
Enjoy your summer and be sure and put a visit to the museum on the bucket list for visiting family and friends.




HAPPENINGS

Chris and Penny Goodfellow made a very generous donation of \$3,500 to the Museum Legacy Fund to assist with the future care of the amazing Goodfellow Collection that we are still working on. Museum Manager Todd Davidson accepted the donation on behalf of the Society.



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One of the more intriguing aspects of the Goodfellow Collection is the fact that near the end of his life, Rev. Goodfellow took to writing his memoirs in a cryptic shorthand, which we believe he created. We have spent some time on this and believe that we will be able to transcribe these writings.

Another Goodfellow mystery is this little black book written in a cryptic code. Rev. Goodfellow served overseas in World War One so this will likely turn out to be associated with his military service.

A 75 page document on the HBC Brigade Trail surfaced from the Goodfellow Collection and was enthusiastically received by Kelley Cook and Sally Nault (USIB).

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We have now had something in the Similkameen Spotlight every edition for the last two years.

Ross Hodge's efforts to get the two old telephones connected has paid huge dividends with the recent visits by the Grade Ones and the Girl Guides. They Love It!

The Society received a Legacy Fund dividend cheque from the Community Foundation for \$750.

September 6th

"The Most Difficult of Our Camps": Vernon Internment Camp 1914-1920 with Don McNair. This research project of the Vernon & District Family History Society uncovered a vast amount of information concerning the internment of "enemy aliens" in BC's interior after the outbreak of hostilities in 1914. Ukrainians, Poles, Croatians, and other subjects of the Austro-Hungarian Empire predominated, but Vernon Internment Camp focused on the detention of Germans, mostly young men but also several families. They formed an isolated, contentious, and despised enclave at the north end of Vernon, a town that profited by hosting a military training camp at the south end as well. A rich photo collection enables the story to be told with plenty of human details of the prisoners and the troops that guarded them.

October 5th

The Battle of Vimy Ridge with Yasmin John-Thorpe

Award-winning author Yasmin John-Thorpe has written a book for middle grade readers entitled Grandpa's Gift. The book tells a story through a grandpa's eyes to his grandson of an historical battle won by Canadians during WWI on the 100th anniversary. Winning Vimy Ridge from the Germans was instrumental in placing the young nation of Canada on the world map. Many Canadian lost their lives fighting to give the Allies a win after so many losses. Yasmin John-Smith was born in the Caribbean on the island of Trinidad. In early childhood she learned the importance of reading and writing from her parents. Yasmin married a Canadian and came to Canada in 1975. She has two daughters and one grandson. Today, she is a children's author, fiction and non-fiction writer, and mentor. Copies of Grandpa's Gift will be available for sale at the presentation.
