colville, bears three children with John F. Allison. Returns to Chuchuwayha Reserve with children sometime later.
- 1858 Crown Colony formed British Columbia
- 1859 Gold rush at Blackfoot, opposite Allenby
- 1859 Sgt. McColl builds Sappers' trail, Hope to Princeton
- 1860/3 Royal engineers built 16 miles of the Dewdney trail

1860 First Princeton town site laid out in east Princeton- 600-700 acres by Sgt. McColl of royal engineers. Named Princeton by Governor James Douglas in honor of Prince Albert who was visiting Canada that year.

1860	Royal engineers began construction of the Hope-Princeton highway. A.C. Anderson was commissioned to find the best route to the coast as early as 1864.
1862	Governor Douglas visits Princeton
1865	Hudson Bay post founded at Keremeos
1867	First mail carrier, Jim Wardle, from Hope to Similkameen

1880	Earthquake in Similkameen
1880	Moses rebellion in Similkameen led by an American Indian, Moses
1880	Earthquake in Princeton area after many Natives turned to Christianity
1880-1881 Very severe winter. Allison's move back to Princeton	

1881 Allison's home swept away by flood

1882	Frank Richter Sr. planted fruit trees in the Similkameen valley
1883	Long dispute in Similkameen by rival Chinese gold panners Guong Yuens and Lee Muns. Arbitrated by Allison.
1884	The Jameson family moved to Princeton- this family was Princeton's first famous prospector family
1884	Gold strike on Granite creek- W.M. Briggs, Mike Sullivan & John Bromley.
1885	Granite Creek gold rush. The rush was over by 1895 and the town lingered on until a fire in 1907.

1885	"Discovery claim" – John Chance & E M Allison "wild goose" claim- Bill Jenkins & Tom Curry
